Match background

Rafael Benítez will be looking to secure his first European trophy as FC Internazionale Milano coach when the UEFA Champions League holders face UEFA Europa League winners Club Atlético de Madrid in the UEFA Super Cup at Stade Louis II in Monaco.

UEFA Super Cup pedigree

- It is the first time since the 1998 edition, contested by Chelsea FC and Real Madrid CF, that both teams are competing in the fixture for the first time.
- Benítez has enjoyed UEFA Super Cup success before, his Liverpool FC side beating PFC CSKA Moskva 3-1 in 2005.
- Benítez had visited the Stade Louis II with Liverpool in November 2004, his side losing 1-0 to AS Monaco FC in the UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Benítez earned the right to play in the 2004 UEFA Super Cup after winning the UEFA Cup with Valencia CF, but left for Anfield before the game. In the event, Valencia – under Claudio Ranieri – beat FC Porto 2-1.
- Should Inter win, Benítez would become the sixth coach – and the first Spaniard – to win two UEFA Super Cups. The current five are:
 - Raymond Goethals (RSC Anderlecht 1976 and 1978)
 - Arrigo Sacchi (AC Milan 1989 and 1990)
 - Sir Alex Ferguson (Aberdeen FC 1983 and Manchester United FC 1991)
 - Louis van Gaal (AFC Ajax 1995 and FC Barcelona 1997)
 - Carlo Ancelotti (AC Milan 2003 and 2007)
- He would also be the third coach (after Sir Alex and Van Gaal) to win it with different clubs.
- Inter's Thiago Motta and Samuel Eto'o played in the 2006 UEFA Super Cup with Barcelona, losing 3-0 to Sevilla FC.
- Dejan Stanković was in the S.S. Lazio team which overcame Manchester United FC 1-0 in the 1999 UEFA Super Cup while three years later a Real Madrid CF team including Esteban Cambiasso defeated Feyenoord 3-1.
- Inter defender Maicon played for Monaco from 2004 until he headed for San Siro in 2006.
- This is the first time two Spanish coaches have contested a UEFA Super Cup, though in 1993 a pair of Italians met when Nevio Scala's Parma FC saw off Fabio Capello's Milan over two legs. Five years before two Dutchmen had been on opposite sides as Aad de Mos's KV Mechelen overcame Guus Hiddink's PSV Eindhoven.
- Since the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup was abolished in 1999, the UEFA Champions League holders have won half of the ten UEFA Super Cup editions.
- Inter's city rivals Milan are the most successful club in Super Cup history, their 3-1 win against Sevilla in 2007 making the Rossoneri the first team to lift the trophy five times. Juventus, twice, S.S. Lazio and Parma are the other Italian winners.
- Atlético's local rivals Real Madrid broke their duck with a 3-1 win against Feyenoord in 2002 having been beaten in 1998 and 2000. Barcelona are Spain's most successful Super Cup representatives with three triumphs, while Valencia have two titles and Sevilla one.

Match background

- This will be the clubs' first meeting in UEFA competition.
- Inter's 37 games against Spanish opponents in UEFA club competition (W13 D11 L13) feature one final played on neutral territory. They claimed the European Champion Clubs' Cup for the first time in 1964 with a 3-1 win against Real Madrid in Vienna.
- Inter ended a run of five UEFA club competition games against Spanish opponents without a win by beating Barcelona 3-1 in last season's UEFA Champions League semi-final first leg. They went on to win the tie 3-2 on aggregate en route to winning the title.
- Atlético beat Italian opponents to win their first major European title, defeating ACF Fiorentina 3-0 at Stuttgart's Neckarstadion in the 1961/62 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final after a 1-1 draw at Hampden Park, Glasgow, forced a replay.

- They have not played an Italian side since losing 5-2 on aggregate to Parma in a 1998/99 UEFA Cup semi-final – they eliminated AS Roma in the previous round.
- Atlético's record in 14 UEFA club competition games against Italian opposition is W6 D2 L6.
- Benítez's record in 14 European games against Spanish sides – two with Valencia and 12 with Liverpool – is W7 D5 L2.
- Quique Sánchez Flores's seven games against Italian teams as a player – with Valencia, Madrid and Spain Under-21s – ended W2 D1 L4. Those defeats included a 5-1 UEFA Cup home loss to SSC Napoli in 1992 in which Quique Flores was sent off.
- As a coach for Valencia and SL Benfica, his record in six games against Serie A opposition is a more balanced W2 D2 L2.

