## Match background

---

FC København won plaudits for the way they carried the fight to Juventus on matchday one and they will be hoping to make life difficult for Galatasaray AŞ when they meet at Parken.

- The Danish champions have work to do in Group B having gone down 3-1 in Istanbul in the reverse fixture. That left København with a single point after the 1-1 home draw with Juve on matchday one that preceded a 4-0 loss at Real Madrid CF. Galatasaray hold a three-point cushion over their opponents having started with a 6-1 home defeat against Madrid and then held Juventus 2-2 in Roberto Mancini's first game as coach.

### Previous meetings

- The Istanbul meeting was the first between the teams in an official game and it was also Galatasaray's first experience of facing opponents from Denmark.
- København, who are in their third UEFA Champions League campaign, had met only one Turkish team before, lining up against Trabzonspor AŞ in the 1991/92 UEFA Cup third round. They won 1-0 in Copenhagen and drew 1-1 away.

### Match background

- In their eighth successive European campaign, København – exempt from the qualifying rounds for the first time – were last amongst Europe's elite in 2010/11 when they finished second in their group behind FC Barcelona.
- Three years ago they started with a 1-0 home win against FC Rubin Kazan, drew 1-1 at home to Barça and beat Panathinaikos FC 3-1. In the round of 16 they lost 2-0 at home to Chelsea FC, drawing 0-0 in the return.
- København are unbeaten at home in the group stage, recording four wins and three draws to date.
- Galatasaray are in their second successive UEFA Champions League campaign having not played in the competition since 2006/07 before last season.
- They reached the quarter-finals last season for the first time since 2001, losing 5-3 on aggregate to Madrid who had also knocked them out at the same stage 12 years earlier. A 3-0 loss at the Santiago Bernabéu put them on the back foot in 2012/13, with a measure of compensation gained in a 3-2 home victory.
- After losing away to Manchester United FC on matchday one Galatasaray posted successive victories at CFR 1907 Cluj, SC Braga and FC Schalke 04, and have lost just three of their last 20 European away fixtures, winning ten.

### Team ties

- København's Parken was the venue for Galatasaray's finest hour when they beat Arsenal FC 4-1 on penalties in the 1999/2000 UEFA Cup final after a goalless 120 minutes. Assistant coach Ümit Davala was in the winning team.
- Albert Riera struck Spain's final goal in a 3-1 win over Denmark in Aarhus in a UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier on 13 October 2007.
- Riera and Olof Mellberg were team-mates at Olympiacos FC in 2010/11, winning the Greek title.
- Bruma scored the penalty winner for Portugal against Denmark in a UEFA European Under-19 Championship elite round game in Barcelos on 9 June 2013 to ensure Portugal went through to the finals as group winners.
- Galatasaray's goalkeeping coach Cláudio Taffarel kept goal for Brazil in a 3-2 win over Denmark in a 1998 FIFA World Cup quarter-final played in Nantes on 3 July 1998.

### København

#### UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- The last time København were in the UEFA Champions League, in 2010/11, they delivered the best performance by a Danish team, reaching the round of 16 where they were eliminated by Chelsea FC.
- Ståle Solbakken, who returned as coach on 21 August, has overseen all 17 of FCK's UEFA Champions League games to date.
- Thomas Delaney is a booking away from a suspension after picking up two yellow cards.

#### General information

- The Lions recorded their biggest win of 2013 on Saturday, beating FC Nordsjælland 4-0. FCK have won five out of five at home having previously gone six months without a victory on their own turf.
- Saturday's clean sheet was København's second in 22 games in all competitions, stretching back to May.
- Lars Jacobsen scored an added-time equaliser – his first league goal for FCK – in a 1-1 draw at Randers FC on 27 October.
- A much-changed FCK side recovered from 2-0 and 3-2 down to beat Odense BK 4-3 on 30 October and reach the Danish Cup quarter-finals.
- César Santin struck twice against OB to take his goal tally to 83 for the club, surpassing Dame N'Doye as København's all-time top scorer.
- København made their worst start to a league campaign this season, losing their first three games and having to wait until round seven before recording a win.
- The 4-1 victory at Viborg FF on 1 September ended a 12-match winless run for FCK, who picked up just four points from their last six outings in 2012/13. That form saw Ariël Jacobs sacked five games into the campaign.

### Galatasaray

#### UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- Matchday three was Galatasaray's 250th game in UEFA competition.

