Match background

Denmark have enjoyed both their finest hour and their most humiliating defeat against Germany, their opponents in the teams' final UEFA EURO 2012 Group B fixture.

- Germany lead the way in the section having won both games so far, Mario Gomez scoring all their goals in victories against Portugal (1-0) and the Netherlands (2-1). Denmark are third having beaten the Netherlands 1-0 before a 3-2 defeat by Portugal.
- Germany will qualify as group winners if they draw, but will be knocked out if they lose to Denmark by any result other than a one-goal defeat in which Germany score at least two and Portugal beat the Netherlands. Denmark will progress with any win; a draw will only be good enough if Portugal lose. If Denmark lose they are out.

Head-to-head record

- Denmark's record in 25 previous meetings with Germany is W8 D3 L14. However, they hold the upper hand in competitive fixtures, where they have won two of three encounters.
- The Danes have not lost in their last three meetings with Germany – all friendlies – recording wins in Copenhagen and Duisburg, and a draw in the Danish capital.
- The nations' competitive ties have all come at final tournaments: at the 1986 FIFA World Cup (2-0 to Denmark), the 1988 UEFA European Championship (2-0 to Germany) and the EURO '92 final (2-0 to Denmark). Denmark coach Morten Olsen played in the first two games.
- The countries first met in a Copenhagen friendly on 6 October 1912, which Denmark won 3-1. The Danes won their first three games against Germany, who finally prevailed 2-1 in Nuremberg in 1928.
- Germany handed Denmark their heaviest defeat in a friendly on 16 May 1937, winning 8-0 in Breslau – now the Polish UEFA EURO 2012 host city of Wroclaw – with Otto Siffling hitting five of those goals.
- Denmark's record against the former East Germany is W2 D2 L2.

- Joachim Löw's experimental Germany side surrendered a 2-0 lead to draw 2-2 with Olsen's Denmark in the sides' most recent meeting.

- Denmark's finest hour came as Richard Møller Nielsen's men beat Berti Vogts' Germany to win their only major title in a tournament they had only entered as late replacements for Yugoslavia.

- Germany's only competitive victory against Denmark came as West Germany at the 1988 UEFA European Championship. Franz Beckenbauer's side reached the semi-finals as group winners, with Sepp Piontek's Danes ending the group stage with no points.

Form guide

- Winners in 1992, Denmark failed to reach UEFA EURO 2008. Prior to that, they had competed at every UEFA European Championship finals since 1984, when they reached the semi-finals, but lost out to Spain on penalties.

• West Germany or Germany have played in every EURO final tournament since marking their first appearance with victory in 1972. Also winners in 1980 and 1996, they reached the 1976, 1992 and 2008 finals, but have yet to take Europe's top prize since the turn of the millennium.

Team ties

• Denmark coach Olsen spent the final seasons of his playing career (1986-89) with 1. FC Köln, who finished second in the table in his final campaign. He coached the club from 1993 to 1995.

• Several Denmark players have Bundesliga experience:

Lars Jacobsen (Hamburger SV 2002-03, 1. FC Nürnberg 2007-08)

Simon Kjær (VfL Wolfsburg 2010-)

William Kvist (VfB Stuttgart 2011-)

Christian Poulsen (FC Schalke 04 2002-06)

• Kjær is on loan at AS Roma, but contracted to Wolfsburg until 2014.

• Christian Poulsen and Manuel Neuer were team-mates in 2005/06, the Dane's final season with Schalke.

• Nicklas Bendtner and Per Mertesacker are both on Arsenal FC's books, though the former spent the 2011/12 season on loan at Sunderland AFC.

• Denmark's Simon Poulsen made his international debut in a 1-0 win in Germany in March 2007. Bendtner scored the only goal.

Competition format

• If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings:

a) Higher number of points obtained in the matches played between the teams in question;

b) Superior goal difference resulting from the matches played between the teams in question;

c) Higher number of goals scored in the matches played between the teams in question;

d) If, after having applied criteria a) to c), two teams still have an equal ranking, criteria a) to c) are reapplied exclusively to the matches between the two teams in question to determine the final rankings of the two teams. If this procedure does not lead to a decision, criteria e) to i) apply in the order given;

e) superior goal difference in all group matches;

f) higher number of goals scored in all group matches;

g) position in the UEFA national team coefficient ranking system (see annex I, paragraph 1.2.2);

h) fair play conduct of the teams (final tournament);

i) drawing of lots

• The Group B coefficients are as follows:

Netherlands 40.860

Germany 40.446

Portugal 31.717

Denmark 31.205

• If two teams which have the same number of points, the same number of goals scored and conceded play their last group match against each other and are still equal at the end of that match, the ranking of the two teams in question is determined by kicks from the penalty mark provided no other teams within the group have the same number of points on completion of all group matches. Should more than two teams have the same number of points, the criteria listed under paragraph 8.07 apply.

