## Match background

---

Co-hosts Ukraine will end the long wait to kick off their UEFA EURO 2012 campaign when they face Sweden in their opening Group D game, with past friendly encounters suggesting there is little to choose between the sides.

### Head-to-head record

- This is the countries' first competitive encounter, their three previous friendly meetings having yielded one win each and a draw over 90 minutes.
- They first met in Sweden on 1 June 2008, when Serhiy Nazarenko struck with a long-distance shot to give the visitors a 1-0 victory.
- The teams played again in the final of a friendly tournament in Cyprus on 9 February 2011; they drew 1-1 over 90 minutes, with Ukraine then prevailing 5-4 on penalties. Marko Dević replied from the spot with his first goal for his country after Johan Elmander gave Sweden an early lead.
- Sweden got their first victory at the third attempt, Tobias Hysén striking two minutes into added time for a 1-0 victory in a friendly in Kharkiv on 10 August 2011.
- The nations' only previous competitive encounter at any level came in the 2005/06 UEFA European Under-17 Championship elite round, where they drew 1-1 in Portugal.

- This was the sides' most recent fixture, under current coaches Oleh Blokhin and Erik Hamrén respectively.

### Form guide

- Sweden go into the finals on a three-game winning streak in competitive fixtures, notably beating the Netherlands 3-2 in their final Group E game as the Oranje dropped their first points in qualifying.
- The Swedes last appeared at a major final tournament at UEFA EURO 2008, where they exited at the group stage. Defeats by Russia and eventual winners Spain negated their opening 2-0 victory against Greece.
- Ukraine have not played a competitive fixture since losing 1-0 to Greece (both on the night and on aggregate) in a play-off for the 2010 FIFA World Cup finals at the Donbass Arena, Donetsk on 18 November 2009.
- Ukraine's only previous experience of a major tournament came at the 2006 World Cup; they made it through the group stage, recovering from a 4-0 opening loss to Spain by beating Saudi Arabia 4-0 and Tunisia 1-0. They then beat Switzerland 3-0 on penalties following a 0-0 draw in the round of 16, but lost 3-0 to Italy in the quarter-finals.
- Thus Ukraine have yet to score a goal from open play – or win inside 120 minutes – against European opposition at a major final tournament.

### Team ties

- Club sides from the two nations have met six times in UEFA competition with the Ukrainians having the slight edge, with the record W2 D3 L1. Most recently, FC Metalist Kharkiv met Malmö FF in this season's UEFA Europa League group stage, winning 4-1 in Sweden and 3-1 at home.
- Dević and Edmar, both Ukrainian internationals although the latter is not in the UEFA EURO 2012 squad, scored in that 4-1 Metalist win in Sweden. Dević, as mentioned earlier, struck his first Ukraine goal against Sweden in February 2011.
- Zlatan Ibrahimović played in Kyiv in 2009/10, taking part in FC Barcelona's 2-1 UEFA Champions League group stage win against FC Dynamo Kyiv at the Valeriy Lobanovskiy Stadium.
- Ukraine coach Blokhin scored against Sweden as a Soviet Union player in a 1-1 friendly draw in Solna on 3 June 1982.

## Match facts

---

### UKRAINE

- Ukraine have lost six of their last 11 matches; Oleh Gusev has scored five goals in his last five internationals.
- Seven of the squad are yet to make a competitive appearance, though all won their first caps in friendlies: Olexandr Goryainov, Maxym Koval, Bohdan Butko, Yevhen Selin, Denys Garmash, Yevhen Konoplyanka and Marko Dević.

### Injury news

- Goalkeepers Olexandr Shovkovskiy (shoulder) and Andriy Dykan (concussion) were ruled out of the finals while Dmytro Chygrynskiy missed out with an ankle problem.

### Miscellaneous

- Ukraine had training camps in Turkey and Austria before returning to Kyiv on 06/06. Blokhin had to leave the Turkish camp for a few days following the death of his mother.
- There are eight survivors of Ukraine's only previous final tournament, when Blokhin guided them to the 2006 FIFA World Cup quarter-finals: Andriy Shevchenko, Anatoliy Tymoshchuk, Andriy Voronin, Artem Milevskiy, Gusev, Ruslan Rotan, Andriy Pyatov and Serhiy Nazarenko. Pyatov and Nazarenko did not make an appearance in Germany.

