Match background

Manchester United FC will look to inflict more misery on Real Sociedad de Fútbol when the teams meet for the first ever time at Old Trafford on matchday three.

• Jagoba Arrastate's bottom-placed side are still searching for their first points in Group A after defeats by FC Shakhtar Donetsk and Bayer 04 Leverkusen – the latter loss cruelly inflicted by an added-time goal in Germany. To retain realistic hope of progress in their first UEFA Champions League campaign in a decade, La Real will need to take something from their trip to Manchester yet United will have other ideas as they look to build on their unbeaten start.

Match background

• United will hope their 4-2 opening Group A home victory over Leverkusen marked a return to winning ways at Old Trafford, where their form in UEFA competition had been uncharacteristically shaky with four defeats from their previous six fixtures.

• The English title holders have lost their last two home games against Spanish opposition, going down 2-1 to Real Madrid CF in last season's round of 16 and succumbing 3-2 to Athletic Club at the same stage of the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League. Wayne Rooney was on target three times overall in that two-legged tie against Athletic, La Real's Basque rivals, but United lost 5-3 on aggregate.

• United have won only one of their last six Old Trafford fixtures against Liga visitors – the 1-0 UEFA Champions League semi-final success over FC Barcelona in 2008. Their overall home record against Spanish opponents is W8 D9 L4.

• La Real are making only their second trip to England and will certainly want to fare better than on their first – when they crashed to a 6-0 defeat at Liverpool FC in the 1975/76 UEFA Cup second round. John Toshack, a future manager of the San Sebastian club, scored the first goal for Liverpool, who had already won the first leg 3-1 in Spain.

• United lost UEFA Champions League finals against Barcelona in 2009 and 2011 having beaten the same opponents in the 1991 European Cup Winners' Cup final.

Team ties

• As manager of Everton FC, David Moyes lost a 2005/06 UEFA Champions League third qualifying round tie against Villarreal CF 4-2 on aggregate after 2-1 defeats in both legs.

• David de Gea featured in Club Atlético de Madrid's two Liga victories over La Real in 2010/11, winning 4-2 away and 3-0 at home.

• Robin van Persie and Carlos Vela were team-mates at Arsenal FC between 2008 and 2011. Vela replaced Van Persie as a late substitute in Arsenal's 3-1 second-leg home loss to United in the 2008/09 UEFA Champions League semi-final. Vela never faced United in the Premier League, where he made 29 appearances for Arsenal, scoring three goals, and another eight on loan at West Bromwich Albion FC where he scored twice.

• Vela played alongside Javier Hernández in Mexico's 2-0 defeat of Patrice Evra's France at the 2010 FIFA World Cup.

• Evra featured in France's 2014 World Cup qualifiers against Spain with Les Bleus drawing 1-1 away in October last year before losing 1-0 at home in March.

• Haris Seferovic's Switzerland side took on a Spain featuring De Gea in qualifying for the 2013 UEFA European Under-21 Championship – the United keeper came out on top with a home win and away draw and two clean sheets. Seferovic had previously scored for Switzerland in a 3-2 UEFA European Under-19 Championship home defeat by England in June 2011.

• Van Persie was in the Netherlands side beaten by Spain in the 2010 World Cup final. With Arsenal he lost to Barcelona in the UEFA Champions League round of 16, scoring in a 2-1 first-leg victory but receiving a red card in a 3-1 second-leg defeat.

• Antonio Valencia spent 2005/06 in Spain, making two Liga appearances for Villarreal and another 12 in the second tier for RC Recreativo de Huelva.

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

• On matchday one, David Moyes became the first manager to take charge of United in Europe other than Sir Alex Ferguson since Ron Atkinson guided them to the UEFA Cup quarter-finals in 1984/85.

• Wayne Rooney is Britain's all-time leading scorer in the UEFA Champions League, moving past Ryan Giggs to 29 on matchday one. Robin van Persie has now scored in ten consecutive UEFA Champions League seasons.

• This is United's 19th UEFA Champions League campaign, one more than FC Barcelona, Real Madrid CF and FC Porto. It is also United's 18th successive season in the competition, one more than Madrid.

• United have conceded 297 goals in UEFA competition.

General information

• Van Persie has scored 14 goals in his last 17 games in all competitions for United.

• Tom Cleverley (calf) and Rio Ferdinand (groin) missed Saturday's 1-1 draw against Southampton FC with knocks.

• Adnan Januzaj scored both goals in United's 2-1 victory at Sunderland AFC on 5 October. It was the 18-year-old's first competitive start for the club; he signed a new contract running until 2018 last week, and was in the XI again at the weekend.

• United have used 24 different players in their starting lineups for Premier League games this season.