#### General information

- Burak Yılmaz ended a seven-match scoring drought for Galatasaray with a goal in the 4-2 win at Kayserispor on 27 October. It was his 98th league goal as he nears a century previously achieved for the club by Hakan Şükür (228), Metin Oktay (217), Tanju Çolak (116) and Arif Erdem (105). He moved on to 99 with the winner against Konyaspor on Friday.
- Friday's victory ensured Galatasaray won three league games in a row for the first time this season, their first time since a seven-game winning streak was ended by a 2-1 loss to Fenerbahçe SK on 12 May.
- Hakan Balta (knee) and Gökhan Zan (thigh) have both been sidelined by injuries. Hamit Altıntop has not featured since August because of a back problem and underwent surgery in Germany last week.
- Didier Drogba, who scored his first goal direct from a free-kick for Galatasaray against Kayserispor, has registered in his last three outings and in six of his last seven.
- Aurélien Chedjou struck his first of any description for the club against Kayserispor.
- Galatasaray parted company with Fatih Terim on 24 September. Assistant coach Hasan Şaş oversaw a 1-1 draw with Çaykur Rizespor before Roberto Mancini was appointed on a three-year contract on 30 September. Mancini's first Süper Lig match ended in a 2-1 defeat at Akhisar Belediyespor on 6 October.
- Cimbom's haul of seven points from their first six games was their worst start to a campaign since 1989/90.
- The Turkish champions were leading Beşiktaş JK 2-1 in added time on 22 September when the derby was abandoned because of crowd problems. Galatasaray were subsequently awarded a 3-0 win.
- Tugay Kerimoğlu, who won five titles with Galatasaray between 1987 and 1999, has been appointed assistant to Mancini. Bülent Ünder, Terim's assistant between 1996 and 2000, is the club's new head of youth development.
- Burak scored for a fifth successive competitive match for Turkey, extending a national record, as they beat Estonia 2-0 on 11 October. He failed to find the net four days later in a 2-0 defeat by the Netherlands.

- Discovered at lower-league Grue, Solbakken represented Ham-Kam but made his mark as one of Norway's finest midfielders at Lillestrøm between 1994 and 1997, earning the first of his 58 caps for Norway before an ill-starred move to English side Wimbledon.
- A five-month Premier League spell ended with a switch to Denmark's AaB in 1998, where he got his career back on track, starring in the 1998/99 title success. He represented Norway at the 1998 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000 prior to joining København for 2000/01.
- His København playing career lasted just 14 league games before Solbakken suffered a heart attack in training on 13 March 2001; he was revived in an ambulance 12 minutes later.
- With a pacemaker fitted he went into coaching with Ham-Kam before unexpectedly being named as Hans Backe's successor at København in 2005 by club chairman Flemming Østergaard, who has Solbakken's playing shirt hanging in his office.
- The first of five title successes in his first season vindicated the decision, Solbakken also leading the club to the 2006/07 and 2010/11 UEFA Champions League group stage – reaching the round of 16 in the latter campaign – and the 2008/09 Danish Cup. After short, unsuccessful spells at Köln and Wolves, returned to København in August 2013 following Ariël Jacobs' dismissal.

### Galatasaray AŞ: Roberto Mancini

---

**Date of birth:** 27 November 1964

**Nationality:** Italian

**Playing career:** Bologna FC, UC Sampdoria, SS Lazio, Leicester City FC

**Coaching career:** ACF Fiorentina, SS Lazio, FC Internazionale Milano, Manchester City FC, Galatasaray AŞ

- Spent the majority of his playing career in Italy, winning Serie A titles and UEFA Cup Winners' Cups with both Sampdoria and Lazio as well as six editions of the Coppa Italia, four with Sampdoria and two with Lazio. Capped 36 times by Italy, the forward was a bronze medallist at the 1990 FIFA World Cup.
- Started his coaching career as assistant to Sven-Göran Eriksson at Lazio before replacing Fatih Terim at Fiorentina in 2001. After leading the Viola to the Coppa Italia, he returned to Lazio and repeated that feat as well as steering the Roman club into the UEFA Champions League and to the UEFA Cup semi-finals in 2002/03.
- Became coach of Inter in July 2004, replacing Alberto Zaccheroni one day after terminating his contract with Lazio; led the Nerazzurri to Coppa Italia glory in his debut season, Inter's first domestic honour since the 1989 Scudetto. After Juventus were stripped of their 2005/06 title and AC Milan suffered a points penalty, Inter were finally crowned champions of Italy again. Mancini repeated that success in 2006/07.
- Left Inter in May 2008 despite winning another title and replaced Mark Hughes as manager of Manchester City midway through the 2009/10 Premier League season. City finished fifth in his first campaign, third in his second – when they also lifted the FA Cup – and dramatically won the top flight for the first time in 44 years on the final day of his third.
- City finished second the following season, but Mancini was sacked two days after losing to Wigan Athletic FC in the 2013 FA Cup final. Mancini replaced Terim again that September, signing a three-year deal with Galatasaray.