Match facts

DENMARK

- Denmark have won seven of their last ten matches.
- Nicklas Bendtner marked his 50th cap by taking his tally to 20 international goals against Portugal.
- Denmark have lost 13 of the 14 UEFA European Championship games when they have fallen behind, winning the other against Belgium in 1984. They have never lost a UEFA European Championship final tournament game after scoring first, winning six and drawing four.
- Michael Krohn-Dehli has registered in five games for Denmark and his side have won all of them. The midfielder has scored four goals in his last nine internationals.
- Simon Poulsen, William Kvist, Lars Jacobsen and Jakob Poulsen are a booking away from a suspension.

Injury news

- Dennis Rommedahl (hamstring) and Niki Zimling (calf) went off with injuries against Portugal. Defender Jores Okore injured his left knee in training on 14/06.
- First-choice keeper Thomas Sørensen was ruled out of UEFA EURO 2012 due to a back injury sustained during the 3-1 friendly defeat by Brazil on 26/05; Kasper Schmeichel took his place in the final squad.

Miscellaneous

- Andreas Bjelland will join Dutch side FC Twente after UEFA EURO 2012.
- If Denmark triumph in Poland/Ukraine, the uncapped Schmeichel will follow in the footsteps of dad Peter, who inspired the country to glory in 1992. They would be the first father and son to win the UEFA European Championship.
- There are three survivors in the squad from the last time Denmark reached the UEFA European Championship finals under Morten Olsen in 2004: Stephan Andersen, Christian Poulsen and Rommedahl. Another veteran of that tournament in Portugal, Ebbe Sand, is now Denmark's forwards coach.
- The Danish squad began arriving at their training camp in Elsinore, the eastern town where Shakespeare's Hamlet was set, on 17/05. More players joined up the following week after the conclusion of the Danish top flight. On 04/06 the squad arrived at their tournament base of Kolobrzeg on the Baltic coast.

- Bjelland scored his first international goal against Australia; Lars Jacobsen won his 50th cap.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Jacobsen scored his first goal in his 45th international appearance as Denmark beat Cyprus 4-1 on 07/10/2011.
- Jacobsen, Christian Eriksen and Rommedahl were all ever-present during qualifying. Four of the final tournament squad did not feature in qualifying: Schmeichel, Andersen, Okore and Tobias Mikkelsen.
- Denmark scored 15 goals in qualifying, the second fewest of all the finalists behind Greece (14) and level with the Czech Republic and France. Olsen's side did, however, play two matches fewer than all those sides.
- Bendtner and Rommedahl were Denmark's leading scorers in qualifying with three goals apiece.
- Denmark qualified as Group H winners thanks to a 2-1 defeat of Portugal in Copenhagen in the final round of matches. They won all four of their home qualifiers, conceding just a lone Cristiano Ronaldo goal in the process.
- Once a place in Poland and Ukraine had been confirmed, Olsen went back on his 2010 decision to step down after UEFA EURO 2012, agreeing a deal until after the next FIFA World Cup.

Domestic information

- Bjelland, Okore and Mikkelsen were all part of the FC Nordsjælland side that claimed their maiden championship, Bjelland completing a 3-0 victory over AC Horsens on the final day to hold off FC København.
- Jacobsen and København gained some consolation as they beat Horsens 1-0 in the Danish Cup final on 17/05.
- Eriksen missed one game as AFC Ajax claimed their 31st Dutch championship.
- Daniel Agger lifted the English League Cup with Liverpool FC in February, beating Cardiff City FC in the final.