• Rooney has scored 202 competitive goals for United and is fourth in the club's all-time rankings behind Jack Rowley (211), Denis Law (237) and Sir Bobby Charlton (249).

• United's haul of seven points from the opening six league games was their worst start to a season since 1989/90.

International duty

• The international break saw 13 of United's UEFA Champions League squad called up by their national teams: Phil Jones, Chris Smalling, Michael Carrick, Cleverley, Rooney, Danny Welbeck (England), Jonny Evans (Northern Ireland), Nani (Portugal), Marouane Fellaini (Belgium), Van Persie (Netherlands), Javier Hernández (Mexico), Antonio Valencia (Ecuador), Shinji Kagawa (Japan). Cleverley dropped out of the England squad with a calf injury.

• Van Persie's hat-trick in the Netherlands' 8-1 win against Hungary took his international tally to a Dutch record 41 goals, overtaking Patrick Kluivert (40).

• Rooney scored the openers in wins against Montenegro and Poland as England booked a FIFA World Cup spot.

• Nani scored in last Tuesday's 3-0 win against Luxembourg as Portugal booked a World Cup play-off spot.

• Evans was sent off in Northern Ireland's 2-0 defeat in Azerbaijan on 11 October.

• La Real's record in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League – their last appearance in European competition – when Olympiacos FC, Galatasaray AŞ, Juventus and Lyon provided the opposition was P8 W2 D3 L3.

General information

• Real Sociedad won 2-1 at Valencia CF on Saturday to end a run of eight games without a win, their worst sequence since autumn 2011. Rubén Pardo scored the second, his first goal for the club since February 2012 while Xabi Prieto returned after three games out with a thigh tear.

• On-loan Esteban Granero has not played since rupturing knee ligaments on matchday one.

• The fourth-placed Liga finish achieved last season – sealed on the last day of the campaign – was the team's highest since they ended the 2002/03 campaign second, two points behind then champions Real Madrid. The Basque outfit lost seven of their first 11 games in 2012/13, but only two of the subsequent 29.

International duty

• Four La Real players were called up for senior duty during the international break: Claudio Bravo (Chile), Haris Seferovic (Switzerland), Iñigo Martínez (Spain), Liassine Cadamuro (Algeria).

• Bravo captained his country to a 3-3 draw away to Colombia and a 2-1 win at home to Ecuador as Chile sealed their passage to the 2014 FIFA World Cup finals. Seferovic also booked a place at Brazil 2014 with Switzerland, starting in victories over Albania and Slovenia.

• Moyes started out with Celtic but spent much of his playing career as a centre-back in England and Scotland's lower leagues.

• The tall Scot appeared more for Preston than for any other club, and it was with the north-west English team that Moyes – ever the keen student of the game – first tested his managerial potential between 1998 and 2002.

• Became regarded as one of the country's most promising young managers, taking Preston from the third tier to the brink of promotion to the Premier League before accepting the Everton job in March 2002.

• Succeeding Walter Smith, he breathed new life into Everton immediately, his first full season seeing Wayne Rooney's emergence and a first top-half finish since 1996. The Blues went on to finish fourth in the Premier League in 2004/05 but missed out on a place in the UEFA Champions League group stage after a qualifying loss to Villarreal CF.

• Moyes subsequently led an Everton team featuring astute signings such as Tim Cahill, Mikel Arteta and Phil Jagielka to three further European qualifications and the 2009 FA Cup final, yet silverware eluded him in his 11 years at Goodison Park. In May 2013, not long after turning 50, Moyes was named as Sir Alex Ferguson's successor as Manchester United manager.

• A former striker, Arrasate enjoyed a modest playing career which began in Real Sociedad's youth academy.

• Having failed to progress to the Txuri-urdin's senior side, Arrasate moved to Eibar and spent four seasons with their B team, where he won promotion to the Spanish third tier. Spells at lower-league outfits Lemona, Beasain and Elgoibar followed before he hung up his boots in 2007, shortly before his 30th birthday.

• Arrasate started coaching at regional Basque club Berriatuko before a switch to Spanish fourth tier side Elgoibar. Here his reputation soared as he took them to the brink of promotion on two occasions.

• Rejoined La Real in 2010 and began looking after the club's youth teams before advancing to Philippe Montanier's senior coaching staff. He helped the San Sebastian outfit finish fourth in the 2012/13 Liga, ensuring qualification for the UEFA Champions League play-offs.

• Montanier's subsequent rejection of a new contract led to the appointment of Arrasate. One of the 35-year-old's first acts was to guide his new charges into the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time in a decade – thanks to a comfortable aggregate victory over Olympique Lyonnais.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

• Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 – came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.

• No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).

• With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).

• There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.

• In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.

• Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.

• Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.

• No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.

• Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.

• Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.

• Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.

• Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.

• In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.

• Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

• No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.




