Match background

UEFA Europa League holders Club Atlético de Madrid will be looking to lift the UEFA Super Cup for the second time in three years when they tackle European champions Chelsea FC at the Stade Louis II in Monaco.

- Atlético will be aiming to join Juventus, RSC Anderlecht and Valencia CF as two-time victors after beating FC Internazionale Milano 2-0 in 2010, while UEFA Champions League winners Chelsea, with former Atlético captain Fernando Torres in their ranks, hope to lift the trophy for the second time. Their sole previous experience ended in victory against Spanish opposition as Real Madrid CF were defeated 1-0 in 1998, the first one-off match to be held in Monaco.
- Chelsea booked their place by winning the UEFA Champions League for the first time last term, Roberto Di Matteo's men overcoming FC Bayern München on penalties in Munich. Didier Drogba drew the Blues level at 1-1 with two minutes to go in normal time before a 4-3 shoot-out victory made them the first London club to claim the European crown.
- Diego Simeone's Atlético triumphed in the UEFA Europa League showpiece, seeing off fellow Liga side Athletic Club 3-0 in Bucharest. Falcao set up the win with a stunning pair of first-half strikes and Diego sealed the result five minutes from time.

Previous meetings

- The teams' only encounters came in the 2009/10 UEFA Champions League group stage when Chelsea took four points off their Spanish rivals to finish top of Group D. Atlético came third and transferred to the maiden edition of the UEFA Europa League, which they eventually won.
- Carlo Ancelotti's Chelsea won the first game 4-0 at Stamford Bridge, Salomon Kalou scoring twice (41, 52) before Frank Lampard (69) added another and Luis Perea (90+1) headed a Florent Malouda free-kick into his own net. The defeat prompted the departure of Atlético coach Abel Resino.
- The lineups for that fixture on 21 October 2009 were:

- With Quique Sánchez Flores at the helm, the Rojiblancos earned a 2-2 draw in the return, although the result ended their hopes of progress and secured Chelsea's spot in the knockout phase. Substitute Sergio Agüero put Atlético ahead after 66 minutes and registered again in the first minute of added time to salvage a point after Drogba (82, 88) had scored twice.

- Goalkeeper Sergio Asenjo is the only player left in the Atlético squad who featured in those games; Lampard, Malouda, Petr Čech, Branislav Ivanović, Ashley Cole, John Terry, Michael Essien and Daniel Sturridge are still at Chelsea.

Match background

- Chelsea are undefeated against Spanish opponents, home and away, in 13 competitive fixtures. Their last reverse was inflicted by FC Barcelona in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League round of 16, a 2-1 loss at Stamford Bridge.
- The Blues overcame Barcelona in last season's semi-finals, Drogba securing a 1-0 home win ahead of an epic 2-2 draw at the Camp Nou. Chelsea had faced Valencia in the group stage, triumphing 3-0 at home after a 1-1 draw in Spain.
- Overall Chelsea have faced Spanish sides 31 times, winning 14, drawing 11 and losing six, including their 1998 UEFA Super Cup win against Madrid.
- Atlético earned their place in the 2010 UEFA Super Cup by defeating English opposition in the inaugural UEFA Europa League final, Diego Forlán scoring twice in a 2-1 extra-time win against Fulham FC in Hamburg. That was their most recent contest with a Premier League club; they also recorded home and away wins against Liverpool FC in the semi-finals.

- Atlético have taken on English teams 20 times, winning seven, drawing eight and losing five.
- The Spanish side have won their last 12 matches in European competition, stretching back to a 2-0 loss to Udinese Calcio in last season's UEFA Europa League group phase.
- José Antonio Reyes and Agüero scored Atlético's goals in the 2-0 victory against Inter in the 2010 UEFA Super Cup. Diego Godín and Raúl García started the game for Atletico; Joel Robles, Mario Suárez and Diego Costa were unused substitutes.
- Gus Poyet scored the sole goal of Chelsea's only previous UEFA Super Cup appearance, against Madrid. Di Matteo played 63 minutes with his assistant Eddie Newton an unused substitute.
- Chelsea visited the Stade Louis II in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League semi-finals, losing the first leg 3-1 to AS Monaco FC in the principality and exiting after a 2-2 draw at Stamford Bridge.

- This will be the 15th consecutive edition of the UEFA Super Cup to be held in Monaco; following a decision by the UEFA Executive Committee last June, the 2013 Super Cup will take place in Prague's Eden Stadium, moving on to Cardiff in 2014 and Tbilisi the following year.