GERMANY

- Lukas Podolski, 27, is in line for his 100th cap against Denmark. He would become West Germany/Germany's seventh centurion after Thomas Hassler, Franz Beckenbauer, Jürgen Kohler, Jürgen Klinsmann, Miroslav Klose and Lothar Matthäus.
- Jérôme Boateng is suspended after bookings in Germany's first two games; Holger Badstuber is a yellow card away from a ban.
- The Denmark game will be Joachim Löw's 82nd as Bundestrainer – he is behind only Berti Vogts (102), Helmut Schön (139) and Sepp Herberger (167) in longevity as West Germany/Germany coach and has won 55, lost 12.
- Of Mario Gomez's six shots on goal at UEFA EURO 2012, four have been on target and three have gone in.
- Gomez was in possession of the ball for just 18 seconds of the game against the Netherlands but scored two goals.
- Germany have won all 13 UEFA European Championship games in which they have been two goals up.
- Goalkeepers Ron-Robert Zieler and Tim Wiese are yet to make a competitive appearance for Germany.

Miscellaneous

- The squad gathered at a camp in Sardinia on 11/05, with the Borussia Dortmund contingent linking up on 18/05 after the German Cup as the party moved to Tourrettes, France. The FC Bayern München players arrived on 26/05 following the UEFA Champions League final. The squad had three days off before heading to Gdansk on 04/06.
- Klose has scored 63 goals for Germany, just five shy of Gerd Müller's national record.
- Six Germany players have UEFA European Championship experience: Philipp Lahm (2004, 2008), Per Mertesacker (2008), Bastian Schweinsteiger (2004, 2008), Klose (2004, 2008), Podolski (2004, 2008) and Gomez (2008).

- Gomez scored a late winner on 22/05 as Bayern beat the Netherlands 3-2 in an unofficial friendly in Munich.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Germany won ten out of ten in Group A, becoming one of only five sides to go through a qualifying campaign with a 100% record in the history of the UEFA European Championship.
- Germany were the second highest scorers in qualifying, their 34 goals in ten games only three shy of the Netherlands.
- Manuel Neuer played every minute of qualifying, while Lahm played all but the last six as he was substituted against Belgium. Thomas Müller was Germany's only other ever-present.
- Germany conceded fewer fouls than any other side in qualifying.
- Three of the final tournament squad did not feature in qualifying: Wiese, Zieler and Lars Bender.

Domestic information

- Neuer, Lahm, Boateng, Schweinsteiger, Toni Kroos, Müller and Gomez all started as Bayern lost the UEFA Champions League final to Chelsea on 19/05. Müller scored in a 1-1 draw and Lahm, Gomez and Neuer all converted penalties before Schweinsteiger was crucially denied in a 4-3 shoot-out defeat.
- Mats Hummels, Marcel Schmelzer, İlkay Gündoğan and Mario Götze helped Dortmund to the first domestic double in the club's history, with Hummels scoring a penalty against Bayern in the German Cup final on 12/05.
- Gomez's 26 goals this season was his second highest return in the Bundesliga – two shy of his 28 last term – while Podolski and Marco Reus registered personal bests with 18 goals.
- Gomez scored 12 goals in the UEFA Champions League – including four in the 7-0 triumph over FC Basel 1893 – to finish second highest scorer behind Lionel Messi (14). In any other season the return would have earned top spot.
- Mesut Özil and Sami Khedira helped Real Madrid CF win the Spanish Liga for the first time in four campaigns.

- A commanding central defender, he played most of his club football in Belgium, winning three national titles and the UEFA Cup with Anderlecht between 1980 and 1986.
- Twice crowned Danish Player of the Year, he was captain of the legendary 'Dynamite' team of the mid-1980s that reached two successive UEFA European Championships and the 1986 FIFA World Cup; became the first Danish footballer to reach 100 caps in an international career spanning 19 years.
- Went straight into coaching and proved an immediate success, leading Brøndby to two national titles and the 1990/91 UEFA Cup semi-finals – the furthest any Danish team had progressed in Europe.
- Moved on to coach former club Köln and then, following a two-year break, Ajax, where, assisted on the field by his former Denmark team-mate Michael Laudrup, he won a Dutch league and cup double in 1998.
- Appointed Denmark head coach in 2000 and led team to 2002 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2004. Enjoyed success again as Denmark topped their 2010 World Cup qualifying group, celebrating qualification with 1-0 win against Sweden in his 100th match in charge. Subsequently named Coach of the Year in Denmark, although his team failed to get out of their group in South Africa, but bounced back to lead them to UEFA EURO 2012 and agreed a new deal until 2014.

