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Match background

The Netherlands will look to end a 30-year wait for a win against Italy when they take on the world champions in their opening UEFA EURO 2008™ match in Berne.

- Not since the 1978 FIFA World Cup have the Oranje got the better of Italy but Marco van Basten's men will be desperate to put recent history to be specific, eight games without beating the Azzurri behind them in the sides' first test in a tough-looking Group C that also includes France and Romania.
- It was in Buenos Aires on 21 June 1978 that the Dutch last beat Italy, winning 2-1 in the teams' final game of the second group stage to secure a place in the World Cup final. Italy had taken the lead through an Ernie Brandts own goal but Brandts himself restored parity before Arie Haan struck the Netherlands' winner.
- Italy have held the upper hand over the ensuing three decades, during which they have recorded two draws and six wins against the Oranje, including a penalty shoot-out triumph following a goalless semi-final at UEFA EURO 2000TM.
- Despite playing against ten men from the 34th minute when Gianluca Zambrotta was sent off, the tournament co-hosts paid the price for two missed penalties during normal time.
- Frank de Boer was denied by goalkeeper Francesco Toldo and Patrick Kluivert then struck a post. Come the deciding shoot-out, the Italians prevailed 3-1 with Luigi Di Biagio, Gianluca Pessotto and Francesco Totti all converting their kicks while Toldo foiled De Boer again and Paul Bosvelt and Jaap Stam missed the target.

- Italy won 3-1 when the teams met again in Amsterdam on 12 November 2005. After falling behind to Ryan Babel's 37th-minute opener, the Azzurri replied with three goals in nine minutes from Alberto Gilardino (40), Mauro Camoranesi (45) and Luca Toni (49).

- The Netherlands did get the better of Italy in qualifying for the quarter-finals of the 1976 UEFA European Championship, topping their group after beating the Azzurri 3-1 at home and losing 1-0 away.
- The overall record in head-to-head meetings between the countries is eight wins for Italy, two for the Netherlands and five draws.
- The Netherlands qualified as the second-placed team in Group G behind Romania with a record of W8 D2 L2. They sealed their finals' berth with a game to spare, albeit in less than spectacular fashion – beating Luxembourg 1-0 in Rotterdam.
- Van Basten led the Dutch to the last 16 at the 2006 World Cup where they lost 1-0 to Portugal. He was a key member of the Oranje team that took the European crown in 1988, scoring five goals including a spectacular second in the 2-0 final victory against the USSR.
- This is the Netherlands' sixth consecutive UEFA European Championship finals appearance and besides their 1988 triumph, they were semi-finalists in 1992, 2000 and 2004.
- Italy qualified for their fourth successive EURO as Group B winners, securing their passage to Austria-Switzerland with a 2-1 victory in Scotland in their penultimate fixture. Coach Roberto Donadoni, newly installed in place of the World Cup-winning Marcello Lippi, oversaw a record of nine wins, two draws and just one defeat – 3-1 against France in September 2006.
- Italy won their fourth World Cup at Germany 2006 but they have only won the UEFA European Championship once - beating Yugoslavia 2-0 in a replayed final in Rome in 1968 following a 1-1 draw. They were runners-up in 2000 and semi-finalists in 1988 with a team featuring Donadoni himself.
- As a player, Van Basten never beat Italy featuring in three defeats and one draw without finding the net once. His counterpart Donadoni appeared on the winning side in two of those matches, a 1-0 home win in September 1990 and a 3-2 away success in September 1992.
- Van Basten and Donadoni played together in the AC Milan team which won the European Champion Clubs' Cup in 1989. The former was also in Milan's European Cup-winning team the next year while Donadoni appeared in their 1994 triumph.
- Donadoni also featured in the 1995 UEFA Champions League final where he finished on the losing side against an AFC Ajax team that included Dutch international Edwin van der Sar.
- Van der Sar also played against a Juventus side featuring Italy forward Alessandro Del Piero in the 1996 UEFA Champions League final and subsequently played alongside Del Piero at the Turin club from 1999-2001.
- This is the 13th edition of the UEFA European Championship and the eighth edition that features a final tournament with a group phase.