### UEFA EURO 2012 build-up

- Ukraine have had three coaches since the start of 2010. Myron Markevych guided the side to three wins and a 1-1 draw with the Netherlands before focusing on responsibilities at FC Metalist Kharkiv in October 2010. Yuriy Kalitvintsev managed one victory in eight games as caretaker coach before making way for Blokhin in April 2011.
- Ukraine suffered a national record four successive losses between June and September 2011, with defeats by France, Sweden, Uruguay and the Czech Republic.
- Shevchenko became the first Ukrainian player to reach 100 caps on 08/10/2010, in a draw with Canada. Three days later, against Brazil, Tymoshchuk became the second.
- On 25/05/2010 Goryainov became Ukraine's oldest debutant when, aged 34 years and 330 days, he made his bow in a 4-0 victory against Lithuania in Kharkiv.
- Andriy Yarmolenko scored after 15 seconds against Uruguay on 02/09/2011, Ukraine's quickest ever goal.

### Domestic information

- Pyatov, Olexandr Kucher, Yaroslav Rakitskiy, Vyacheslav Shevchuk and Yevhen Seleznyov were part of the FC Shakhtar Donetsk squad that earned a third successive Ukrainian title. Seleznyov was the Premier League's joint highest scorer with 14 goals in 23 appearances.
- The Pitmen completed the double on 06/05, Kucher scoring the extra-time winner against his former side FC Metalurh Donetsk to seal a 2-1 triumph after Rakitskiy's free-kick was parried into his path.

## **SWEDEN**

- Sweden have won four games out of four in 2012.
- Coach Erik Hamrén will get his first taste of a final tournament against Ukraine.
- Pär Hansson and Jonas Olsson are yet to make a competitive appearance for Sweden, though both have friendly caps to their name.

### **Injury news**

- Johan Elmander suffered a fractured right foot in Galatasaray AŞ's final game of the season on 12/05.
- Andreas Isaksson had not featured since 08/03 because of a shoulder injury before playing 90 minutes against Iceland on 30/05.
- Mikael Lustig has played just six times this year because of persistent groin problems.

### **Miscellaneous**

- Sweden convened in Visby on the island of Gotland on 24/05, with Anders Svensson, Tobias Hysén and Christian Wilhelmsson joining a day later due to club commitments. They arrived at their EURO base outside Kyiv on 06/06.
- Rasmus Elm was given permission to leave Visby for a day to attend his brother David's wedding.
- Left-back Martin Olsson has registered four goals in nine appearances for Sweden.
- Alongside Germany, Sweden have the tallest squad at UEFA EURO 2012, with an average height of 1.85m while in Andreas Isaksson (1.99m) they possess the tallest player.
- Olof Mellberg is the first Sweden player to feature at four UEFA European Championships.
- Eleven of the squad have UEFA European Championship experience: Mellberg (2000, 2004, 2008), Isaksson (2004, 2008), Svensson (2004, 2008), Kim Källström (2004, 2008), Zlatan Ibrahimović (2004, 2008), Wilhelmsson (2004, 2008), Johan Wiland (2008), Andreas Granqvist (2008), Sebastian Larsson (2008), Elmander (2008) and Markus Rosenberg (2008).

### **UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying**

- Lustig played every minute of Sweden's campaign, while Larsson, Källström and Elmander were also ever-present.
- Four of Sweden's squad did not feature in qualifying: Hansson, Jonas Olsson, Samuel Holmén and Rosenberg.
- The 3-2 win against the Netherlands that sealed Sweden's place in Poland/Ukraine provided a fitting competitive farewell to their Råsundastadion home in Solna, which opened in 1937 and will be demolished this year.
- Sweden scored 31 goals in qualifying; only the Netherlands (37) and Germany (34) were more prolific.