Team ties

- Benítez will be playing his third successive UEFA club competition game against Atlético after his Liverpool side lost out to the Spanish team on away goals in last season's UEFA Europa League semi-finals. Diego Forlán was the scourge of the Reds, scoring the only goal in Madrid then hitting the decider in a 2-1 extra-time defeat at Anfield.
- Liverpool and Atlético drew 1-1 twice in the 2008/09 UEFA Champions League group stage, leaving Benítez with a W1 D2 L1 European record against the club.
- Benítez and Quique Flores were at Real Madrid in 1994/95, the former as reserve-team coach and the latter as a right-back. Both started their coaching career in the youth ranks at the Santiago Bernabéu, Benítez in 1986 and Quique Flores in 2001.
- The coaches' only previous competitive meeting prior to last season came when Madrid – featuring the Atlético coach as a player – beat Benítez's Real Valladolid CF side 4-1 on 3 January 1996.
- Benítez's record against Atlético as a coach in Spain with CF Extremadura, CD Tenerife and Valencia was W4 D1 L4.
- During his time as Valencia coach Quique Flores overcame Inter on away goals in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League first knockout round.
- Motta was briefly an Atlético player, making six league appearances – three as a substitute – in 2007/08. He was at Barcelona from 1999 to 2008.
- Tomáš Ujfaluši represented Fiorentina from 2004 until moving to the Spanish capital in 2008.
- Tiago is on loan at Atlético from Juventus, for whom he made 42 league appearances after joining in 2007. The midfielder initially signed for the Madrid club on loan in January, going on to make 18 Liga appearances last term, before a new one-year loan deal was agreed on 16 August.
- Four Inter players spent time with Atlético's local rivals Real Madrid: Esteban Cambiasso (1996-2004), Eto'o (1997-2000), Walter Samuel (2004-05) and Wesley Sneijder (2007-09). None played alongside Atlético's former Real Madrid players José Manuel Jurado (2005-06) and José Antonio Reyes (2006-07) during their time at the Santiago Bernabéu.
- Inter's Diego Milito played for Real Zaragoza from 2005 to 2008, while Victor Obinna spent last season on loan at Málaga CF.
- Eto'o spent 12 years in Spain, representing CD Leganés, Real Madrid, RCD Espanyol, RCD Mallorca and Barcelona before joining Inter in summer 2009.

- In their eighth Italian Super Cup, Inter equalled AC Milan's appearance record and registered their fifth win – also matching Milan's competition best.
- Inter have now won four of the last six editions of the Italian Super Cup.
- Samuel Eto'o's double against Roma made him the joint highest scorer in the competition alongside Alessandro Del Piero and Andriy Shevchenko with three goals. The Inter striker also scored in last season's 2-1 defeat by S.S. Lazio.
- The match was Rafael Benítez's first competitive fixture in charge of the Nerazzurri since replacing Real Madrid CF-bound José Mourinho in June.
- In May Inter became the first Italian team to win the UEFA Champions League, Serie A and Coppa Italia during the same season.
- Since 2005, Inter have collected five Serie A titles, three Coppa Italias, four Italian Super Cups and last season's UEFA Champions League – a total of 13 trophies.
- Twelve Inter players featured at the FIFA World Cup finals in South Africa. Wesley Sneijder reached the final with the Netherlands, knocking out a Brazil side including club-mates Julio César, Maicon and Lucio in the quarter-finals; Walter Samuel, Nicolás Burdisso and Diego Milito were in the Argentina side that also got to the last eight, as did Sulley Muntari with Ghana; the tournaments of Dejan Stanković (Serbia), Eto'o (Cameroon), David Suazo (Honduras) and Victor Obinna (Nigeria) all came to an end after the group stage.

- Five Inter players were nominated for the UEFA Club Football Awards held in Monaco on Thursday: Júlio César, Lucio, Maicon, Sneijder and Milito.
- On 9 August captain Javier Zanetti and UEFA Champions League final match-winner Milito signed new contracts until 2013 and 2014 respectively.
- Third-choice goalkeeper Paolo Orlandoni has also renewed his expiring contract for a further season.

