Match background

Four years after stunning Europe by winning UEFA EURO 2004[™], Greece begin their defence of the Henri Delaunay trophy against Sweden in Salzburg. Otto Rehhagel's team will hope to repeat the winning start they made by beating hosts Portugal 2-1 in the opening match in 2004 but Sweden, appearing in their fifth successive major finals, will have other ideas.

- This is the first competitive fixture between the two countries, although they did meet at the 1920 Olympic Games in Antwerp where Sweden prevailed 9-0.
- The sides have met five times subsequently with Greece faring the better. After a 2-1 win in Thessaloniki in 1981, Greece earned a 0-0 draw in Malmo in 1986 and a 2-2 draw in Athens in 1991. More recently, there was a 2-2 draw in Thessaloniki in 2002 before Greece triumphed 2-1 in Norrkoping on 20 August the following year.
- Greece's Giourkas Seitaridis and Sotirios Kyrgiakos made their international debuts in the 2-2 draw in 2002 a game where the visitors led twice through Magnus Svensson and Stefan Selakovic, only for Greece to reply through Panagiotis Fyssas and Georgios Karagounis.
- Greece also came from behind when beating Sweden 2-1 in 2003. Anders Svensson gave the Scandinavian team a 16th-minute lead but quickfire goals from Stelios Giannakopoulos (63) and Pantelis Kafes (65) turned the tie Greece's way on an evening when Konstantinos Katsouranis made his international bow.
- The full teams that day were:

- Because they missed out on the 2006 FIFA World Cup, this will be Greece's first match at a major tournament since Angelos Charisteas's header earned them a 1-0 victory against Portugal in the UEFA EURO 2004™ final in Lisbon. It was the Greeks' third straight 1-0 win in Portugal and meant they ended the tournament without conceding a goal in their final 358 minutes of play.
- Prior to 2004, their only previous experience on the international stage had come at the 1980 UEFA European Championship and the 1994 World Cup.

- Greece qualified in style for UEFA EURO 2008™, winning Group C with a greater number of points than any other side in Europe. With ten victories, one draw and one defeat, they collected 31 points and sealed their finals berth on 17 October last year after overcoming Turkey 1-0 in Istanbul through loannis Amanatidis's 79th-minute strike.
- This is the second tournament for Lars Lagerbäck in sole charge of Sweden. Following the departure of co-coach Tommy Söderberg after Sweden's quarter-final exit at UEFA EURO 2004™ beaten on penalties by the Netherlands Lagerbäck led Sweden to the last 16 at the 2006 World Cup, where they lost 2-0 to hosts Germany.
- Sweden are participating in their fourth UEFA European Championship finals in Austria/Switzerland. The Scandinavians appeared previously at the 1992, 2000 and 2004 tournaments and their best performance to date was in 1992 where they reached the semi-finals on home soil.
- Sweden booked their finals ticket on the concluding day of qualifying, 21 November last year, when they defeated Latvia 2-1 through goals from Marcus Allbäck and Kim Källstrom to tie up second place in Group F behind Spain. Their overall record in qualifying was eight wins, two draws and two losses.
- As coach of Werder Bremen, Rehhagel oversaw a 3-2 aggregate success against Sweden's Malmö FF in the first round of the 1983/84 UEFA Cup. Bremen drew 1-1 at home before winning 2-1 away.
- Sweden midfielder Mikael Nilsson counts a number of Greece players among his team-mates at Athens outfit Panathinaikos FC Giannis Goumas, Karagounis, Dimitris Salpingidis, Nikos Spiropoulos, Alexandros Tziolis and Loukas Vintra.
- Greece forward Giorgios Samaras played with Swede Petter Hansson at Dutch club SC Heerenveen and, more recently, with goalkeeper Andreas Isaksson at Manchester City FC.
- Greece midfielder Giannakopoulos played alongside Sweden's Christian Wilhelmsson during the latter's brief stay on loan at Bolton Wanderers FC during the first half of 2007/08.
- Sweden striker Markus Rosenberg got little joy out of Olympiacos CFP's Greece defenders Paraskevas Antzas, Christos Patsatzoglou and Vassilis Torosidis, as well as goalkeeper Antonis Nikopolidis, when Rosenberg's Werder Bremen suffered home and away losses to the Greek champions in the 2007/08 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Salpingidis scored one of Greece's goals in a 2-0 victory against Sweden at the UEFA European Under-16 Championship finals in 1998. The Sweden squad included current senior internationals Mikael Dorsin, Johan Elmander, Isaksson and Källström.
- This is the 13th edition of the UEFA European Championship and the eighth edition that features a final tournament with a group phase.

UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying statistics

- Two Greece players appeared in all 12 matches in qualifying Group C: Giorgos Karagounis and Sotiris Kyrgiakos, although the latter was the only man to play for all 1,080 minutes.
- Only Alexandros Tzorvas of the final 23-man squad did not feature in qualifying.
- Fanis Gekas was Greece's top scorer in qualifying with five goals. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- Greece scored 25 goals in qualifying at an average of 2.08 goals per game. Germany led the way overall having found the net 35 times.
- Of the teams who qualified for UEFA EURO 2008™, only Poland (12) and Turkey (eleven) conceded more than Greece's total of ten goals.
- Greece and Turkey managed the joint lowest total shots on goal of the qualifiers with just 63 efforts apiece, at an average of 5.25 shots per game.

- The holders also had the fewest shots wide of the qualified teams having missed the target on just 44 occasions or 3.67 times per match. Portugal had the most shots wide with 112.
- Greece won the fewest corners of the qualified teams with only 56; Spain won the most with 110.
- Only Spain, with 85 fouls, conceded fewer free-kicks in qualifying than Greece's total of 105 among the teams who will be at UEFA EURO 2008™.

Latest information

- Greece's players came together on 18 May, playing a friendly against Cyprus in Patras before travelling to Budapest on 23 May. After taking on Hungary they switched to their pre-tournament base near Frankfurt.
- Greece arrived in Austria on 3 June, setting up camp at their UEFA EURO 2008™ headquarters in Salzburg.

Injury news

• Otto Rehhagel had a relatively stress-free preparation injury-wise, though Karagounis has been hampered by a sore knee and a groin problem forced Kyrgiakos to train alone on Thursday.

Miscellaneous

- The national side were named 2007 Team of the Year by Greek sportswriters, as Otto Rehhagel picked up the award for best coach for the second time the first coming in 2004.
- Vassilis Torosidis' 23rd birthday coincides with the day of the Sweden game.

Domestic information

- Four members of Olympiacos CFP's double-winning side are in Rehhagel's Greece squad: Antonis Nikopolidis, Torosidis, Paraskevas Antzas and Christos Patsatzoglou. Olympiacos also won the Super Cup, defeating Larissa FC 1-0.
- It was Nikopolidis' fifth league title in a row and fourth double the first coming with Panathinaikos FC before his 2004 switch to Olympiacos.
- Giorgos Samaras lifted the Scottish Premier League trophy with Celtic FC, having joined them from Manchester City FC during the winter.
- Eintracht Frankfurt captain Giannis Amanatidis was his club's top scorer in the Bundesliga with eleven goals.
- Stelios Giannakopoulos and Angelos Basinas face uncertain futures as their contracts with Bolton Wanderers FC and RCD Mallorca expire this summer.
- After watching Aris Thessaloniki FC lose the Greek Cup final from the substitutes' bench on 17 May, Kostas Chalkias sealed a cross-city switch to PAOK FC.

UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying statistics

- No Sweden player appeared in all 12 matches in qualifying Group F, although Anders Svensson, Petter Hansson, Christian Wilhelmsson and Mikael Nilsson all missed just one game.
- Of the final 23-man squad six players did not feature in qualifying: Johan Wiland, Fredrik Stoor, Andreas Granqvist, Mikael Dorsin, Sebastian Larsson and Henrik Larsson.
- Marcus Allbäck was Sweden's top scorer in qualifying with six goals, two more than Johan Elmander. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- · Allbäck also set up three goals, with Slovakia's Ján Kozák the leading assist provider with seven.
- Elmander had 17 shots on goal in qualifying, with Cristiano Ronaldo having the most with 31.

- Sweden scored 23 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.92 goals per game. Germany led the way overall having found the net 35 times.
- Sweden also conceded nine goals, with Czech Republic, the Netherlands and France having the best defensive records allowing just five goals each.
- Of the teams who will be at UEFA EURO 2008™, only Greece and Turkey, with 63 each, managed fewer shots on goal in qualifying than Sweden's total of 62 attempts on target. Portugal had the most shots on goal with 101.

Latest news

- Henrik Larsson came out of international retirement to take his place in Austria and Switzerland. Lars Lagerbäck showed a sense of theatre as he named Sweden's UEFA EURO 2008™ squad on 13 May, saying he would announce them in a random order and then leaving Larsson until last, his name greeted by a cheer among the Swedish press corps. The 36-year-old guit international football on 17 July 2006.
- Sweden geared up for the finals with a training camp in Stenungsund, north of Gothenburg, combining regular training with a series of team-building exercises like boat trips and fishing. On 29 May they travelled to Stockholm before leaving for Switzerland and their base at Lugano.
- The squad enjoyed a memorable welcome at Lugano airport on 5 June as they were greeted by the sight of hundreds of locals, many clad in yellow and blue, chanting "Svezia! Svezia!"
- Lagerbäck has been working to nullify what he sees as Greece's principal goal threat in recent days. "Greece are very good at set-pieces," he said. "They have several tall players and have scored many goals through headers. From now, we'll be working on set-pieces and certain facets of our game that we feel will be important against Greece."

Injury news

- Sweden's preparations have been hit by injuries to key players. Ibrahimović has been hampered by a knee problem and captain Fredrik Ljungberg is on the mend after a rib injury. Markus Rosenberg and Elmander (foot) have also had niggles.
- Tobias Linderoth has just returned from a six-month lay-off with a hip injury, scoring on his comeback against Slovenia at the end of May.

Miscellaneous

- Ibrahimović has not scored an international goal in 13 games, a run stretching back almost three years to October 2005 and a FIFA World Cup qualifier against Iceland
- Sebastian Larsson turned 23 on 6 June, Sweden's National Day.

Domestic information

- Ibrahimović struck 17 goals in 26 Serie A appearances as FC Internazionale Milano claimed the Scudetto. He struggled with injury during the final stages of the season but returned for the final game, coming on as a 51st-minute substitute and scoring twice against Parma FC to seal the title. He did not feature at all in the Nerazzurri's Coppa Italia campaign, however, which ended in final defeat by AS Roma.
- Kim Källström secured the double in France, playing a crucial role as Olympique Lyonnais claimed the league and cup together for the first time.
- Niclas Alexandersson is also a reigning champion with IFK Göteborg, albeit a title that was claimed last October as the Swedish league is played out over the summer.

Greece's final game in UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying marked another milestone for their German coach Otto Rehhagel as he surpassed Alketas Panagoulias's record of 74 games in charge of the national team. The veteran trainer has since signed a new contract incorporating the 2010 FIFA World Cup after his side qualified for Austria and Switzerland with more points than any other.

Nobody would have guessed just what 'King Otto' would achieve after he took the Greece job in August 2001, especially when his first game ended in a 5-1 defeat against Finland, yet the tactics and discipline that had made him a legend in German football soon began to tell. Rehhagel led his team to UEFA EURO 2004™ and a month few Greeks will ever forget, culminating in a 1-0 win against hosts Portugal which earned their first major title. Failure to reach the 2006 World Cup followed, but Rehhagel has got Greece back on track, comfortably winning UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying Group C despite losing 4-1 at home to Turkey.

