## Match background

---

FC Schalke 04 were group winners in their past two UEFA Champions League participations and will be intent on another strong showing as they launch their Group E campaign against FC Steaua București, who have an unenviable record in the competition.

- The omens are promising for the German club, who recorded a win and a draw when the teams met two years ago.

### Previous meetings

- The sides met in the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League group stage when Schalke won 2-1 at home and drew 0-0 away. After the stalemate in Cluj-Napoca on matchday one, Kyriakos Papadopoulos (25) put the German side ahead in the return and, although Raul Rusescu soon fired an equaliser, Raúl González scored Schalke's winner early in the second half.

- Schalke met FC Sportul Studentesc București in the 1976/77 UEFA Cup second round, winning 1-0 away and 4-0 at home in what was their only previous tie against a Romanian side.

- Steaua's long winless run against German teams continued last season when they were paired with VfB Stuttgart in the UEFA Europa League group stage, drawing 2-2 away and going down 5-1 in Bucharest.

- Steaua's 16 fixtures against German sides have ended W1 D6 L9; away from home it is W0 D3 L6. That includes a 1957/58 European Champion Clubs' Cup first round replay, which Steaua lost 3-1 to Borussia Dortmund on neutral ground in Bologna.

- Steaua's lone victory came in the second leg of that Dortmund tie on 8 December 1957, meaning they have not beaten a Bundesliga side in 14 games spanning almost 56 years.

### Match background

- After a 1-1 home draw with PAOK FC in the play-offs, Jens Keller's Schalke faced an uphill task to qualify in the return when Ádám Szalai's opener was cancelled out and Jermaine Jones sent off. However Julian Draxler and Szalai struck second-half goals to steer Schalke through 4-3 on aggregate.

- Schalke began last season's competition with a 2-1 away win at Olympiacos FC, the first time they had avoided a matchday one defeat in what was their fifth group stage campaign.

- At home Schalke drew 2-2 with Montpellier Hérault SC and Arsenal FC and beat Olympiacos 1-0. In the round of 16 they looked set to make further progress after drawing 1-1 at Galatasaray AŞ but then lost 3-2 at home.

- Steaua are the only Romanian club to have won the European Cup, winning the European Champion Clubs' Cup in 1985/86 by defeating FC Barcelona in a penalty shoot-out.

- This is their first time in the group stage since 2008/09 and their seventh campaign overall. In those 36 matches they have amassed just four wins and 11 draws; away their record is two wins and four draws in 18 games. Their last victory came at FC Dynamo Kyiv on 13 September 2006; since then they have recorded two draws and six defeats.

- Their away form served Laurențiu Reghecampf's team well in this season's qualifying rounds, a 2-2 draw at Legia Warszawa taking them through the play-offs on away goals after a 1-1 home draw.

- In the third qualifying round Gabriel Iancu scored twice to earn the Romanian champions a 2-0 win at FC Dinamo Tbilisi, a 1-1 draw at the Arena Națională ensuring their passage.

- Federico Piovaccari scored the first of his three qualifying goals to help Steaua to overcome FK Vardar 2-1 in Skopje in the second qualifying round. The 3-0 first-leg victory was Steaua's 100th win in UEFA competition in their 265th match.

### Team ties

- Steaua coach Reghecampf had spells as a player in Germany at 1. FC Energie Cottbus, Alemannia Aachen and 1. FC Kaiserslautern. In seven meetings with Schalke he suffered six defeats with a solitary victory.

- During this time he came up against Jens Keller who played for 1. FC Köln (2000-2002) and Eintracht Frankfurt (2002-2005).

- As assistant coach, Keller's VfB Stuttgart eliminated FC Timișoara in the 2009/10 UEFA Champions League play-offs with a 2-0 aggregate victory. Alexandru Bourceanu and Iasmin Latovlevici were with the Romanian club at the

time.