## Competition facts

---

### UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 – came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

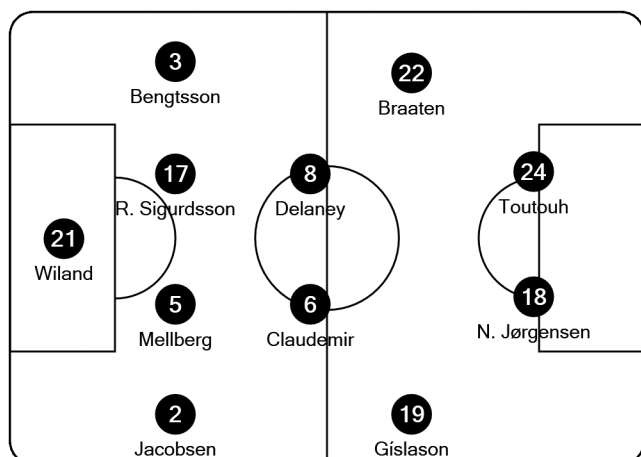

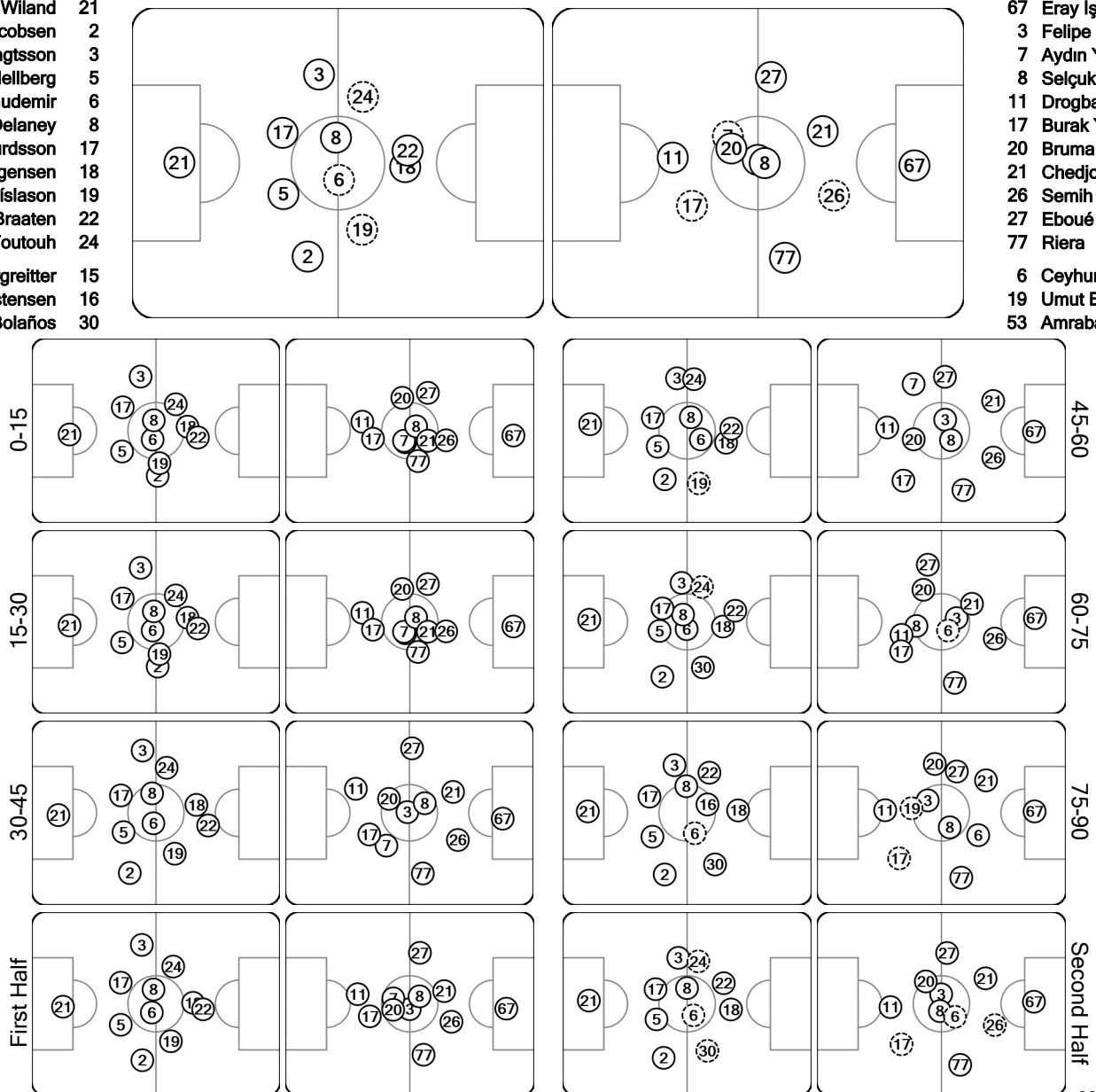