- The Italian Super Cup game was Zanetti's 701st match for Inter, after he reached the 700 mark in last season's UEFA Champions League final. He is second only to Giuseppe Bergomi (758) on Inter's all-time appearance list in all competitions.

- Iván Córdoba entered the top ten for most Inter appearances last season and now ranks tenth on the list with 419 games.

Latest domestic information

- Los Rojiblancos warmed up for the UEFA Super Cup by taking part in the annual Trofeo Colombino. After a 1-0 reverse to Real Sporting de Gijón, Quique Sánchez Flores's side beat Uruguay's Wanderers FC 3-0 on 19 August, Diego Costa, José Antonio Reyes and Raúl García getting the goals.

- Last year's UEFA Europa League winners will test out a newly laid pitch at the Vicente Calderón when they host Sporting in their opening Liga encounter on 30 August.

- Diego Godín and Diego Forlán were part of the Uruguay side that finished fourth at the FIFA World Cup, the latter registering five goals and winning the Golden Ball as the tournament's best player. Argentina's Sergio Agüero and Portugal pair Simão and Tiago also featured at the finals.

- Atlético ended last season with two defeats, going down 3-0 at home to Getafe CF on 15 May – three days after their UEFA Europa League victory – before a 2-0 Copa del Rey final reverse to Sevilla FC four days later.

- On 11 May goalkeeper Sergio Asenjo underwent surgery on the cruciate knee ligament damage he had suffered three days previously.

- Juanito missed training on 24 August with a foot injury. Fran Mérida took part in the session despite a groin complaint.

- A midfielder for Real Madrid CF's reserve team and two other lower ranking sides, injury prompted an early move into coaching.
- Coached at youth and B-team level with Madrid, Benítez struck out on his own with Valladolid, Osasuna, Tenerife and Extremadura before getting his big break in 2001 at Valencia.
- Guided Valencia to the club's first league title for 31 years in 2002 and added a second championship two years later, when they also won the UEFA Cup.
- Joined Liverpool in June 2004, winning the UEFA Champions League in his first season, with his side beating AC Milan on penalties having come from 3-0 down in the final. Also won the 2006 FA Cup on penalties after trailing West Ham United FC 3-2 in stoppage time of the Cardiff showpiece.
- Took Liverpool to the top of the Premier League for two spells during 2008/09 but Manchester United FC retained their title. Left Anfield after six years in summer 2010, stepping into José Mourinho's shoes at Inter.

Club Atlético de Madrid: Quique Sánchez Flores

- Enjoyed some success as a player at Valencia, Madrid – where he won the Liga title in 1994/95 – and Zaragoza. He made 15 international appearances for Spain before becoming a media pundit.
- Turned his hand to coaching in 2003, leading Madrid to the youth title before moving across the city to newly promoted senior side Getafe, who enjoyed an impressive campaign, finishing 13th in 2004/05.
- Having spent ten years as a player at Valencia, Quique Flores was a popular choice to succeed Claudio Ranieri and duly took over at Mestalla in summer 2005. The signing of David Villa from Zaragoza proved inspired, the striker's 25 league goals helping Valencia finish third.
- The Spanish club went on to reach the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals in 2006/07 but a poor start to the following campaign cost Quique Flores his job in October 2007.
- Took charge of Benfica in May 2008 and led the Lisbon giants to third place in the Portuguese Liga in what proved his only season in charge. He left in June 2009 and was appointed Atlético coach four months later following the dismissal of Abel Resino, ending his first campaign on a high with UEFA Europa League final victory over Fulham FC.

• Massimo Busacca has steadily enhanced his reputation since succeeding Urs Meier on Switzerland's élite list, with the 2007 UEFA Cup final following the 2006 FIFA World Cup and the crowning glory in May 2009 when he took charge of the UEFA Champions League final.

• From Monte Carrasso, in the Italian-speaking southern canton of Ticino, Busacca reached the highest domestic level in 1996 and within three years was cutting his teeth in UEFA youth matches. He took charge of his first Swiss Cup final in May 2005.

• Busacca has long a UEFA Champions League regular, notably serving as fourth official to Meier for the 2002 final between Real Madrid CF and Bayer 04 Leverkusen at Hampden Park. He was back in Glasgow for the 2007 UEFA Cup final, won by Sevilla FC won 3-1 on penalties after a 2-2 draw against RCD Espanyol.