- A native of the Black Forest in south-west Germany, Löw spent most of his playing days with local club Freiburg, where he had three spells, before winding down his career in Switzerland.
- Operated as a player-coach in Switzerland before becoming an assistant, and later head coach, back in Germany with Stuttgart. Succeeded Rolf Fringer in 1996 and led the Swabian side to a German Cup win in his first season and the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final against Chelsea FC in his second.
- Left Stuttgart for Fenerbahçe but struggled to match his early success until he joined Tirol Innsbruck, guiding the team to the 2001/02 Austrian Bundesliga title.
- After nine months with Austria Wien he was summoned by old friend Jürgen Klinsmann to become his assistant with Germany. The pair led the Nationalmannschaft to a third-place finish on home soil at the 2006 FIFA World Cup.
- Replaced Klinsmann as head coach, taking the team to a runners-up spot at UEFA EURO 2008 and, subsequently, to the 2010 World Cup finals. There Germany again reached the semi-finals, ultimately claiming third place once more, and went on to win all ten UEFA EURO 2012 qualifiers with Löw subsequently signing a new two-year deal running until 2014.

• Carlos Velasco Carballo made his debut in the Spanish Liga in 2004 and has progressed rapidly through the ranks, getting his first taste of the UEFA Champions League group stage in the FC Shakhtar Donetsk-FK Partizan game in September 2010.

• An engineer from Madrid, Velasco Carballo's first taste of European competition came in April 2005 when he was selected as fourth official for three UEFA European Under-19 Championship elite round games.

• Held the same role in qualifying for the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup from 2005/06 onwards, also working as fourth official at the UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier between Turkey and Malta in September 2006.

• Awarded his first UEFA Champions League refereeing appointment when Anorthosis Famagusta FC took on SK Rapid Wien in the second qualifying round in July 2008, the following June he oversaw his only 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier, a 2-2 draw between Cyprus and Montenegro.

• A regular as a referee in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League, where he oversaw six matches in total, Velasco Carballo was also entrusted with the Estonia-Italy fixture at the start of UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying in September 2010. He reached another career pinnacle when he was appointed to officiate at the 2010/11 UEFA Europa League final between FC Porto and SC Braga.

Competition facts

UEFA European Football Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Germany are the most competition's most successful side having lifted the trophy in 1972, 1980 (both as West Germany) and 1996, reaching the final in 1976, 1992 and 2008. Only Spain (1964, 2008) and France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has ever appeared in two victorious UEFA European Championship finals. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the finals as holders only to lose, while Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as coach of Germany in 1996, making him the only man to win as player and coach.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals – or better – three times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000) and Austria and Switzerland (2008).
- UEFA EURO 2012 is Germany's 11th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament – they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the seventh successive edition.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the eleventh time, one more than Russia. This is the ninth tournament for the Netherlands and Spain.
- Five teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including Spain and Germany this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004) and Czech Republic (2000).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- Spain are seeking to retain the trophy having already become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France won the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000. No team has ever won three consecutive world and continental titles.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals: for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller played in both matches, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinedine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry also achieved the feat for France.
- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success.
- Five players have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European triumph, while Nicolas Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate Christian Karembou holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.
- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.
- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to appear in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Jetro Willems became the youngest player to grace a UEFA European Championship when he started the Netherlands' opening Group B match against Denmark at UEFA EURO 2012. The PSV Eindhoven defender was aged 18 years and 71 days, breaking the record held by Belgium's Enzo Scifo, who was 18 years and 115 days against Yugoslavia in 1984.
- Five players have appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar and Lilian Thuram.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to score having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to strike in the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).

UEFA information

UEFA statement on Warsaw incidents

UEFA condemns the isolated incidents that occurred on Tuesday in Warsaw prior to and after the Poland-Russia match, when some groups of known troublemakers pelted the police with missiles and attacked fans irrespective of the team they were supporting. Those arrested and charged will have to be dealt with by the relevant authorities. UEFA's philosophy is to create a welcoming environment coupled with a low-profile approach to policing. The focus should be on facilitating the enjoyment of the matches by genuine football fans and isolating the tiny percentage of troublemakers. UEFA is in a constant dialogue with the public authorities in order to achieve this aim. UEFA is determined that the overwhelmingly peaceful and festive atmosphere that has so far pervaded at UEFA EURO 2012 will be continued right up to and including the final in Kyiv on Sunday 1 July.