- Łukasz Szukala has both Polish and German citizenship. He started with SV Eintracht Trier 05's youth team before playing for TSV 1860 München and Aachen.
- Substitute Alexandru Chipciu scored an added-time equaliser to earn Romania a 2-2 draw against Szalai's Hungary in a 2014 FIFA World Cup 2014 qualifier in Budapest on 22 March 2013. Ciprian Tătărușanu, Mihai Pintilii and Alexandru Bourceanu also featured for the visitors.
- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar scored in the Netherlands' 2-0 win over Romania in the UEFA EURO 2008 group stage in Berne.

#### General information

- Boateng's first Bundesliga goal in 2,310 days earned Schalke a 1-0 victory at 1. FSV Mainz 05 on Saturday.
- Max Meyer, who turns 18 on the day of the Steaua game, made his first start for Schalke in the play-off first leg against PAOK FC.
- The Royal Blues have conceded nine goals in their first five Bundesliga fixtures – more than they shipped in their opening nine games last term.
- Sead Kolasinac (muscle tear, out since August), Chinedu Obasi (tibia, April) and Kyriakos Papadopoulos (knee, November) have not played this term; Klaas-Jan Huntelaar has missed Schalke's last five games with a knee injury.

- Pintilii scored his first international goal as Romania beat Hungary 3-0 on 6 September, with Tănase also on target. Bourceanu received a booking that ruled him out of the 2-0 home defeat by Turkey four days later.

#### General information

- Steaua are 12 games unbeaten in all competitions this season, scoring in every fixture.
- Steaua are 11 matches unbeaten away from home, a run stretching back to 14 March and the 3-1 defeat at Chelsea FC in the UEFA Europa League round of 16.
- Piovaccari has scored on each of his last four appearances for Steaua.
- Steaua won their 24th title in 2012/13, their first in seven years, by a record 16-point margin. They added a sixth Romanian Super Cup (also a record) by beating cup holders FC Petrolul Ploiești 3-0 on 10 July.

- Having risen through Stuttgart's youth department, Keller made his first and only Bundesliga appearance in 1990 before leaving for third-tier 1860 München, where he helped the club to win promotion to the second and then first divisions.
- A fringe player in the Bundesliga, he moved to second division Wolfsburg and again won promotion, subsequently becoming a top-flight regular and earning a return to Stuttgart, where he played in the 1998/99 UEFA Cup.
- Joined Köln in 2000 but relegated two years later, prompting a switch to Eintracht, whom he helped into the Bundesliga only to miss most of the season with cartilage damage; relegation and further injury problems led to retirement in 2005.
- Took over Stuttgart's Under-19 side in 2008/09 and became Christian Gross's assistant with the first team in December 2009; the following October, replaced Gross as head coach but lasted only two months before making way for Bruno Labbadia, although Keller continued to work for the club as a scout.
- Appointed Schalke's U17 coach in summer 2012; on 16 December that year he stepped up to the senior side following Huub Stevens' departure and took the club to fourth place and a UEFA Champions League berth.

### FC Steaua București: Laurențiu Reghecampf

- A right-back who could also play in midfield, Reghecampf started his career at hometown club Târgoviște before joining Steaua in 1996 aged 21. Stayed four years and won two league titles, one Romanian Cup and one Super Cup, adding a Bulgarian league title during a six-month loan at Litex in 1998/99.
- Moved to Germany in 2000 and spent four years with both Cottbus and Aachen, where he was captain – influencing his mentality, approach and later work as a coach. Hung up his boots in 2009 following a season with Kaiserslautern and returned home to start his managerial career with second division Snagov.
- Moved on to Universitatea Craiova for the second half of 2009/10, helping the club avoid relegation; short spells at Gloria Bistrița and back at both Snagov and Universitatea Craiova followed.
- Took charge of Concordia Chiajna in December 2011 and lifted the club from 17th position to tenth, collecting 34 points from a possible 48 in the second half of the campaign – which won him a return to Steaua 12 years after he had left the club.
- In his first season back led Steaua to a first league title in seven years and the Romanian Super Cup; guided the club into the UEFA Europa League round of 16 and took them into the UEFA Champions League group stage at the start of 2013/14.

## Competition facts

---

### UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 – came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua București) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
