Match background

The Republic of Ireland take on Croatia in their first Group C game at UEFA EURO 2012 having not played at a final tournament since the 2002 FIFA World Cup.

Head-to-head record

- The Irish have had slightly the better of the sides' previous six meetings, boasting the record W2 D3 L1 against Croatia. In their two competitive meetings, the sides claimed a win apiece.
- They first met in Dublin on 2 June 1996, in Croatia's final preparation match before their major finals debut at EURO '96. Davor Šuker (14) and Zvonimir Boban (46) gave the visitors a 2-1 lead after Keith O'Neill had levelled (24). Niall Quinn salvaged a 2-2 draw for the Irish with an 89th-minute equaliser. Slaven Bilić played the full 90 minutes.
- The teams' next meetings came in UEFA EURO 2000 qualifying, where an Ireland side featuring teenagers Robbie Keane and Damien Duff beat Croatia 2-0 in Dublin thanks to a fourth-minute Denis Irwin penalty and a Roy Keane strike (15). Bilić again featured in the return leg as a last-gasp Šuker strike gave the home side a 1-0 win.
- A friendly in Dublin on 15 August 2001 produced a repeat of the 1996 result, with Damien Duff (21) and Clinton Morrison (78) scoring for the hosts, only for late goals by Davor Vugrinec (80) and a Šuker penalty (90) to earn the visitors a draw. Manchester United FC defender John O'Shea, then 20, won his first cap.
- The Irish fared better when the teams met again in Dublin for a friendly on 16 November 2004. A 24th-minute Robbie Keane goal earning them a 1-0 victory.

• The sides' most recent meeting was their first at the new home of Irish football, the Dublin Arena.

• Miroslav Blažević's Croatia got the better of Mick McCarthy's Ireland in the teams' last competitive meeting, with Šuker hitting his 42nd international goal to record a 1-0 win. Bilić played the first half, but gave way to Tomislav Rukavina at the break.

Form guide

- Ireland have not lost in six competitive meetings since that 0-0 friendly draw against Croatia in August 2011, recording three wins and three draws as they made it to the finals of UEFA EURO 2012 with a play-off success against Estonia.
- Eliminated on penalties by Spain in the last 16 of the 2002 FIFA World Cup, Ireland are unbeaten in finals games since losing 2-0 to the Netherlands in their final fixture at the 1994 World Cup, in the round of 16.
- The Irish are competing in a UEFA European Championship final tournament for the first time since making their debut in the 1988 event. In West Germany, they beat England 1-0 in their opening fixture, but missed the cut for the semi-finals, drawing against the Soviet Union then losing to the Netherlands.
- Croatia are competing at a third successive UEFA European Championship; they have missed only one of the last five UEFA EURO 2000.
- Croatia lost on penalties to Turkey in the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2008; they have thus not lost a European finals tie over 90 minutes since being beaten 4-2 by England in their final group stage game at UEFA EURO 2004.

Team ties

- A Croatia side featuring Stipe Pletikosa and Josip Šimunić beat Giovanni Trapattoni's Italy 2-1 in their second game at the 2002 World Cup finals.
- Vedran Ćorluka and Richard Dunne played together at Manchester City FC from 2007 to 2008.

- Between 2009 and 2011, Ćorluka, Luka Modrić and Niko Kranjčar shared the Tottenham Hotspur FC dressing-room with Robbie Keane when the Ireland striker was not on loan at Celtic FC and West Ham United FC.
- Nikola Kalinić played alongside Keith Andrews at Blackburn Rovers FC between 2009 and 2011.
- In January Nikica Jelavić moved from Rangers FC to Everton FC, becoming a team-mate of Darron Gibson who signed from Manchester United FC the same month.
- When Brian Kerr's Ireland won the 1998 UEFA European Under-18 Championship, to go with the U16 title they had picked up two months earlier, they met Croatia in the finals group stage in Cyprus. Robbie Keane scored in the 5-2 win, playing alongside Dunne in the Ireland team. Pletikosa lined up for Croatia.
- The Irish went on to take the title by beating Germany 4-3 on penalties after a 1-1 draw, while the Croatians earned bronze medals with a 5-4 shoot-out win after a goalless 120 minutes with Portugal, Pletikosa making the decisive save.