Team Ties

- Di Matteo and Simeone were on opposing sides when Chelsea lost 2-1 at home to S.S. Lazio in the 1999/2000 UEFA Champions League second group stage.
- Born in the Madrid suburb of Fuenlabrada, Chelsea forward Torres became Atlético's youngest captain at 19 and scored 84 goals in 214 Liga appearances for the Rojiblancos before joining Liverpool FC in 2007.
- Tiago struck four goals in 34 Premier League games for Chelsea between 2004 and 2006.
- Thibaut Courtois was loaned by Chelsea to Atlético last season shortly after signing from KRC Genk. The Belgian international – who featured in all but one of Atlético's Liga games and picked up a UEFA Europa League winners medal – will stay with the Spanish club for the coming campaign.
- Raul Meireles was team-mates with Cristian Rodríguez at FC Porto between 2008 and 2010, and with Falcao during 2009/10.
- Falcao and Rodríguez were on the losing side when Porto succumbed 1-0 at Chelsea in the UEFA Champions League group stage on 15 September 2009. The duo also featured in the return, Chelsea again winning 1-0.
- Juan Mata faced Atlético ten times while at Valencia CF, scoring once and emerging with a record of W2 D4 L4.
- Oriol Romeu made two appearances for Barcelona in 2010/11.
- Emre Belözoğlu scored five times in 58 league outings for Newcastle United FC between 2005 and 2008; he faced Chelsea five times in all competitions, with his record reading W1 D1 L3.
- Torres, Mata and Juanfran were in Spain's victorious UEFA EURO 2012 squad.
- Torres, Mata and Adrián López were part of the Spain side that defeated South Korea 4-1 in a pre-EURO friendly in Berne.
- Mata and Adrián were team-mates when eventual 2011 UEFA European Under-21 Championship winners Spain played out a 1-1 group stage draw with an England side that featured Daniel Sturridge and Ryan Bertrand.
- Filipe Luis' only cap for Brazil – a 0-0 FIFA World Cup qualifying draw against Venezuela in October 2009 – came with Chelsea's Ramires also in the side.

- Born in the Swiss city of Schaffhausen, Di Matteo started his career with the local club, scoring two goals in 50 league appearances over three seasons before moving to Zürich in 1991. Won the Swiss league title with Aarau in 1992/93, his sole season with the club, going on to a three-year spell at Lazio.
- Became Chelsea's record signing in 1996 and paid back a chunk of that €5.85m fee with goals in their 1997 FA Cup – after 42 seconds, then the fastest in the final's history – and 1998 English League Cup final victories. Scored the only goal of another FA Cup final triumph in 1999/2000, the last final at the old Wembley.
- Having won 34 caps for Italy, Di Matteo sustained a triple leg fracture in a UEFA Cup tie against FC St Gallen early in the 2000/01 campaign and was forced to retire in February 2002. Then-manager Claudio Ranieri asked him to lead out the team for the 2002 FA Cup Final, which Chelsea lost to Arsenal FC.
- Took charge of MK Dons in July 2008 and, having finished third in the English third tier, was appointed by West Brom the following summer. In his first season, led the club to second place in the Championship and promotion to the Premier League but sacked in February 2011.
- That June, Di Matteo returned to Chelsea as assistant manager to André Villas-Boas and, following the Portuguese coach's dismissal on 4 March 2012, was appointed as interim first-team coach for the remainder of the season. After guiding the Blues to FA Cup and UEFA Champions League glory, Di Matteo was confirmed as manager on a permanent basis that summer.

Club Atlético de Madrid: Diego Simeone

- A native of Buenos Aires, he launched his career as a combative midfielder with Vélez Sarsfield and was a full Argentinian international at 18, making his debut in July 1988 in a friendly against Australia.
- Moved abroad in 1990 to play in Italy's Serie A for Pisa; two years later he left for Spanish club Sevilla FC, where he played under Argentina's 1986 FIFA World Cup-winning coach Carlos Bilardo and – for one season – alongside another illustrious compatriot, Diego Maradona.
- Joined Atlético in 1994 and won the Spanish domestic double with the club in his second season – the first major club honours of his career, to add to two Copa América titles (1991 and 1993) plus the 1992 FIFA Confederations Cup with Argentina.
- Enjoyed further success after returning to Italy, winning the UEFA Cup with Inter, plus the UEFA Super Cup and Serie A and Coppa Italia double in his debut campaign with Lazio (1999/2000). After four years in Rome, he returned to Madrid for a second spell with Atlético, where he remained for two seasons before ending his playing career back home in Argentina with Racing Club.
- A participant at three successive World Cups for Argentina (1994-2002), he retired as his country's most-capped player with 106 appearances and 11 goals.
- Started coaching career with Racing Club and won Argentinian titles with both Estudiantes (2006 Apertura) and River Plate (2008 Clausura); brief spells at San Lorenzo, Italian club Catania and Racing (again) preceded his appointment in December 2011 at Atlético, where he was brought in to replace Gregorio Manzano and succeeded in steering the club to their second UEFA Europa League final in three years.