- Only Ryan Babel appeared in all 12 matches in qualifying Group G, while Joris Mathijsen played eleven times.
- Of the final 23-man squad, only Henk Timmer did not feature in qualifying.
- Robin van Persie was the Netherlands' top scorer in qualifying with four goals, two more than Ruud van Nistelrooy and Wesley Sneijder. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- Sneijder had 18 shots on goal in qualifying. Cristiano Ronaldo led the way in that respect with 31.
- The Netherlands scored only 15 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.25 goals per game the lowest total of the qualified teams. Germany were top scorers with 35.
- · Marco van Basten's side conceded only five times, however, sharing the best defensive record in qualifying with the Czech Republic and France.
- Only Portugal, with 101, managed more shots on goal in qualifying than the Netherlands' total of 93 at an average of 7.75 shots per game.

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Latest information

- On 13 May it was announced that Clarence Seedorf had asked to be withdrawn from the Netherlands squad for UEFA EURO 2008™ following a telephone conversation with coach Marco van Basten.
- The Dutch squad had training camps in Noordwijk and Hoenderloo in the Netherlands before arriving at their Swiss base near Lausanne on 3 June.

Injury news

- Seedorf's withdrawal and fitness concerns surrounding fellow defenders André Ooijer and Mario Melchiot meant a chance for Khalid Boulahrouz, who was called up to the initial 30-man squad as cover. The 26-year-old was not named in the final 23 announced on 27 May, but returned four days later in place of the unfortunate Ryan Babel.
- Babel was forced to withdraw after tearing ankle ligaments in training at Hoenderloo on 31 May, and his departure was not the last of Van Basten's problems. Tim de Cler (twisted right knee) and Wesley Sneijder (hamstring) have both had niggles, while Van Persie was training separately to rest of the squad until 4 June.
- Arjen Robben will sit out the Italy game after suffering a groin injury in training on Saturday morning.
- Melchiot has been struggling to shake off a minor pelvic problem which has ruled him out of training since Thursday evening.

Domestic information

- Edwin van der Sar was the hero as Manchester United FC claimed the UEFA Champions League in May, making the decisive save to deny Nicolas Anelka in the penalty shoot-out. Ten days earlier he and United had clinched the English Premier League crown.
- Ibrahim Afellay is the only member of PSV Eindhoven's title-winning squad on duty with the Netherlands in Austria and Switzerland.
- Feyenoord trio Henk Timmer, De Cler and Giovanni van Bronckhorst helped the club to their eleventh Dutch Cup with a 2-0 against Roda JC, while Maarten Stekelenburg, John Heitinga and Klaas-Jan Huntelaar were in the Ajax side that clinched the Dutch Super Cup at the start of the campaign.
- Three members of the Netherlands squad helped Real Madrid CF successfully defend their Primera División title, with Sneijder, Van Nistelrooy and Robben contributing 29 goals of the side's 84 league goals between them. At the start of the season Madrid had lost out to a Sevilla FC side including Boulahrouz in the Spanish Super Cup.
- Jan Vennegoor of Hesselink was on target 15 times as Celtic FC finished top of the Scottish Premier League.
- On 26 May Heitinga sealed a €10m move from Ajax to Club Atlético de Madrid, agreeing a reported five-year contract.

- No Italy players appeared in all 12 matches in qualifying Group B, although Gianluigi Buffon, the injured Fabio Cannavaro and Andrea Pirlo all played eleven matches.
- Of the final 23-man squad, only Morgan De Sanctis and Marco Borriello did not feature in qualifying.
- Luca Toni was Italy's top scorer in qualifying with five goals, two more than Filippo Inzaghi, who misses out on the finals. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- Pirlo provided six assists in qualifying, fewer only than Ján Kozák of Slovakia who set up the most goals.
- Gennaro Gattuso committed 25 fouls in qualifying. Jan Koller was penalised the most having been pulled up 36 times.
- Italy scored 22 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.83 goals per game. Germany led the way overall, finding the net 35 times.

- Italy conceded nine times, fewer only than Poland (12 goals), Turkey (eleven) and Greece and Portugal (both ten) of the 16 teams who will be at UEFA EURO 2008™.
- In qualifying the Azzurri managed 79 shots on goal at an average of 6.58 shots per game. Portugal led the way with 101 shots on goal.
- Of the qualified teams only Greece, with 56, won fewer corners in qualifying than Italy's total of 59.
- Italy were caught offside 35 times, fewer only than Romania with 36 of the qualified nations.

Latest information

- The Italy squad convened at the training complex of Coverciano, Florence on 25 May before travelling to their Swiss base in Modling on 2 June.
- In the absence of the injured Cannavaro, Buffon was named the Azzurri's captain for UEFA EURO 2008™.