### **Domestic information**

- The Swedish season kicked off at the end of March, ending four and a half months without a competitive game for Allsvenskan-based players Hansson, Svensson and Hysén. The league has a six-week break during EURO, and Svensson and IF Elfsborg will resume with an eight-point cushion after 12 matches.
- Ibrahimović was top scorer in Serie A with 28 goals, his best ever league return, but AC Milan were pipped to the title by Juventus.
- Mellberg won the Greek double with Olympiacos FC, Elmander captured the Turkish title with Galatasaray and Lustig made four appearances as Celtic FC eased to the Scottish championship.
- Behrang Safari picked up his third straight league title, following back-to-back honours at FC Basel 1893 with another championship in his first season at RSC Anderlecht.
- Martin Olsson's Blackburn Rovers FC were relegated from the English Premier League, finishing second from bottom.

## Head coach

---

### **Ukraine: Oleh Blokhin**

**Date of birth:** 5 November 1952

**Nationality:** Ukrainian

**Playing career:** FC Dynamo Kyiv, SK Vorwärts Steyr, Aris Limassol FC

**Coaching career:** Olympiacos FC, PAOK FC (twice), Ionikos FC (twice), AEK Athens FC, Ukraine (twice), FC Moskva

- Blokhin rose through Dynamo's youth ranks to win seven Soviet titles and five USSR Cups, as well as lifting the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup in 1975 and 1986 and the UEFA Super Cup in 1975. A fearsome forward, he scored 211 goals in 432 Soviet league appearances, both competition records.
- Spent his final seasons in Austria at Vorwärts Steyr and Aris Limassol in Cyprus, staying a year at each before retiring in 1990.
- Record holder of caps (112) and goals (42) for the Soviet national team, Blokhin won a bronze medal at the 1972 and 1976 Olympic Games and also participated in the 1982 and 1986 FIFA World Cups. In 1975, his role in Dynamo's UEFA Cup Winners' Cup triumph and three goals against FC Bayern München in the two-legged UEFA Super Cup helped him win the Ballon d'Or.
- Started his coaching career in 1990 with Olympiacos, spending three years with the club – winning two Greek Cups – and also having spells at PAOK, Ionikos and AEK. Took charge of Ukraine in September 2003, guiding the team to the quarter-finals of the 2006 FIFA World Cup, where they lost to eventual champions Italy.
- Stepped down after missing out on UEFA EURO 2008 but was reappointed in April 2011 after spells at Moskva and FC Chornomorets Odesa, the latter as sporting director.

### **Sweden: Erik Hamrén**

**Date of birth:** 27 June 1957

**Nationality:** Swedish

**Playing career:** Ljusdals IF, Stockviks FF

**Coaching career:** Njurunda IK, IFK Sundsvall, Bro IK, Enköpings SK, Väsby IK, IF Brommapojkarna, Vasalunds IF, Degerfors IF, AIK Solna, Örgryte IS, Aalborg BK, Rosenborg BK, Sweden

- Played the game only until his late teens. Began coaching at junior level before taking on his first senior posts with Swedish second-tier clubs Väsby, Brommapojkarna and Vasalund.
- Joined Allsvenskan outfit Degerfors in 1994 and moved on a year later to AIK. Guided Stockholm club to three successive Swedish Cup finals, losing the first one, in 1995, and winning the next two.
- Won cup for a third time in 2000 with his next club Örgryte after two-legged final victory against AIK. Remained for six seasons before moving abroad in January 2004 to coach Danish club AaB.
- Led AaB to 2007/08 Danish Superliga title – only the third championship in club's history – but announced mid-season he would be leaving at the end of the campaign for Rosenborg.
- Masterminded runaway Tippeligaen title success for Rosenborg in his first full season. Replaced long-serving Sweden coach Lars Lagerbäck in November 2009, remaining with Rosenborg until the start of UEFA EURO 2012 qualification in September 2010. Proved an immediate success in his new role, guiding Sweden to the finals thanks to a defeat of the Netherlands on the last day of qualifying.

• One of Turkey's most promising match officials, Cüneyt Çakır has enjoyed a rapid rise up the ladder since his UEFA debut as the fourth official in the UEFA Champions League first qualifying round game between Skonto FC and Sliema Wanderers FC in July 2003.

• Took charge of two matches at the 2007 UEFA European Under-19 Championship in Austria and was also the referee for two UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying fixtures.