- Damir Skomina has steadily worked his way up the ranks both in his native Slovenia, where he has taken charge of three cup finals, and abroad. Cut his teeth in international football at the 2003 UEFA European Under-17 Championship and made his UEFA Cup bow in October 2003, his first UEFA Champions League qualifying appearance coming the following July.

- Fourth official for the 2003 U17 and 2005 European U19 Championship showpieces, Skomina was the youngest official at the 2007 U21 finals in the Netherlands. There he oversaw three games, concluding with the hosts' 4-1 win against Serbia in the final.

- A father of two sons who works in real estate, Skomina continued his rise to prominence by taking charge of three UEFA EURO 2008 qualifiers. He was fourth official at three matches at the finals, also overseeing two fixtures at that August's Olympic Games.

- Skomina made his UEFA Champions League group stage bow on matchday three of 2008/09 as PSV Eindhoven took on Olympique de Marseille and has since become a regular in that competition and the UEFA Europa League. Ended the 2010/11 season by taking charge of the Slovenian Cup final.

- Having overseen three UEFA EURO 2012 qualifiers, Skomina took charge of three matches in Poland and Ukraine and was fourth official for the Spain-Portugal semi-final. The 2012/13 campaign started with him being appointed for the Slovenian Super Cup and then the UEFA Super Cup between Chelsea FC and Club Atlético de Madrid in Monaco.

Venue guide

The Stade Louis II is set right on the Mediterranean coast, in the suburb of Fontvieille, a short distance from the cliffs of the Côte d'Azur. Although its capacity is a little under 20,000, the spectacular setting and stunning design make it one of the most impressive stadiums in French football.

The Stade Louis II is named after the grandfather of Monaco's late Prince Rainier III, who opened the ground in 1985. It is home to AS Monaco FC and, as such, no stranger to big European nights, notably in 1998 and 2004 when the local favourites reached the UEFA Champions League semi-finals. Since 1998 it has hosted the UEFA Super Cup, while the running track around the pitch is used for international athletics events.

Built near the site of the old Monaco stadium, the Stade Louis II was the brainchild of Prince Rainier III, who brought in top architects from Paris to construct the multi-storey sports complex. Much of the venue's facilities are underground, including its car park, swimming pools and gymnasias, all of this was built on land reclaimed from the Mediterranean in the early 1980s.

Supporters will find plenty of other attractions to distract them in glamorous Monte Carlo. Long a byword for jet-set excess, the famous Monte Carlo Casino – built in the 19th century and designed by Parisian architect Charles Garnier – remains an icon of old-world splendour. Guests must be smartly dressed, with a well-stuffed wallet and a steely nerve essential for anyone wishing to break the bank.

Those unwilling to gamble can take a punt on a day at Monaco's celebrated aquarium in Monaco-Ville, while other family-friendly options include the national museum near Larvotto beach and the Naval Museum featuring Prince Rainier III's private collection of scale models.

The splendour of Monaco's ruling House of Grimaldi can be sampled at the royal palace in Monaco-Ville, where the state Carabiniers perform the changing of the guard at 11.55CET every day. Monaco Cathedral is also worth a visit. Built on the ruins of a 13th-century chapel, it houses the tombs of, among others, Princess Grace – more widely known as Hollywood star Grace Kelly – mother of current Sovereign Prince Albert II.

Nightlife in Monaco has the reputation of being a glitzy merry-go-round, frequented by European royalty and international celebrities, epitomised by the discotheques and floor shows at the Monte Carlo Sporting Club, or the American Bar at the Hotel de Paris. Dining out is a lavish affair, but there are cheaper options around La Condamine and the old town.

Getting there

By air – Nice airport is 22km from the city.

Buses from Terminals 1 and 2 regularly make the 45-minute journey to Monte Carlo while a taxi may also be an option.

By train – Monaco-Monte Carlo station is a stop for many international trains and is connected to all the top resorts of the Côte d'Azur. The station is on avenue Prince-Pierre in La Condamine, adjoining Fontvieille where you will find the Stade Louis II.

By road – The principality is linked to all neighbouring countries by major motorways (principally the A8 highway). From Italy, take the 'Monaco-Roquebrune' exit. From France, take the '56 Monaco' exit.

Most finalists (by country): 17

Spain holds the record for the number of times their teams have participated in the competition with 17 (FC Barcelona 8, Real Madrid CF 3, Valencia CF 2, Sevilla FC 2, Real Zaragoza 1, Club Atlético de Madrid 1).

England have had 13 (Liverpool FC 5, Manchester United FC 3, Nottingham Forest FC 2, Arsenal FC 1, Aston Villa FC 1, Chelsea FC 1) as have Italy (AC Milan 7, Juventus 2, FC Internazionale Milano 1, Parma FC 1, S.S. Lazio 1, UC Sampdoria 1).