Injury news

- Cannavaro was ruled out of the finals after rupturing ligaments in his left ankle during the Azzurri's first training session in Modling on 2 June. He sustained the knock following a tackle by fellow defender Giorgio Chiellini.
- ACF Fiorentina's Gamberini was named as Cannavaro's replacement. The 26-year-old has won just two caps, both in friendlies this season, compared to Cannavaro's haul of 116.
- Christian Panucci limped out of training on Friday with a right knee injury.
- Vincenzo laquinta dropped out of the reckoning after sustaining a thigh injury in April.

Miscellaneous

- Roberto Donadoni, who replaced Marcello Lippi as Azzurri coach in summer 2006, signed a new two-year contract on 4 June.
- When Italy played the Netherlands in the semi-finals of UEFA EURO 2000™ with the Azzurri winning through on penalties, Simone Perrotta was doing his military service.

Domestic information

- Marco Materazzi is the only member of FC Internazionale Milano's Scudetto-winning side to make Italy's UEFA EURO 2008™ squad.
- Four of the Azzurri squad were in the AS Roma side that had to settle for second place in Serie A behind Inter Panucci, Daniele De Rossi, Perrotta and Alberto Aquliani. They gained a measure of revenge in the Coppa Italia, however, beating the Nerazzurri 2-1 in the final.
- Gennaro Gattuso, Massimo Ambrosini and Andrea Pirlo finished fifth with AC Milan, a disappointing end to a season that had begun with victories in the UEFA Super Cup and the FIFA Club World Cup.
- On 31 May the Rossoneri announced that they had completed the signing of Gianluca Zambrotta from FC Barcelona.
- There are two domestic double winners in Italy's midst Fabio Grosso and Luca Toni. Grosso helped Olympique Lyonnais achieve the feat for a first time in France while Luca Toni shone brightly in his first season in Germany. The former Fiorentina man struck 24 times as FC Bayern München claimed the Bundesliga title, and then scored both their goals in the 2-1 German Cup final win against BV Borussia Dortmund.
- On 5 June US Città di Palermo signed Italy's second-choice goalkeeper Marco Amelia from relegated AS Livorno Calcio for a reported fee of €6m, six days after UC Sampdoria had made Antonio Cassano's loan move from Real Madrid CF permanent, signing him on a five-year deal.

One of the great strikers of his age. Netherlands coach Marco van Basten seems the ideal choice to bring an exciting new generation of Dutch attacking talent to their peak at UEFA EURO 2008™, after which he will step down to take charge at former club AFC Ajax. "We have a lot of players with good attacking qualities, but most of them are young boys who need to mature," Van Basten said. "With more experience, we will have a chance to clinch a major title."

Van Basten, who is bidding to become the first person to taste EURO success as a coach and player, was a wild-card choice when he replaced Dick Advocaat as Netherlands coach after UEFA EURO 2004™. His only previous coaching role had been working with Ajax's youth team but with the Dutch going unbeaten for 15 games after he took charge - before losing 3-1 against Italy in a November 2005 friendly - Van Basten proved he had plenty of potential.

His side breezed through 2006 FIFA World Cup qualification but bowed out in the first knockout round after a disappointing 1-0 defeat by Portugal. UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying proved largely straightforward, the Netherlands progressing as Group G runners-up behind Romania, and Van Basten was able to continue his policy of bringing through players who had won the 2006 and 2007 UEFA European Under-21 Championships.

Van Basten's successful playing career has been well-documented. His talents as a striker were there for all to see as early as the 1983 FIFA U-20 World Cup, and he had scored 128 goals for Ajax - including the winner in the 1986/87 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final - by the time he made a €2.5m move to AC Milan in 1987. His memorable volley against the Soviet Union helped the Netherlands win the 1988 UEFA European Championship final and he then took the ultimate club honours as he lifted the European Champion Clubs' Cup with Milan in 1989 and 1990.

Appointed in the wake of Italy's 2006 FIFA World Cup success, Roberto Donadoni inherited a huge burden of expectation when he succeeded Marcello Lippi. The Italian Football Federation's then vice-president Demetrio Albertini said on his appointment: "We decided to gamble on a young man who could become truly great."

Italy may have stumbled at the start of their UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying campaign but they eventually advanced as Group B winners and Donadoni was rewarded with a new two-year contract on the eve of the final tournament. He has been passing on his knowledge since 2001 when he took charge of Serie C club Calcio Lecco 1912. The following season he moved on to AS Livorno Calcio, then of Serie B, before heading to Genoa 1893. He was sacked after three games and resurfaced at Livorno in January 2005, with the Tuscany club in the top flight. A ninth-place finish followed and things got even better in 2005/06 with Livorno up to sixth before Donadoni resigned that February following a disagreement with the club president. It was his last job before Italy came calling.