• Çakır, who lives with his wife in Istanbul and works in insurance, made his refereeing debut in the UEFA Cup proper in 2008/09, taking charge of two games including the group stage fixture between FC Twente and FC Schalke 04 in December 2008.

• He has been in the middle for more than 100 matches in the Turkish Süper Lig and was selected for the U21 finals in Sweden in 2009, taking charge of three games including England's penalty shoot-out win against the hosts in the semi-finals.

• Oversaw Fulham's second-leg win against Hamburger SV in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League semi-finals, one of seven matches he refereed in total in the competition that season. Çakır took charge of three group stage matches in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League and was selected for the 2011 FIFA U-20 World Cup, when he was in the middle for the France-Portugal semi-final.

## Competition facts

---

### UEFA European Football Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Germany are the most competition's most successful side having lifted the trophy in 1972, 1980 (both as West Germany) and 1996, reaching the final in 1976, 1992 and 2008. Only Spain (1964, 2008) and France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has ever appeared in two victorious UEFA European Championship finals. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the finals as holders only to lose, while Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as coach of Germany in 1996, making him the only man to win as player and coach.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals – or better – three times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000) and Austria and Switzerland (2008).
- UEFA EURO 2012 is Germany's 11th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament – they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the seventh successive edition.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the eleventh time, one more than Russia. This is the ninth tournament for the Netherlands and Spain.
- Five teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including Spain and Germany this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004) and Czech Republic (2000).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- Spain are seeking to retain the trophy having already become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France won the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000. No team has ever won three consecutive world and continental titles.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals: for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeneß and Gerd Müller played in both matches, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinedine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry also achieved the feat for France.
- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success.
- Five players have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European triumph, while Nicolas Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate Christian Karembou holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.
- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.
- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to appear in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Jetro Willems became the youngest player to grace a UEFA European Championship when he started the Netherlands' opening Group B match against Denmark at UEFA EURO 2012. The PSV Eindhoven defender was aged 18 years and 71 days, breaking the record held by Belgium's Enzo Scifo, who was 18 years and 115 days against Yugoslavia in 1984.
- Five players have appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar and Lilian Thuram.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to score having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to strike in the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).

### Proceedings opened against RFS

After having looked at the security reports and available images, UEFA has opened disciplinary proceedings against the Football Union of Russia (RFS) for the improper conduct of its supporters (crowd disturbances), the setting off and throwing of fireworks and the display of illicit banners at Friday's UEFA EURO 2012 Group A match in Wroclaw between Russia and the Czech Republic. The Control and Disciplinary Body will review the case on Wednesday 13 June. In addition, regarding reports of alleged abuse directed at Czech Republic players from Russia fans, UEFA is investigating this further and is working with FARE to collect more evidence.

### EURO Legends choose Carlsberg Man of the Match

Legends who have graced past EUROs will be making a key contribution to UEFA EURO 2012 by voting for and helping to present the Carlsberg Man of the Match Award at each of the 31 games in Poland and Ukraine – and fans will join them in deciding who wins the coveted prize each time. A EURO legend, invited by UEFA President Michel Platini, will be present at each match. A fan vote will be accessible via the UEFA.com match centre, and the EURO Legend will take into consideration the fans' vote before making the final decision on the most outstanding man on the field during the match. A glittering array of superstars are being lined up to decide who wins each UEFA EURO 2012 Carlsberg Man of the Match Award. Fernando Couto (Portugal), Christian Karembeu (France), Predrag Mijatović (Montenegro), Peter Schmeichel (Denmark), Allan Simonsen (Denmark), Davor Šuker (Croatia) and Patrick Vieira (France) are among those who will act as award ambassadors in Poland and Ukraine.

### UEFA charity donation for EURO goals

Committed to providing improved access and facilities for disabled football fans, UEFA is donating €3,000 for every goal scored at UEFA EURO 2012 to the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE), the official tournament charity. As part of the Respect programme at UEFA EURO 2012, UEFA is working with CAFE to manage separate Respect Inclusion initiatives, and football followers and other benefactors are being encouraged to donate money for upcoming schemes. CAFE was set up via UEFA's CHF1m charity cheque in 2009 to promote and ensure equal access across UEFA's member national associations. It provides support, guidance and advice to partners and stakeholders, which include UEFA, national associations, leagues and clubs, disabled fans and disabled supporter groups.