Vigilance at training sessions

Further to an incident that occurred at a Dutch national team training session on 8 June, UEFA has written to the mayors of the Polish and Ukrainian cities where open training sessions are scheduled to take place to ask that all effective and necessary measures – including an increased police presence – be implemented to prevent any display of discriminatory or racist behaviour at such public sessions. UEFA has also requested that the authorities ensure that any person found to be engaging in racist behaviour be immediately ejected from the stadium and its vicinity, and that criminal proceedings be launched against such individuals. A letter was also sent to the sports minister of Poland, Joanna Mucha, to ask for the full support of the Polish authorities in dealing with these important matters. Any such behaviour is totally incompatible with UEFA's zero-tolerance policy towards any type of discriminatory conduct. UEFA is nevertheless confident that the local authorities will deal adequately with the issue.

Suspended points deduction for RFS

The UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body has decided to impose a deduction of six points on the Football Union of Russia (RFS) for the qualifying competition of the next UEFA European Championship. This decision is suspended for a probationary period running from now until the end of the play-offs for the UEFA EURO 2016 finals. The RFS has also been fined €120,000. The RFS was facing charges for the improper conduct of its supporters (crowd disturbances), the setting off and throwing of fireworks and the display of illicit banners at last Friday's UEFA EURO 2012 Group A match against the Czech Republic in Wroclaw. An appeal can be lodged against this decision within three days of the dispatch of the written decision.

Bendtner proceedings opened

UEFA has opened disciplinary proceedings against Denmark striker Nicklas Bendtner for improper conduct (Law 4 of the Laws of the Game) at the Group B match against Portugal in Lviv on 13 June. The UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body will hear this case on Monday 18 June.

DFB faces proceedings

UEFA has opened disciplinary proceedings against the German Football Association (DFB) following the Group B match against the Netherlands in Kharkiv. The DFB is charged with the setting-off of fireworks and the throwing of missiles by supporters. The UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body will deal with the case on Monday 18 June.

EURO Legends choose Carlsberg Man of the Match

Legends who have graced past EUROS will be making a key contribution to UEFA EURO 2012 by voting for and helping to present the Carlsberg Man of the Match Award at each of the 31 games in Poland and Ukraine – and fans will join them in deciding who wins the coveted prize each time. A EURO legend, invited by UEFA President Michel Platini, will be present at each match. A fan vote will be accessible via the UEFA.com match centre, and the EURO Legend will take into consideration the fans' vote before making the final decision on the most outstanding man on the field during the match. A glittering array of superstars are being lined up to decide who wins each UEFA EURO 2012 Carlsberg Man of the Match Award. Fernando Couto (Portugal), Christian Karembeu (France), Predrag Mijatović (Montenegro), Peter Schmeichel (Denmark), Allan Simonsen (Denmark), Davor Šuker (Croatia) and Patrick Vieira (France) are among those who will act as award ambassadors in Poland and Ukraine.

UEFA charity donation for EURO goals

Committed to providing improved access and facilities for disabled football fans, UEFA is donating €3,000 for every goal scored at UEFA EURO 2012 to the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE), the official tournament charity. As part of the Respect programme at UEFA EURO 2012, UEFA is working with CAFE to manage separate Respect Inclusion initiatives, and football followers and other benefactors are being encouraged to donate money for upcoming schemes. CAFE was set up via UEFA's CHF1m charity cheque in 2009 to promote and ensure equal access across UEFA's member national associations. It provides support, guidance and advice to partners and stakeholders, which include UEFA, national associations, leagues and clubs, disabled fans and disabled supporter groups.