As a player, Donadoni served Italy with distinction on 63 occasions. He suffered penalty heartache at two World Cups, missing in the semi-final shoot-out defeat by Argentina in 1990 and then watching as Brazil won on spot-kicks in the final four years later. At club level, Donadoni made his Serie A debut with hometown club Atalanta BC before joining AC Milan in 1986 and becoming a key component of a side which won five league league titles and three European Champion Clubs' Cups. Before retiring, he had spells in the United States and Saudi Arabia with New York/New Jersey MetroStars and Al Ittihad respectively.

Peter Fröjdfeldt has made a lasting impression since his elevation to join Europe's top-ranked referees. The Eskilstuna-based official reached the higher Swedish levels in the mid-1990s, made his top-flight bow in 1997, and has passed the 200-match mark in the élite Swedish domestic game. His FIFA international badge followed at the start of 2001.

Early years of picking up experience were followed by his UEFA Champions League debut in September 2003 with the meeting of FC Dynamo Kyiv and FC Lokomotiv Moskva. Fröjdfeldt's promotion to UEFA Elite status came in January 2005 and he continued to get regular appointments at the highest club and international levels, including six FIFA World Cup qualifiers.

In 2005/06 Fröjdfeldt became a regular face in the UEFA Champions League and the married father of two has become well used to high-profile appointments, ending the 2007/08 club season by taking charge of the UEFA Cup final between FC Zenit St. Petersburg and Rangers FC in Manchester. Back in Sweden, Fröjdfeldt has become the main man in the middle following Anders Frisk's retirement, and has taken charge of a number of important Allsvenskan fixtures. He also took charge of the 2006 Scandinavian Royal League final in April that year, in which FC København defeated Lillestrøm SK 1-0, and the 2007 Swedish Cup final. An arena manager by profession, he lists his favourite hobby as golf.

Competition facts

UEFA European Championship: Did you know?

- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has appeared in two victorious finals.
- Since 1980, when the tournament became an eight-team event, the hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals or better twice. Italy finished second in Group 2 in 1980, when only the top side in each section progressed to the final, and in 2000 Belgium co-hosts with the Netherlands, who did reach the semi-finals came third in their section.
- UEFA EURO 2008™ is Germany's tenth successive UEFA European Championship final tournament, more appearances than any other side they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the sixth successive edition.
- Italy are bidding to become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France claimed the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000™.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals; for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller and France's Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry.
- Having played in Manchester United FC's UEFA Champions League final victory in Moscow on 21 May, Edwin van der Sar, Patrice Evra, Nani and Cristiano Ronaldo can join the exclusive band of five players who have appeared in European Champion Clubs' Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breukelen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka won the European Cup with PSV and Real Madrid CF in 1988 and 2000 respectively yet remaining on the bench for the Netherlands' and France's European Championship triumphs in those years. Anelka's Madrid and France team-mate from 2000, Christian Karembeu, holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both final victories in the same year.
- A total of ten players have been UEFA European Championship final losers after appearing in a European Cup victory: Sepp Maier, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Franz Beckenbauer and Uli Hoeness (1976, FC Bayern München and West Germany) and Paulo Ferreira, Ricardo Carvalho, Nuno Valente, Costinha, Maniche and Deco (2004, FC Porto and Portugal).
- Conversely six Chelsea players Petr Čech, Claude Makelele, Carvalho, Michael Ballack, Florent Malouda and Anelka could join a list of four players who followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Hörst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

"We are ready, and everything has been working according to plan," said Euro 2008 SA COO Martin Kallen. "UEFA has been working very closely together with Austria and Switzerland since 2002 to make sure that this will be a great event. We will see if that is the case on 29 June." Meanwhile, Kallen warned fans against buying EURO tickets on the black market. "All of the tickets have been sold - there is not a single ticket left, and there has not been for a while," he explained. "We are obviously trying to prevent tickets being sold, but any tickets sold at this point are black market tickets. I would recommend that no one sells tickets on the black market, as there will be sanctions."