Match facts

REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

- The Republic of Ireland are 14 matches unbeaten, a run stretching back to a 3-2 loss to Uruguay on 29/03/2011.
- At 73 years and 85 days, Giovanni Trapattoni will become the oldest coach to grace a UEFA European Championship against Croatia, breaking the record of Otto Barić (71yrs, 2 days), Croatia's coach in 2004.
- James McClean is yet to play a competitive fixture for the Ireland.
- Damien Duff has won 97 caps and is set to become Ireland's fifth centurion after Shay Given, Robbie Keane, Kevin Kilbane and Steve Staunton.

Injury news

- Given (knee) and John O'Shea (ankle) missed the Bosnia and Herzegovina friendly as a precaution but returned to training on 31/05 and started against Hungary on 04/06.
- Trapattoni made two changes to his provisional 23-man squad, defender Kevin Foley and midfielder Keith Fahey making way for Paul McShane and Paul Green, respectively.

Miscellaneous

- Ireland's official UEFA EURO 2012 song is a modern twist on the folk song Rocky Road To Dublin. Fresh lyrics were submitted by listeners to a radio station and Irish folk singer Damien Dempsey and rock band The Coronas recorded a new version, Rocky Road To Poland, with the squad providing backing vocals.
- The squad convened at their training camp in Dublin on 20/05, with Keane (arriving from Los Angeles) and Glenn Whelan (who got married on 19/05) joining up a day later. The squad spent a week in Montecatini, Tuscany, and played Hungary in Budapest before arriving in Sopot on 05/06.
- Green is without a club for next season after parting company with Derby County FC while Darren O'Dea is set to leave Celtic FC next month when his contract expires.
- There are four survivors of Ireland's last squad at a major international final tournament, the 2002 FIFA World Cup: Given, Keane, Duff and Richard Dunne, though Dunne did not play in South Korea/Japan.
- None of Ireland's 2002 World Cup squad had ever played top-flight football in Ireland five of the UEFA EURO 2012 party have: Stephen Ward, Kevin Doyle, Shane Long, McClean and David Forde.
- None of the Irish squad have UEFA European Championship experience, but Keane and Dunne were in the side that won the 1998 UEFA European Under-18 Championship, the same year O'Shea lifted the U16 equivalent.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Keane scored seven goals in qualifying as he passed a half-century of international goals. He is now on 53.
- Trapattoni's side went a national record eight matches without conceding between the 3-2 friendly defeat at home by Uruguay in 29/03/2011 and a 2-1 win at home to Armenia on 11/10/2011.
- Aiden McGeady was Ireland's only ever-present in qualifying.

Domestic information

- Ward played every minute of Wolverhampton Wanderers FC's English Premier League campaign as the side finished bottom of the table. Club-mates Doyle and Stephen Hunt also suffered relegation.
- Four members of the squad played for English second-tier sides last season: Forde (Millwall FC), Sean St Ledger (Leicester City FC), McShane (Hull City AFC) and Green (Derby).
- Keane helped the LA Galaxy claim the MLS title in November. He had a seven-game spell with England's Aston Villa FC at the beginning of the year before returning to the United States in March for the start of the new season.

CROATIA

- Croatia have won just one of their last four games.
- Josip Šimunić has 95 caps for Croatia and is approaching Dario Šimić's national record of 100.
- Goalkeepers Danijel Subašić and Ivan Kelava, and defender Jurica Buljat are yet to make a competitive appearance for Croatia. Subašić and Buljat have won friendly caps, though.