### Technical Team studies tactical trends

UEFA's Technical Team of experienced technicians will look at the trends and talking points at UEFA EURO 2012 from a coaching point of view, helping to produce a report on the tournament. Appropriately, it is an 11-man team captained by UEFA's technical director Andy Roxburgh. "The brief is to provide a permanent record of the event from a coach's viewpoint and to trigger debate on the trends and talking points which emerge," he said. "A EURO, alongside the FIFA World Cup and the UEFA Champions League, is where benchmarks are laid and the most significant trends at the elite end of the game become apparent. These can supply valuable information to pinpoint facets of the game which might need to be built into youth development programmes throughout UEFA's member associations."

Alongside Roxburgh will be Fabio Capello, Jerzy Engel, Dusan Fitzel, Gérard Houllier, Lars Lagerbäck, György Mezey and Holger Osieck, with Jean-Paul Brigger and Walter Gagg providing FIFA input, while Mordechai Shpigler will act as linkman to UEFA's Development & Technical Assistance Committee. The technical team's work is based on first-hand observations at each of the 31 matches. At least two of the team will attend every fixture to make sure each side is watched by a pair of expert eyes. One of the other tasks facing the technical team will be to acknowledge outstanding individual contributions and, after the final in Kyiv, Roxburgh and his team will be getting together to put the finishing touches to UEFA's All-Star Squad.

### 'Respect Diversity – Football Unites'

The UEFA/FARE 'Respect Diversity – Football Unites' programme at UEFA EURO 2012 was launched at an event at the Polish Foreign Ministry in Warsaw. The programme includes monitoring at matches, anti-discrimination messages at every game, a joint protocol on the reporting of incidents, a commitment to take disciplinary sanctions and a campaign focus at the semi-finals that will include diversity messages from team captains. Speakers at the event were UEFA Executive Committee member and the chairman of UEFA's Fair Play and Social Responsibility Committee, Peter Gilliéron, Poland's deputy foreign affairs minister Beata Stelmach, deputy sports minister Jacek Foks, minister for equality Agnieszka Kozłowska-Rajewicz, Rafał Pankowski from the Warsaw-based Never Again association and coordinator of the FARE programme for UEFA EURO 2012, and Wilfried Lemke, the United Nations Secretary General's special adviser on sport for development and peace.

"We are here to celebrate diversity: diversity in football and diversity in society," Peter Gilliéron told the audience. "For the past decade, under the leadership of UEFA and our friends at FARE, football has been striving to better itself and to contribute to a betterment of society by fostering tolerance and respect."