International Broadcast Centre opened

UEFA President Michel Platini has opened the International Broadcast Centre in Vienna - the nerve centre of broadcasting for UEFA EURO 2008[™]. At a ceremony attended by Austria's federal chancellor Alfred Gusenbauer, Vienna's mayor Michael Häupl and the President of the Austrian Football Federation, Friedrich Stickler, Mr Platini switched on the TV video feeds from all the Austrian and Swiss venues in the IBC Master Control Room with a symbolic push of the button. For the first time in EURO history, UEFA will produce the television signal for the tournament itself through UEFA Media Technologies SA, the 100 per cent owned UEFA subsidiary which is in charge of the Host Broadcast Operations.

Support for fans

The "fan embassies" project is designed to provide support to fans during UEFA EURO 2008™. Apart from facilities at each of the eight venues where fans can go for assistance, there will also be mobile fan embassies moving from stadium to stadium. The project is being run by people familiar with the fan scene in the participating countries, together with local fan experts. It is hoped that this co-operation will also be put to use well after UEFA EURO 2008™. The project leaders are UEFA's long-standing partners FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe) in co-operation with the FSI (Football Supporters International), Fairplay-vidc (Austria's Vienna Institute for international Dialogue and Co-operation) and Projektorganisation Öffentliche Hand (a Swiss state project organisation).

Official song

Can You Hear Me? by Enrique Iglesias is the official song of UEFA EURO 2008™, with the Spanish star scheduled to perform live at the final in Vienna on 29 June. The 33-year-old, who has had No1 hit records across the globe with songs such as Rhythm Divine, Be With You, Hero, Escape, Do You Know? and Tired of Being Sorry, will make his appearance in the ten-minute closing ceremony at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion. "I'm really pleased to be able to contribute to the football festival in Switzerland and Austria; it's an honour for me to perform at the final," said the Spaniard.

Competition information

- Format: The UEFA EURO 2008™ group stage draw in Lucerne on 2 December 2007 divided the 14 qualifiers and co-hosts Austria and Switzerland into four groups of four. Each country plays each other once. Three points are awarded for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat. If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings:
- a) number of points obtained in the matches among the teams in question;
- b) goal difference from the matches among the teams in question;
- c) number of goals scored in the matches among the teams in question (if more than two teams finish level on points);
- d) goal difference in all group matches;
- e) number of goals scored in all the group matches;
- f) coefficient from the qualifying competitions for the 2006 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2008™ (points obtained divided by number of matches played);
- g) Fair Play conduct of teams in the final tournament;
- h) drawing of lots
- Key dates: The quarter-finals are played on 19, 20, 21 and 22 June in the following format:

Match 1 Winner Group A v Runner-up Group B

Match 2 Winner Group B v Runner-up Group A

Match 3 Winner Group C v Runner-up Group D

Match 4 Winner Group D v Runner-up Group C

The semi-finals are played on 25 and 26 June:

Winner Match 1 v Winner Match 2

Winner Match 3 v Winner Match 4

The final is played at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion in Vienna on Sunday 29 June, with the winners of Semi-final 1 being designated as the home team for administrative purposes.

- **Disciplinary information:** As a rule, a player who is sent off is suspended for the next match in the competition. The Control and Disciplinary Body is entitled to augment this punishment. In the case of repeated cautions, a player is suspended for one match after two cautions in two different matches. In May, UEFA's Executive Committee decided at its meeting in Moscow to cancel single yellow cards after the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2008™. Consequently, a situation will not arise whereby players receive a second yellow card of the tournament in the semi-finals and are suspended for the final as a result.
- Player eligibility: The 16 participants in the final tournament had to submit a final list of 23 players of which three had to be goalkeepers at least ten days before the opening match of the tournament, on 7 June. In the event of a serious injury to a listed player before his team's first match in the final tournament, the player in question could be substituted only if a doctor from the UEFA Medical Committee and the team doctor both confirmed the injury was serious enough to prevent the player taking part.
- Financial information: UEFA has earmarked a total of €184m for the 16 teams competing in UEFA EURO 2008™ compared to €129m at UEFA EURO 2004™. The 16 teams in the final tournament will each receive a participating fee of €7.5m with a performance bonus of €1m for a win during the group stage and €500,000 for a draw. The eight teams who reach the quarter-finals will all receive an additional payment of €2m, with the four teams who progress to the semi-finals collecting an extra €3m. For the teams who take the field for the final at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion on 29 June, the runners-up will receive €4.5m with the winners collecting €7.5m. Therefore, if the victorious side at the final win all three of their group games, they would collect a maximum of €23m.