• He was also selected for UEFA EURO 2008, where he refereed the group matches between the Netherlands and Romania and Greece and Sweden and the Germany-Turkey semi-final.

• A company director and keen skier, Busacca was the referee for seven matches in the 2008/09 UEFA Champions League, culminating in FC Barcelona's 2-0 final defeat of Manchester United FC in Rome's Stadio Olimpico. Also selected for the 2010 World Cup and that year's UEFA Super Cup.

Venue guide

Venue guide

The Stade Louis II is set right on the Mediterranean coast, in the suburb of Fontvieille, a short distance from the cliffs of the Côte d'Azur. Although its capacity is a little under 20,000, the spectacular setting and stunning design make it one of the most impressive stadiums in French football.

The Stade Louis II is named after the grandfather of Monaco's late Prince Rainier III, who opened the ground in 1985. It is home to AS Monaco FC and, as such, no stranger to big European nights, notably in 1998 and 2004 when the local favourites reached the UEFA Champions League semi-finals. Since 1998 it has hosted the UEFA Super Cup, while the running track around the pitch is used for international athletics events.

Built near the site of the old Monaco stadium, the Stade Louis II was the brainchild of Prince Rainier III, who brought in top architects from Paris to construct the multi-storey sports complex. Much of the venue's facilities are underground, including its car park, swimming pools and gymnasias, all of this was built on land reclaimed from the Mediterranean in the early 1980s.

Supporters will find plenty of other attractions to distract them in glamorous Monte Carlo. Long a byword for jet-set excess, the famous Monte Carlo Casino – built in the 19th century and designed by Parisian architect Charles Garnier – remains an icon of old-world splendour. Guests must be smartly dressed, with a well-stuffed wallet and a steely nerve essential for anyone wishing to break the bank.

Those unwilling to gamble can take a punt on a day at Monaco's celebrated aquarium in Monaco-Ville, while other family-friendly options include the national museum near Larvotto beach and the Naval Museum featuring Prince Rainier III's private collection of scale models.

The splendour of Monaco's ruling House of Grimaldi can be sampled at the royal palace in Monaco-Ville, where the state Carabiniers perform the changing of the guard at 11.55CET every day. Monaco Cathedral is also worth a visit. Built on the ruins of a 13th-century chapel, it houses the tombs of, among others, Princess Grace – more widely known as Hollywood star Grace Kelly – mother of current Sovereign Prince Albert II.

Nightlife in Monaco has the reputation of being a glitzy merry-go-round, frequented by European royalty and international celebrities, epitomised by the discotheques and floor shows at the Monte Carlo Sporting Club, or the American Bar at the Hotel de Paris. Dining out is a lavish affair, but there are cheaper options around La Condamine and the old town.

Getting there

By air – Nice airport is 22km from the city.

Buses from Terminals 1 and 2 regularly make the 45-minute journey to Monte Carlo while a taxi may also be an option.

By train – Monaco-Monte Carlo station is a stop for many international trains and is connected to all the top resorts of the Côte d'Azur. The station is on avenue Prince-Pierre in La Condamine, adjoining Fontvieille where you will find the Stade Louis II.

By road – The principality is linked to all neighbouring countries by major motorways (principally the A8 highway). From Italy, take the 'Monaco-Roquebrune' exit. From France, take the '56 Monaco' exit.

Spain holds the record for the number of times their teams have participated in the competition with 15 (FC Barcelona 7, Real Madrid CF 3, Valencia CF 2, Sevilla FC 2, Real Zaragoza 1).

England have had 13 (Liverpool FC 5, Manchester United FC 3, Nottingham Forest FC 2, Arsenal FC 1, Aston Villa FC 1, Chelsea FC 1).

Most victories (by country): 9

Italian teams have recorded the most victories with nine (AC Milan 5, Juventus 2, S.S. Lazio 1, Parma FC 1), two ahead of both England and Spain.

Fastest goal: 5

The fastest goal scored in the UEFA Super Cup came in the 1987 decider when Rui Barros struck the only goal of the first leg after five minutes for FC Porto away to AFC Ajax. Porto won the return leg by the same margin to win 2-0 on aggregate.

Most victories (by club): 5

AC Milan lead the way with five victories in the competition (1989, 1990, 1994, 2003 and 2007), with FC Barcelona and Liverpool FC two behind.