A player for Hertha BSC Berlin and 1. FC Kaiserslautern, Rehhagel's coaching career took in spells at Kickers Offenbach, Werder Bremen, BV Borussia Dortmund, DSC Armenia Bielefeld and Fortuna Düsseldorf, where he won the 1980 German Cup, before he returned to second division Bremen in 1981. He was hugely successful during this second spell with the club, which lasted 14 years and included triumphs in the Bundesliga (1987 and 1993), German Cup (1991 and 1994) and UEFA Cup Winners' Cup (1992). Rehhagel then took the coach's job at FC Bayern München and led them to the 1995/96 UEFA Cup final before guiding Kaiserslautern to the 1997/98 German title. He was the first man to have been involved – as a player and a coach – in more than 1,000 Bundesliga games.

Lars Lagerbäck oversaw Sweden's progress to a record fifth successive major tournament when they qualified for UEFA EURO 2008™ as the second-placed team in Group F behind Spain. For the coach himself it was his second consecutive qualifying success since he took sole charge of the national side when Tommy Söderberg, with whom he had shared the reins, stepped down after UEFA EURO 2004™.

Lagerbäck started out as Söderberg's right-hand man in 1998 before earning equal billing two years later. He was regarded as Sweden's master tactician while his colleague played more of a hands-on role. The pair had an unhappy final tournament at UEFA EURO 2000™, but qualified for the 2002 FIFA World Cup, eliminating Argentina in the group stage before losing narrowly to Senegal in the second round. UEFA EURO 2004™ also ended in frustration as the Swedes succumbed on penalties to the Netherlands in the quarter-finals.

With Söderberg having departed, Lagerbäck – now assisted by Roland Andersson – led Sweden to the 2006 World Cup finals where they lost 2-0 to hosts Germany in the first knockout round. Lagerbäck nevertheless said he would stay to lead the team to UEFA EURO 2008™ and in January signed a new deal that will take him to the end of Sweden's 2010 World Cup campaign.

Born in July 1948, Lagerbäck was a lower league player with Alby FF and Gimonäs CK, then began his coaching career in 1977 with Kilafors IF. After spells with two other modest club sides, Arbrå BK and Hudiksvalls ABK, he joined the Swedish Football Association as a youth coach in 1990. He did that job from 1990 to 1995 before running the national 'B' team and then joining forces with Söderberg.

Massimo Busacca has steadily enhanced his reputation since succeeding Urs Meier on Switzerland's élite list, with the 2007 UEFA Cup final following the 2006 FIFA World Cup. He had three games in Germany, including Argentina's 2-1 last-16 win against Mexico. From Monte Carrasso, in the Italian-speaking southern canton of Ticino, Busacca reached the highest domestic level in 1996 and within three years was cutting his teeth in UEFA youth matches.

Busacca is a UEFA Champions League regular, notably serving as fourth official to Meier for the 2002 final between Real Madrid CF and Bayer 04 Leverkusen. The UEFA Cup final Sevilla FC won 3-1 on penalties after a 2-2 draw against RCD Espanyol was his third visit to Hampden Park as he also refereed Scotland's 1-0 victory against France in a UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifier and ended the 2007/08 club season by taking charge of the UEFA Champions League semi-final first leg between FC Barcelona and eventual winners Manchester United FC.

UEFA European Championship: Did you know?

- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has appeared in two victorious finals.
- Since 1980, when the tournament became an eight-team event, the hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals or better twice. Italy finished second in Group 2 in 1980, when only the top side in each section progressed to the final, and in 2000 Belgium co-hosts with the Netherlands, who did reach the semi-finals came third in their section.
- UEFA EURO 2008™ is Germany's tenth successive UEFA European Championship final tournament, more appearances than any other side they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the sixth successive edition.
- Italy are bidding to become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France claimed the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000™.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals; for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller and France's Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry.
- Having played in Manchester United FC's UEFA Champions League final victory in Moscow on 21 May, Edwin van der Sar, Patrice Evra, Nani and Cristiano Ronaldo can join the exclusive band of five players who have appeared in European Champion Clubs' Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year. Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breukelen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka won the European Cup with PSV and Real Madrid CF in 1988 and 2000 respectively yet remaining on the bench for the Netherlands' and France's European Championship triumphs in those years. Anelka's Madrid and France team-mate from 2000, Christian Karembeu, holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both final victories in the same year.
- A total of ten players have been UEFA European Championship final losers after appearing in a European Cup victory: Sepp Maier, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Franz Beckenbauer and Uli Hoeness (1976, FC Bayern München and West Germany) and Paulo Ferreira, Ricardo Carvalho, Nuno Valente, Costinha, Maniche and Deco (2004, FC Porto and Portugal).
- Conversely six Chelsea players Petr Čech, Claude Makelele, Carvalho, Michael Ballack, Florent Malouda and Anelka could join a list of four players who followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Hörst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

UEFA information

'Wonderful atmosphere'

UEFA President Michel Platini has joined millions of football fans in Europe and around the world in heralding the long-awaited arrival of UEFA EURO 2008™. "As President of UEFA I am very proud that this tournament is kicking off," he said in Basel. "UEFA and EURO 2008 SA under COO Martin Kallen have been working hard for very many years to ensure the best possible conditions for players, spectators and the media. Everything is being done to ensure that there will be a wonderful atmosphere for the fans coming to Austria and Switzerland from the whole of Europe. What is really important are the feelings and emotions that will be felt by the spectators, thanks to the games that they will be watching. There is going to be a lot of drama, there will be pain and joy, and the best team will be the winner. I also hope that football will be the winner. I'm expecting wonderful emotions and I'm passing the ball on to all the players, who are key to our success."

Zero tolerance for racism

The football family and anti-racism campaigners have joined forces at the start of UEFA EURO 2008™ to deliver a strong message: racist conduct, discrimination and intolerance will have no place at the tournament, or in the future. A key gathering in Basel brought together representatives of UEFA and the FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe) network for a reception featuring former players, administrators and non-government organisations to signal the beginning of a three-week anti-discrimination programme at UEFA EURO 2008™. The Unite Against Racism programme, run by the FARE network with UEFA's backing, as well as with the support of the professional players' union FIFPro, will include an advertising spot broadcast at every game – Different Languages, One Goal: No To Racism – pitch-side boards and activities with fans, culminating in high-profile activities on the field at the semi-finals in Basel and Vienna on 25 and 26 June.

Technical team

UEFA has announced the make-up of the expert team who will study the UEFA EURO 2008™ technical and tactical aspects in detail. The UEFA Technical Team will consist of nine football technicians, all of whom have vast experience in the coaching and technical field. They will be split into two groups, one based in Switzerland and comprising Jerzy Engel (Poland), György Mezey (Hungary), Morten Olsen (Denmark) and Holger Osieck (Germany). The other group will be located in Austria and consists of FIFA Technical Director Jean-Paul Brigger (Switzerland), Roy Hodgson (England), Gérard Houllier (France) and Jozef Vengloš (Slovakia). UEFA technical director Andy Roxburgh will lead the group's activities in both countries.

Anti-doping drive

In the run-up to UEFA EURO 2008™ an unprecedented programme of out-of-competition doping controls was carried out – including blood testing – and all 160 samples examined at the World Anti-Doping Authority (WADA) accredited laboratory in Seibersdorf produced negative results. The results were communicated to UEFA's 12 doping control officers (DCOs) when they met in Lausanne on 6 June. The programme of blood controls alongside the usual urine samples, which will continue with the testing of two players from each side in every finals match at the Swiss doping analysis laboratory in Lausanne, is another innovation for UEFA.