Injury news

- Ivica Olić was ruled out of the squad after tearing his hamstring in Norway on 02/06 and replaced by Nikola Kalinić.
- Ivo Iličević was ruled out on the eve of the finals with a ruptured calf muscle and replaced by Šime Vrsaljko.
- Dejan Lovren was named in Croatia's provisional squad but was left out of the final 23 after failing to recover from an Achilles problem.

Miscellaneous

- Slaven Bilić announced last month that he will step down as Croatia coach after UEFA EURO 2012 to take the reins at FC Lokomotiv Moskva.
- There are ten survivors of Croatia's UEFA EURO 2008 squad: Stipe Pletikosa, Vedran Ćorluka, Danijel Pranjić, Šimunić, Darijo Srna, Niko Kranjčar, Luka Modrić, Ivan Rakitić, Ognjen Vukojević and Kalinić.
- This will be the third UEFA European Championship for Srna and Šimunić, equalling a national record set by Šimić.
- The squad began gathering in Zagreb on 16/05, and were complete seven days later when FC Bayern München's Pranjić arrived after the UEFA Champions League final. They moved to their EURO base in Warka on 05/06.
- Croatia have scored four goals in each of the EURO group stages they have participated in, in 1996, 2004 and 2008.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- With Group F leaders Greece trailing 1-0 to Georgia on the final day, Croatia were 11 minutes from automatic qualification before goals from Giorgos Fotakis and Angelos Charisteas turned things round.
- Olić broke the deadlock two minutes into the play-off with Turkey in what was his first competitive start in 13 months.
- Kranjčar was Croatia's top scorer in qualifying with four goals.
- Corluka and Eduardo played 11 of Croatia's 12 qualifiers, play-offs included.
- Croatia kept six clean sheets in 12 matches, with Vedran Runje and Pletikosa each keeping three from six.

Domestic information

- Kelava, Domagoj Vida, Šimunić, Milan Badelj and Vrsaljko played key roles as GNK Dinamo Zagreb claimed a seventh successive Croatian championship.
- Kelava saved a crucial penalty six minutes from time in the second leg of the Croatian Cup final as Dinamo edged out NK Osijek 2-1 on aggregate.
- The youngest player in the Croatia squad, 20-year-old Vrsaljko has already collected five trophies with Dinamo Zagreb: three championships and two cups.
- Ivan Perišić was part of the Borussia Dortmund squad that claimed their first domestic double, beating Bayern 5-2 in the German Cup final on 12/05.
- Gordon Schildenfeld missed just one game as Eintracht Frankfurt finished runners-up in the second tier to secure promotion to the Bundesliga.
- Nikica Jelavić scored nine goals in ten league starts after swapping Rangers FC for Everton FC in January.
- Srna and Eduardo were in the FC Shakhtar Donetsk squad that claimed the domestic double in Ukraine.
- On 6 June FC Dynamo Kyiv confirmed the signing of Kranjčar on a four-year contract.

- Capped 17 times by Italy, Trapattoni spent the majority of his club career as a defender and ball-winning midfielder with Milan, winning seven major trophies including two European Champion Clubs' Cups.
- Started coaching with Milan but established himself as one of Italy's greatest ever 'allenatori' during ten-year spell with Juventus, which yielded victories in all three major European club competitions an unprecedented achievement and six Serie A titles.
- Decamped to Inter in 1986 and led Nerazzurri to long-awaited Scudetto triumph in 1988/89 as well as the UEFA Cup, a trophy he won again during a second spell at Juve from 1991 to 1994.
- Moved abroad and won national titles with Bayern, Benfica and Salzburg, becoming the first coach since Ernst Happel to win league championships in four different countries. No success, however, with the Italian national team after unexpected early exits at 2002 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2004.
- Returned to international management with Ireland in 2008; led the team undefeated through 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying group including two draws against Italy before suffering play-off defeat by France. Reached the play-offs again for UEFA EURO 2012 but this time there was a happy ending as Estonia were defeated 5-1 as Ireland qualified for the first time since 1988.

