Match background

FC Schalke 04 will bid to extend their winning start in Group E to three games when they take on Chelsea FC, with things looking brighter for the 2012 UEFA Champions League winners after victory at FC Steaua București on matchday two.

- Schalke followed their 3-0 home victory over Steaua on the opening night with a 1-0 win at FC Basel 1893 at the same time as Chelsea were winning 4-0 in Romania. José Mourinho's team therefore have three points, having lost 2-1 at home to Basel on matchday one.

Previous meetings

- These teams last met in the 2007/08 group stage, with the game in Germany ending scoreless; Chelsea were 2-0 victors at Stamford Bridge with goals from Florent Malouda (4) and Didier Drogba (47).

- The lineups in Gelsenkirchen on 6 November 2007 were:

- Before that draw Schalke had won all three home fixtures against English opponents, a sequence spanning 43 years. It started with a first round European Champion Clubs' Cup tie in 1958/59 when they overcame Wolverhampton Wanderers FC 2-1.

- The German team followed the 2007 game with Chelsea by failing to score against their next two English visitors, going down 2-0 to both Manchester City FC in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup group stage and Manchester United FC in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League semi-final first leg.

- They faced another English side in last season's group stage, winning 2-0 at Arsenal FC before a 2-2 draw in Gelsenkirchen. Schalke's home record against English teams is W3 D2 L2.

- Chelsea lost 2-1 at Bayer 04 Leverkusen in the 2011/12 group stage, their fourth defeat in six away games against Bundesliga sides. Their sole victory came at VfB Stuttgart in the 2003/04 round of 16, winning 1-0.

- Chelsea's overall record against Bundesliga opponents is W7 D4 L4. They overcame FC Bayern München in the 2011/12 UEFA Champions League final, winning 4-3 on penalties after a 1-1 draw in their opponents' own Fußball Arena München stadium to lift the trophy for the first time.

- The London club met Bayern again in the UEFA Super Cup in August, losing 5-4 on spot kicks after a 2-2 draw at Prague's Stadion Eden.

- Chelsea defeated German opposition to win the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final in May 1998, Gianfranco Zola scoring the only goal against Stuttgart in Solna.

Match background

- In their fifth group stage campaign, Schalke have emerged as winners of their section in their past two UEFA Champions League participations.

- Apart from the 2-2 draw with Arsenal last season, Schalke gained a point in a 2-2 home draw with Montpellier Hérault SC and also beat Olympiacos 1-0 there. In the round of 16 they looked set to make further progress after drawing 1-1 at Galatasaray AŞ but then lost 3-2 at home.

- The German club have lost only two of their last 13 home fixtures in the competition, qualifying included, winning eight. Schalke drew 1-1 at home to PAOK FC in this season's play-offs, going through with a 3-2 away win.

- Chelsea have finished as winners of their section in seven of their last ten campaigns and qualified for the knockout rounds as runners-up in two of the other years.

- Last year though they became the first UEFA Champions League holders to have their title defence ended in the group stage, losing at FC Shakhtar Donetsk and Juventus after a 4-0 victory at FC Nordsjælland.

- Compensation came swiftly however, with Chelsea going on to beat SL Benfica 2-1 in the UEFA Europa League final in Amsterdam thanks to Branislav Ivanović's header in the last minute of added time.

- With their win in the 2011/12 UEFA Champions League, Chelsea thus became the first side to win UEFA's two top club competitions in reverse order in successive seasons. They also became only the fourth side to win all three of UEFA's major club competitions.

- Mourinho, who has lifted the trophy with both FC Porto (2004) and FC Internazionale Milano (2010), is bidding to become the first manager to win the European Cup with three different teams. Only Bob Paisley (Liverpool FC 1977,

1978, 1981) has won the trophy three times as a coach.

Team ties

- André Schürrle scored for 1. FSV Mainz 05 and Bayer 04 Leverkusen in two victories against Schalke between 2009 and 2013 before his move to London this summer. His other six games against the Royal Blues resulted in two draws and four defeats.
- Schürrle is an international colleague of Benedikt Höwedes, Julian Draxler, Dennis Aogo and Roman Neustädter for Germany.
- Substitute Schürrle scored in Germany's 3-2 win over Ramires' Brazil in a Stuttgart friendly on 10 August 2011. Aogo and Höwedes were on the bench for the home team.
- Kevin-Prince Boateng played for Portsmouth FC in the 2010 FA Cup final against Chelsea, losing 1-0. Petr Čech, Ivanović, John Terry, Ashley Cole and Frank Lampard all lined up in opposition.
- Boateng also played for Tottenham Hotspur FC between 2007 and 2010 and with both clubs lost all three games against the Stamford Bridge side.
- Demba Ba scored in TSG 1899 Hoffenheim's 3-2 win against Schalke on 23 May 2009. In four years with Hoffenheim from 2007 he was unbeaten against Schalke, winning two and drawing two.
- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar scored as the Netherlands lost 4-2 in a friendly against Belgium in Brussels on 15 August 2012. Eden Hazard and Kevin de Bruyne played for the home team.
- De Bruyne was on loan at SV Werder Bremen in 2012/13, losing both games against Schalke.
- Huntelaar and Marko van Ginkel play together for the Netherlands; John Obi Mikel and Chinedu Obasi are teammates for Nigeria.
- Mark Schwarzer has German parents and both Australian and German citizenship. He played for 1. FC Dynamo Dresden in 1994/95 and 1. FC Kaiserslautern the following season, making a total of six Bundesliga appearances.