Support for fans

The "fan embassies" project is designed to provide support to fans during UEFA EURO 2008™. Apart from facilities at each of the eight venues where fans can go for assistance, there will also be mobile fan embassies moving from stadium to stadium. The project is being run by people familiar with the fan scene in the participating countries, together with local fan experts. It is hoped that this co-operation will also be put to use well after UEFA EURO 2008™. The project leaders are UEFA's long-standing partners FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe) in co-operation with the FSI (Football Supporters International), Fairplay-vidc (Austria's Vienna Institute for international Dialogue and Co-operation) and Projektorganisation Öffentliche Hand (a Swiss state project organisation). Location of fan embassies:

Austria: Vorplatz Museumsquartier (Vienna); Fancamp, Messegelände (Klagenfurt); Ferdinand-Hanusch-Platz (Salzburg); Fancamp Innsbruck (Innsbruck).

Switzerland: Rathausplatz (Zurich); Marktplatz (Basel); Waisenhausplatz (Berne); Place du Rhône (Geneva).

Competition information

- Format: The UEFA EURO 2008™ group stage draw in Lucerne on 2 December 2007 divided the 14 qualifiers and co-hosts Austria and Switzerland into four groups of four. Each country plays each other once. Three points are awarded for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat. If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings:
- a) number of points obtained in the matches among the teams in question;
- b) goal difference from the matches among the teams in question;
- c) number of goals scored in the matches among the teams in question (if more than two teams finish level on points);
- d) goal difference in all group matches;
- e) number of goals scored in all the group matches;
- f) coefficient from the qualifying competitions for the 2006 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2008™ (points obtained divided by number of matches played):
- g) Fair Play conduct of teams in the final tournament;
- h) drawing of lots
- Key dates: The quarter-finals are played on 19, 20, 21 and 22 June in the following format:

Match 1 Winner Group A v Runner-up Group B

Match 2 Winner Group B v Runner-up Group A

Match 3 Winner Group C v Runner-up Group D

Match 4 Winner Group D v Runner-up Group C

The semi-finals are played on 25 and 26 June:

Winner Match 1 v Winner Match 2

Winner Match 3 v Winner Match 4

The final is played at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion in Vienna on Sunday 29 June, with the winners of Semi-final 1 being designated as the home team for administrative purposes.

- Disciplinary information: As a rule, a player who is sent off is suspended for the next match in the competition. The Control and Disciplinary Body is entitled to augment this punishment. In the case of repeated cautions, a player is suspended for one match after two cautions in two different matches. In May, UEFA's Executive Committee decided at its meeting in Moscow to cancel single yellow cards after the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2008™. Consequently, a situation will not arise whereby players receive a second yellow card of the tournament in the semi-finals and are suspended for the final as a result.
- Player eligibility: The 16 participants in the final tournament had to submit a final list of 23 players of which three had to be goalkeepers – at least ten days before the opening match of the tournament, on 7 June. In the event of a serious injury to a listed player before his team's first match in the final tournament, the player in question could be substituted only if a doctor from the UEFA Medical Committee and the team doctor both confirmed the injury was serious enough to prevent the player taking part.
- Financial information: UEFA has earmarked a total of €184m for the 16 teams competing in UEFA EURO 2008™ compared to €129m at UEFA EURO 2004™. The 16 teams in the final tournament will each receive a participating fee of €7.5m with a performance bonus of €1m for a win during the group stage and €500,000 for a draw. The eight teams who reach the quarter-finals will all receive an additional payment of €2m, with the four teams who progress to the semi-finals collecting an extra €3m. For the teams who take the field for the final at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion on 29 June, the runners-up will receive €4.5m with the winners collecting €7.5m. Therefore, if the victorious side at the final win all three of their group games, they would collect a maximum of €23m.