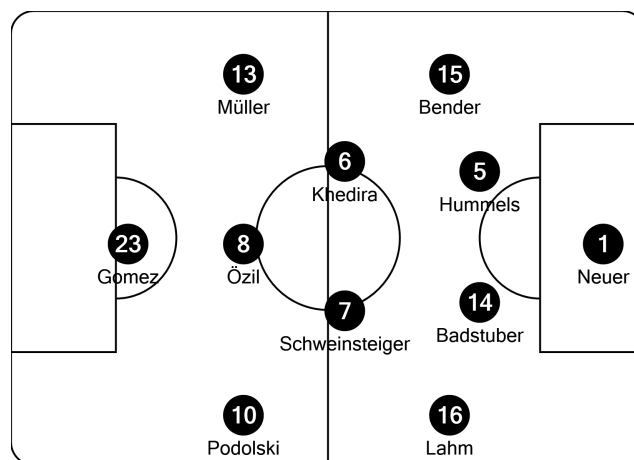

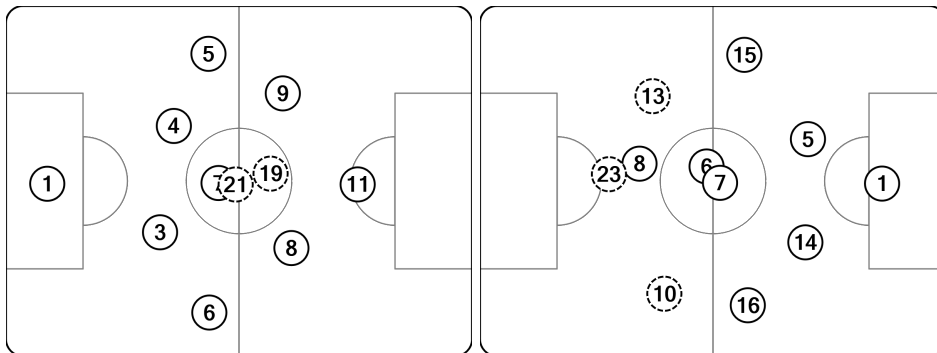

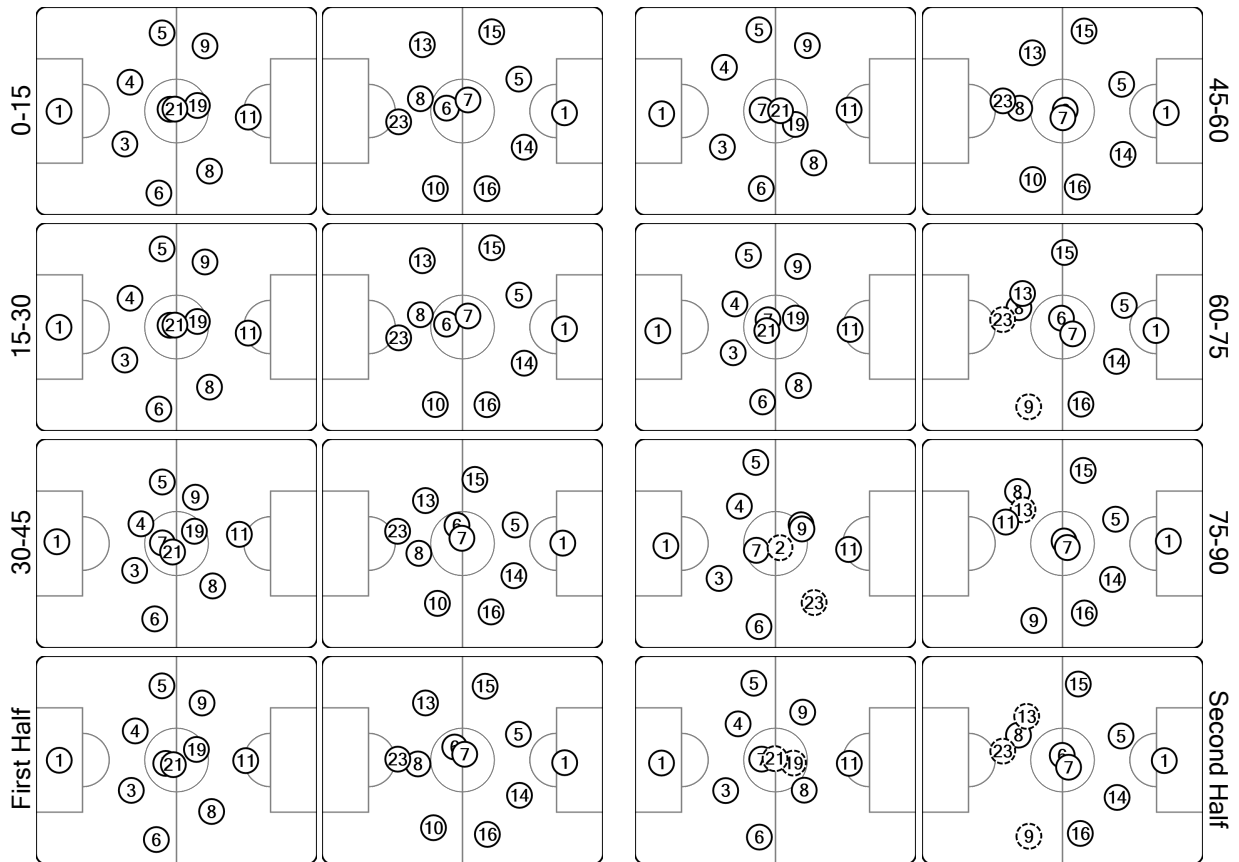