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- Schalke's haul of six points from two games represents their best start to a group stage in this, their sixth campaign.
- Marco Höger is one booking away from a suspension after picking up yellow cards on matchdays one and two.

General information

- Höger went off with a knee injury on Saturday in a 3-2 victory over bottom side TSV Eintracht Braunschweig. He was replaced by Leon Goretzka, who scored his first Bundesliga goal. Ralf Fährmann made his first competitive appearance since 15 October 2011 in place of the injured Timo Hildebrand (lumbago) in goal.
- Max Meyer scored his first Bundesliga goal for Schalke on 5 October in a 4-1 win against FC Augsburg, adding another on Saturday. He set up a goal for Kevin-Prince Boateng inside 157 seconds of his first start for the club on 28 September in a 3-3 draw at TSG 1899 Hoffenheim having scored his first competitive goal in last month's German Cup win at third-tier SV Darmstadt 98.
- Jefferson Farfán has not featured since suffering a groin injury against FC Basel 1893 on matchday two. Chinedu Obasi (tibia, out since April) and Kyriakos Papadopoulos (knee, November) have not played this term.
- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar returned to training on 14 October after nearly two months out but suffered a relapse of his knee ligament injury and now requires surgery that is expected to sideline him for three to four months.
- On 21 September Schalke lost 4-0 to FC Bayern München – their biggest home defeat in 32 years.
- The Royal Blues have conceded 19 goals in their first nine Bundesliga fixtures – more than they shipped in their opening 15 games last term.

International duty

- Seven Schalke players were on senior duty during the international break: Benedikt Höwedes, Julian Draxler (Germany), Christian Fuchs (Austria), Ádám Szalai (Hungary), Jermaine Jones (United States), Joël Matip (Cameroon), Atsuto Uchida (Japan). Boateng was called up by Ghana but pulled out with a knee problem.

- Chelsea were 29 home group stage games unbeaten prior to their 2-1 loss to FC Basel 1893 on matchday one.
- Chelsea's next draw in UEFA competition will be their 50th.

General information

- The Blues are six matches unbeaten, winning two at home and three out of four on their travels.
- Samuel Eto'o scored his first goal for the club on Saturday in a 4-1 comeback win at home to Cardiff City FC. Petr Čech made his 300th Premier League appearance and Fernando Torres returned from a knee injury suffered at FC Steaua București on matchday two but Ashley Cole and André Schürrle missed out with knocks.
- Marco van Ginkel is expected to be out until March after suffering knee ligament damage against Swindon Town FC on 24 September.
- José Mourinho is unbeaten at Stamford Bridge in 64 Premier League fixtures.

International duty

- There were 14 Chelsea players away on senior international duty last week: Eden Hazard, Kevin De Bruyne (Belgium), Schürrle (Germany), Lampard, Gary Cahill (England), Juan Mata (Spain), John Obi Mikel (Nigeria), Michael Essien (Ghana), Čech (Czech Republic), Branislav Ivanović (Serbia), David Luiz, Ramires, Oscar (Brazil), Samuel Eto'o (Cameroon). Cole was called up by England but pulled out with a rib injury.
- Oscar scored in Brazil's 2-0 friendly victories over South Korea and Zambia, with Luiz skipping the side.
- Schürrle scored his first professional hat-trick – in the space of 19 second-half minutes – as Germany recovered from 2-0 down to win 5-3 in Sweden last Tuesday. De Bruyne struck in Belgium's 1-1 draw with Wales the same night, while Mata's goal sealed a 2-0 win for Spain against Georgia and a place at the FIFA World Cup.
- Four days earlier Schürrle had scored in a 3-0 victory against the Republic of Ireland that booked Germany's place at Brazil 2014; Belgium advanced the same night after winning 2-1 in Croatia.
- Lampard became the eighth England player to win 100 caps in September in a 0-0 draw in Ukraine.

- Having risen through Stuttgart's youth department, Keller made his first and only Bundesliga appearance in 1990 before leaving for third-tier 1860 München, where he helped the club to win promotion to the second and then first divisions.
- A fringe player in the Bundesliga, he moved to second division Wolfsburg and again won promotion, subsequently becoming a top-flight regular and earning a return to Stuttgart, where he played in the 1998/99 UEFA Cup.
- Joined Köln in 2000 but relegated two years later, prompting a switch to Eintracht, whom he helped into the Bundesliga only to miss most of the season with cartilage damage; relegation and further injury problems led to retirement in 2005.
- Took over Stuttgart's Under-19 side in 2008/09 and became Christian Gross's assistant with the first team in December 2009; the following October, replaced Gross as head coach but lasted only two months before making way for Bruno Labbadia, although Keller continued to work for the club as a scout.
- Appointed Schalke's U17 coach in summer 2012; on 16 December that year he stepped up to the senior side following Huub Stevens' departure and took the club to fourth place and a UEFA Champions League berth.

Chelsea FC: José Mourinho

Date of birth: 26 January 1963

Nationality: Portuguese

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC (twice), FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after arriving at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007 but left the club that September.
- Joined Inter in June 2008 and in his first campaign retained the Scudetto, a feat the Nerazzurri repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League title, their first European crown since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before he joined Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and his second brought the Liga title; also led Madrid to three successive UEFA Champions League semi-finals, equalling Sir Alex Ferguson's record of seven last-four appearances, before returning to Chelsea at the start of June 2013.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 – came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