- A towering, uncompromising central defender, he began his career with hometown club Hajduk Split, winning the Croatian domestic double in 1992 before moving abroad to German club Karlsruhe.
- Having joined West Ham for a club-record fee in January 1996, he represented Croatia at EURO '96 and helped the team to the quarter-finals; two years later, as an Everton player, he won a FIFA World Cup bronze medal as Croatia finished third in France.
- After ending his playing career at Hajduk, he briefly took charge of the team before launching his coaching career in earnest with the Croatian U21 side.
- Stepped up from the U21s to become the senior national side's coach in July 2006 and masterminded the team's successful qualification for UEFA EURO 2008, where, as the youngest coach in the tournament, his team's progress was halted only at the guarter-final stage with a penalty shoot-out defeat by Turkey.
- Despite Croatia's position as seeds in their 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying group, he could only lead them to third place and elimination. Announced he would stay on for the UEFA EURO 2012 qualifiers and guided them to the finals with a notable play-off win against Turkey. Announced in May 2012 he would leave for FC Lokomotiv Moskva after the tournament.

- Björn Kuipers is following in the family trade as he continues to work his way up the refereeing ladder, with his father having also acted as an official in the Netherlands.
- Kuipers Jr earned his FIFA badge aged 33, in 2006 the year he took charge of the UEFA European Under-17 Championship final between the Czech Republic and Russia. He stepped up to work as a fourth official in both the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup during the season that followed.
- A fourth official for four matches at the 2007 European U21 Championship, Kuipers who lives in the Dutch town of Oldenzaal with his wife and daughter, works as a supermarket director and counts mountain biking among his hobbies held the same role in five qualifying games for UEFA EURO 2008.
- He was appointed as referee for four 2008/09 UEFA Cup fixtures, and was back at the U21 tournament as a referee in 2009, taking charge of four matches in Sweden including Germany's 4-0 final defeat of England.
- Became a UEFA Champions League regular the following season, overseeing five matches in the competition proper finishing with the round of 16 first leg between VfB Stuttgart and holders FC Barcelona. Continued his rise in 2010/11, overseeing the UEFA Europa League semi-final first leg involving FC Porto and Villarreal CF, and started the following season by taking charge of the UEFA Super Cup in Monaco.

Competition facts

UEFA European Football Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Germany are the most competition's most successful side having lifted the trophy in 1972, 1980 (both as West Germany) and 1996, reaching the final in 1976, 1992 and 2008. Only Spain (1964, 2008) and France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has ever appeared in two victorious UEFA European Championship finals. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the finals as holders only to lose, while Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as coach of Germany in 1996, making him the only man to win as player and coach.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals or better three times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000) and Austria and Switzerland (2008).
- UEFA EURO 2012 is Germany's 11th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the seventh successive edition.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the eleventh time, one more than Russia. This is the ninth tournament for the Netherlands and Spain.
- Five teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including Spain and Germany this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004) and Czech Republic (2000).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- Spain are seeking to retain the trophy having already become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France won the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000. No team has ever won three consecutive world and continental titles.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals: for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller played in both matches, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry also achieved the feat for France.
- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success.
- Five players have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European triumph, while Nicolas Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate Christian Karembeu holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.
- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.
- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to appear in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Belgium's Enzo Scifo is the youngest player to feature; he was 18 years 115 days in the 2-0 defeat of Yugoslavia at the 1984 finals.
- Five players have appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar and Lilian Thuram.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to score having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to strike in the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).

A celebration of football

The European football family and its guests gathered together at Warsaw's Royal Castle to herald the start of UEFA EURO 2012. Speaking to government ministers, representatives of the eight host cities, members of European national football associations, and sporting and business guests from throughout Europe and beyond, UEFA President Michel Platini encapsulated the anticipation for the tournament. "We are finally there! The people of Poland and Ukraine have been waiting for more than five years for this moment," said Mr Platini. "The three weeks which lie ahead must be an immense festival, a popular celebration of the most beautiful sport in the world, because football is just one thing – happiness in its purest form." The UEFA President welcomed the presidents of the 16 participating associations on stage, and presented them with a symbolic gift – a hand-crafted silver football boot. "Good luck to you all," he said. "I hope all your players will behave in an exemplary manner on the pitch, and hope especially that they will succeed in making us dream during this EURO."