Most victories (by country): 9

Italian and Spanish teams have recorded the most victories with nine each (Italy: AC Milan 5, Juventus 2, S.S. Lazio 1, Parma FC 1; Spain: FC Barcelona 4, Valencia CF 2, Real Madrid CF 1, Sevilla FC 1, Club Atlético de Madrid 1), two more than England.

Fastest goal: 5

The fastest goal scored in the UEFA Super Cup came in the 1987 decider when Rui Barros struck the only goal of the first leg after five minutes for FC Porto away to AFC Ajax. Porto won the return leg by the same margin to win 2-0 on aggregate.

Most victories (by club): 5

AC Milan lead the way with five victories in the competition (1989, 1990, 1994, 2003 and 2007), with FC Barcelona and Liverpool FC two behind.

Extra-time victors: 4

Four competitions have required extra time to decide the winner, Parma AC (1993, 2-1 versus AC Milan), Galatasaray SK (2000, 2-1 golden goal victory versus Real Madrid CF), Liverpool FC (2005, 3-1 versus PFC CSKA Moskva) and FC Barcelona (2009, 1-0 versus FC Shakhtar Donetsk).

Finals involving teams from the same country: 3

Before the all-Spanish affair between FC Barcelona and Sevilla FC in 2006, Italian sides had competed against each other in two finals with AC Milan defeating UC Sampdoria 3-1 on aggregate in the 1990 competition. Milan were involved in the decider three years later against Parma AC, but on this occasion the Rossoneri ended on the losing side, 2-1.

Hat-tricks: 1

Terry McDermott is the only player to have scored three times in one UEFA Super Cup match having done so in a 17-minute spell either side of the interval in Liverpool FC's 6-0 defeat of Hamburger SV in the second leg of their 1977 fixture.

Penalty shoot-outs: 0

The UEFA Super Cup has never had a penalty shoot-out to determine the winner of the competition.

For matches held in Monaco, Renato's seventh-minute opener for Sevilla in 2006 is the quickest goal.

Most yellow cards: 7

Stefano Farina of Italy issued seven yellow cards in the 2006 UEFA Super Cup, equalling the seven given out by Austrian match official Günther Benkö in the 2000 UEFA Super Cup in which Galatasaray SK defeated Real Madrid CF 2-1.

Most goals by a team: 3

Liverpool FC have scored on three occasions in their two Monaco finals, firstly in their 3-2 defeat of FC Bayern München in 2001, and then in their 2005 3-1 extra-time defeat of PFC CSKA Moskva. Real Madrid CF also matched Liverpool's tally in their 3-1 defeat of Feyenoord in 2002 as did Sevilla in the 2006 showpiece with a 3-0 defeat of FC Barcelona and AC Milan against Sevilla the following year.

Widest margin of victory: 3

Sevilla's defeat of Barcelona in 2006 set a new record, surpassing Real Madrid CF's 3-1 victory against Feyenoord in 2002. Liverpool FC matched that margin and scoreline at PFC CSKA Moskva's expense in 2005, but after extra time.

Lowest total of goals: 1

There have been four 1-0 results. The first two finals ended with single-goal victories for Chelsea FC in 1998 and S.S. Lazio in 1999 against Real Madrid CF and Manchester United FC respectively. The other wins by a solitary goal came in 2003 when Andriy Shevchenko's tenth-minute goal for AC Milan accounted for FC Porto before Pedro Rodríguez's 115th-minute winner for FC Barcelona against FC Shakhtar Donetsk in 2009.

Own goals in a final: 1

The only own goal scored in a UEFA Super Cup final in Monaco came from Feyenoord's Patrick Paauwe 15 minutes into his team's 3-1 defeat by Real Madrid CF in 2002.

Red cards: 3

Manchester United FC midfielder Paul Scholes became the first player to be sent off in the history of the competition against FC Zenit St Petersburg in 2008. FC Porto's Rolando and Fredy Guarín were both sent off in 2011.

Scoreless draws: 0

No scoreless draws after 120 minutes have been recorded in the competition.

Competition history

The UEFA Super Cup was not staged in three seasons since its 1973 inception. In 1974, following political problems, FC Bayern München of the Federal Republic of Germany did not play 1. FC Magdeburg of the German Democratic Republic. Then in 1981, Liverpool FC and FC Dinamo Tbilisi failed to find a date to contest the competition. Following the Heysel tragedy on 29 May 1985, Juventus and Everton FC did not play the 1985 UEFA Super Cup.

European Cup winners: 18

Of the 35 previous editions of the UEFA Super Cup, the team who won the European Cup have triumphed on 18 occasions, most recently FC Barcelona in 2011. Since the UEFA Cup winners began to take part in 2000 following the disbanding of the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, six of the 11 events have been won by the team who lifted the UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League the previous season.