Extra-time victors: 4

Four competitions have required extra time to decide the winner, Parma AC (1993, 2-1 versus AC Milan), Galatasaray SK (2000, 2-1 golden goal victory versus Real Madrid CF), Liverpool FC (2005, 3-1 versus PFC CSKA Moskva) and FC Barcelona (2009, 1-0 versus FC Shakhtar Donetsk).

Finals involving teams from the same country: 3

Before the all-Spanish affair in 2006, Italian sides had competed against each other in two finals with AC Milan defeating Sampdoria UC 3-1 on aggregate in the 1990 competition. Milan were involved in the decider three years later against Parma AC, but on this occasion the Rossoneri ended on the losing side, 2-1.

Hat-tricks: 1

To date, Terry McDermott is the only player to have scored three times in one UEFA Super Cup match having done so in a 17-minute spell either side of the interval in Liverpool FC's 6-0 defeat of Hamburger SV in the second leg of their 1977 fixture.

Penalty shoot-outs: 0

The UEFA Super Cup has yet to witness a penalty shoot-out to determine the winner of the competition.

Fastest goal: 7

For matches held in Monaco, Renato's seventh-minute opener for Sevilla in 2006 is the quickest goal in the UEFA Super Cup.

Most yellow cards: 7

Stefano Farina of Italy issued seven yellow cards in the 2006 UEFA Super Cup, including six Sevilla players: Frédéric Kanouté, Daniel Alves, Javi Navarro, Andrés Palop, Julien Escudé and Enzo Maresca. This equalled the seven given out by Austrian match official Günther Benkö in the 2000 UEFA Super Cup in which Galatasaray SK defeated Real Madrid CF 2-1. Madrid received four yellow cards to their opponents' three.

Most goals by a team: 3

Liverpool FC have scored on three occasions in their two Monaco finals, firstly in their 3-2 defeat of FC Bayern München in 2001, and then in their 2005 3-1 extra-time defeat of PFC CSKA Moskva. Real Madrid CF also matched Liverpool's tally in their 3-1 defeat of Feyenoord in 2002 as did Sevilla in the 2006 showpiece with a 3-0 defeat of FC Barcelona and AC Milan against Sevilla the following year.

Widest margin of victory: 3

Sevilla's defeat of Barcelona in 2006 set a new record, surpassing Real Madrid CF's 3-1 victory against Feyenoord in 2002. Liverpool FC matched that margin and scoreline in 2005, but only after extra time at PFC CSKA Moskva's expense.

Lowest total of goals: 1

There have been four 1-0 outcomes to date in the UEFA Super Cup. The first two finals ended with single-goal victories for Chelsea FC in 1998 and S.S. Lazio in 1999 at the expense of Real Madrid CF and Manchester United FC respectively. The other wins by a solitary goal came in 2003 when Andriy Shevchenko's tenth-minute goal for AC Milan accounted for FC Porto before Pedro Rodríguez's 115th-minute winner for FC Barcelona against FC Shakhtar Donetsk in 2009.

Own goals in a final: 1

The only own goal scored in a UEFA Super Cup final in Monaco came from Feyenoord's Patrick Paauwe 15 minutes into his team's 3-1 defeat by Real Madrid CF in 2002.

Red cards: 1

Manchester United FC midfielder Paul Scholes became the first player to be sent off in the history of the competition after receiving a second yellow card late on against FC Zenit St. Petersburg in the 2008 edition.

Scoreless draws: 0

No scoreless draws after 120 minutes have been recorded in the competition.

Competition history

The UEFA Super Cup was not staged in three seasons since its 1973 inception. In 1974, following political problems, FC Bayern München of the Federal Republic of Germany did not play 1. FC Magdeburg of the German Democratic Republic. Then in 1981, Liverpool FC and FC Dinamo Tbilisi failed to find a date to contest the competition. Following the Heysel tragedy on 29 May 1985, Juventus and Everton FC did not play the 1985 UEFA Super Cup.

European Champion Clubs' Cup winners: 17

Of the 34 previous editions of the UEFA Super Cup, the team who won the European Champion Clubs' Cup have triumphed on 17 occasions, most recently FC Barcelona in 2009. Since the UEFA Cup winners began to take part in 2000 following the disbanding of the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, five of the ten events have been won by the team who lifted the UEFA Cup the previous season.