EURO Legends choose Carlsberg Man of the Match

Legends who have graced past EUROs will be making a key contribution to UEFA EURO 2012 by voting for and helping to present the Carlsberg Man of the Match Award at each of the 31 games in Poland and Ukraine – and fans will join them in deciding who wins the coveted prize each time. A EURO legend, invited by UEFA President Michel Platini, will be present at each match. A fan vote will be accessible via the UEFA.com match centre, and the EURO Legend will take into consideration the fans' vote before making the final decision on the most outstanding man on the field during the match. A glittering array of superstars are being lined up to decide who wins each UEFA EURO 2012 Carlsberg Man of the Match Award. Fernando Couto (Portugal), Christian Karembeu (France), Predrag Mijatović (Montenegro), Peter Schmeichel (Denmark), Allan Simonsen (Denmark), Davor Šuker (Croatia) and Patrick Vieira (France) are among those who will act as award ambassadors in Poland and Ukraine.

Referees Committee briefs EURO teams

Members of the UEFA Referees Committee have been meeting the coaches and players of the 16 participating teams ahead of UEFA EURO 2012 to discuss the instructions given to the referees for the tournament in Poland and Ukraine. The committee members – all vastly-experienced former international match officials – have emphasised the message that cooperation between the coaches, players and referees will contribute to the success and image of the tournament. Protection of players and the game's image, and punishment for mobbing the referee, as well as for incidents of mass confrontation, are among the instructions delivered by the UEFA Referees Committee to the 12 refereeing teams.

UEFA charity donation for EURO goals

Committed to providing improved access and facilities for disabled football fans, UEFA is donating €3,000 for every goal scored at UEFA EURO 2012 to the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE), the official tournament charity. As part of the Respect programme at UEFA EURO 2012, UEFA is working with CAFE to manage separate Respect Inclusion initiatives, and football followers and other benefactors are being encouraged to donate money for upcoming schemes. CAFE was set up via UEFA's CHF1m charity cheque in 2009 to promote and ensure equal access across the region covered by UEFA's member national associations. It provides support, guidance and advice to partners and stakeholders, which include UEFA, national associations, leagues and clubs, disabled fans and disabled supporter groups.

Technical Team studies tactical trends

UEFA's Technical Team of experienced technicians will look at the trends and talking points at UEFA EURO 2012 from a coaching point of view, helping to produce a report on the tournament. Appropriately, it is an 11-man team captained by UEFA's technical director Andy Roxburgh. "The brief is to provide a permanent record of the event from a coach's viewpoint and to trigger debate on the trends and talking points which emerge from it," he said. "A EURO, alongside the FIFA World Cup and the UEFA Champions League, is where benchmarks are laid and the most significant trends at the elite end of the game become apparent. These can supply valuable information in terms of pinpointing facets of the game which might need to be built into youth development programmes throughout UEFA's member associations."

Alongside Roxburgh will be Fabio Capello, Jerzy Engel, Dusan Fitzel, Gérard Houllier, Lars Lagerbäck, György Mezey and Holger Osieck, with Jean-Paul Brigger and Walter Gagg providing FIFA input, while Mordechai Shpigler will act as linkman to UEFA's Development & Technical Assistance Committee. The technical team's work is based on first-hand observations at each of the 31 matches. At least two of the team will attend every fixture to make sure each side is watched by a pair of expert eyes. One of the other tasks facing the technical team will be to acknowledge outstanding individual contributions and, after the final in Kyiv, Roxburgh and his team will be getting together to put the finishing touches to UEFA's All-Star Squad.