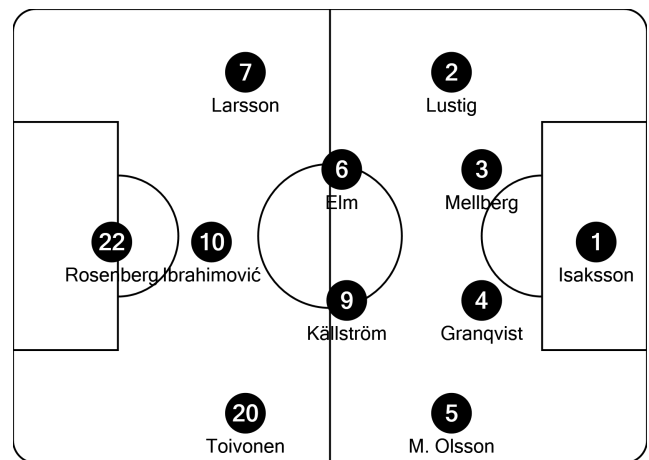

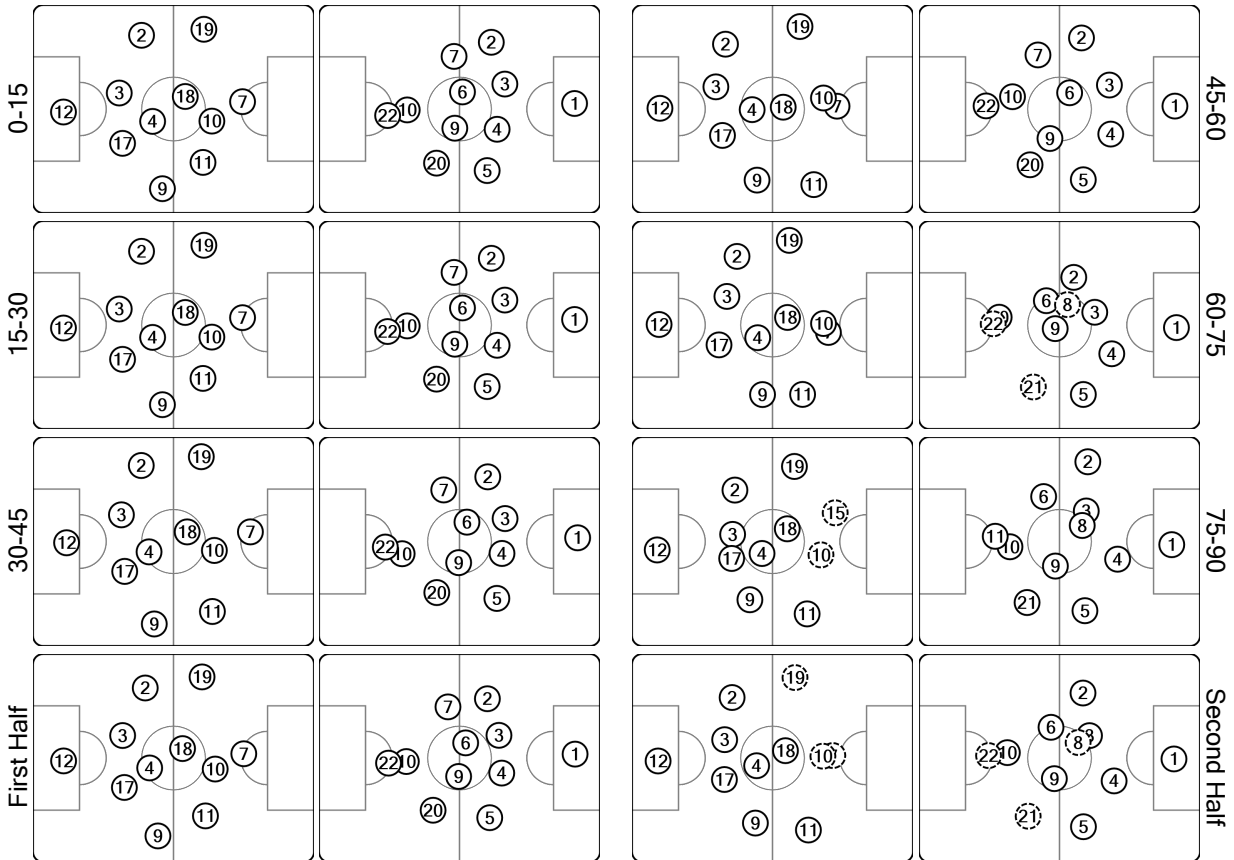
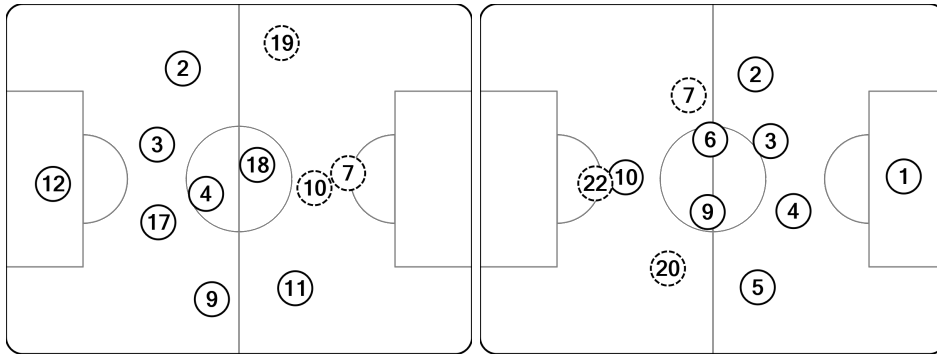
