Match background

FC Basel 1893 lost 1-0 to FC Schalke 04 in their last home fixture in Group E and will be looking for a better result when they play host to FC Steaua Bucureşti, with whom they drew 1-1 on matchday three.

• The Schalke defeat meant that Basel could not build on their surprise 2-1 matchday one victory at Chelsea FC while Steaua lost both opening fixtures, conceding seven goals. The matchday three point at least got them off the mark, although the Romanian champions trail third-placed Basel by three points.

Previous meetings

- This is the fourth successive season that Basel have been paired with Romanian opponents.
- In the 2012/13 UEFA Champions League play-off they lost 2-1 at home to CFR 1907 Cluj and with a 1-0 defeat in the away leg a week later Pantelis Kapetanos scoring the only goal it meant they missed out on a place in the group stage. They faced the same team in the 2010/11 group stage, losing 2-1 away and winning 1-0 at home.
- Basel fared better in 2011/12 when they were paired with FC Oţelul Galaţi in the group stage, winning 2-1 at home and 3-2 in Bucharest.
- Steaua drew on their first two visits to Switzerland, losing on their last two trips.
- Their last encounter was the 2010/11 UEFA Europa League play-off with Grasshopper Club. Both legs ended 1-0 to the home team with Steaua going through 4-3 on penalties. Ciprian Tătăruşanu was the hero, saving two penalty kicks. Kay Voser and Endogan Adili were in the Grasshoppers team.
- After a 2-1 away loss against FC St Gallen in the 2001/02 UEFA Cup first round their aggregate defeat was confirmed in a 1-1 draw in Bucharest.
- The away draws came with resounding home wins which enabled Steaua to go through 8-2 on aggregate against BSC Young Boys in the 1979/80 European Cup Winners' Cup first round and 5-2 against Servette FC in the 1994/95 UEFA Champions League qualifying round.

Match background

- Basel won both their home games to reach the group stage for the fifth time, defeating Maccabi Tel-Aviv FC 1-0 in the third qualifying round (4-3 on aggregate) and PFC Ludogorets Razgrad 2-0 in the play-offs (6-2 on aggregate).
- Last season Basel narrowly failed to become the first Swiss side to make it to the final of a major UEFA club tournament, losing 5-2 on aggregate to Chelsea in the UEFA Europa League semi-finals. The 2-1 first-leg reverse ended a six-game unbeaten home run in Europe.
- Two years ago Basel, apart from the win over Oţelul, also beat Manchester United FC 2-1 and lost 2-0 against SL Benfica at St. Jakob-Park.
- Steaua are the only Romanian club to have triumphed in Europe, winning the European Champion Clubs' Cup in 1985/86 by defeating FC Barcelona in a penalty shoot-out.
- In their first participation in the group stage since 2008/09, the Bucharest club have won just four of their 39 group matches over seven campaigns. Their last victory came at FC Dynamo Kyiv on 13 September 2006, since when they have recorded 15 defeats and five draws.
- Their away form served Laurenţiu Reghecampf's team well in the qualifying rounds, a 2-2 draw at Legia Warszawa taking them through the play-offs on away goals after a 1-1 home draw.
- In the third qualifying round teenager Gabriel lancu scored twice to earn the Romanian champions a 2-0 win at FC Dinamo Tbilisi, a 1-1 draw at the Arena Naţională ensuring their passage. They beat FK Vardar 2-1 away in the second qualifying round and went through 5-1 overall.

Team ties

- Basel vice president Adrian Knup, who played for VfB Stuttgart, scored twice in Switzerland's 4-1 win against Romania in Detroit on 22 June in the 1994 FIFA World Cup.
- Marco Streller scored twice in Stuttgart's 4-2 win against Reghecampf's Alemannia Aachen on 4 November 2006.
- The pair faced each other once more on 31 March 2007 when Streller scored again in Stuttgart's 3-1 win.
- Both coaches spent time as players in the Bundesliga; Reghecampf had nine years there and Murat Yakin two. For both, their last German club was 1. FC Kaiserslautern: Yakin in the second half of 2000/01 and Reghecampf in 2008/09.
- Romania and Switzerland last met on 30 May 2012 for a friendly international in Luzern with Romania winning 1-0. Alexandru Bourceanu, Alexandru Chipciu and Cristian Tănase featured for the visitors while the hosts included Yann

Sommer and Valentin Stocker.

• Daniel Georgievski's Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia were 2-0 winners in a Skopje friendly against Ivan Ivanov's Bulgaria on 14 August 2013.

Basel

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- Basel have never won a game on matchday four of the UEFA Champions League, previously drawing three times and losing once.
- The 2-1 matchday one success at Chelsea FC was the club's first win on English soil at the tenth attempt, ending their hosts' unbeaten home run in the competition that stretched back to 2003.

General information

- Basel are unbeaten on their travels this season, a run of 14 games, though it took a 93rd-minute strike to preserve that record on Saturday as Marco Streller earned a 1-1 draw at FC Aarau. Both their defeats have come at home.
- Valentin Stocker missed Saturday's game with a groin strain while Fabian Schär and Giovanni Sio were suspended. Kwang Ryong Pak made his Swiss Super League debut as a late substitute.
- Fabian Frei and Yann Sommer are ever-present in the Basel starting XI in the league and UEFA Champions League this term.
- Behrang Safari suffered a thigh injury on matchday three and could miss the rest of the group stage.
- Basel have had two players sent off this season, both in wins against FC Lausanne-Sport. Stocker was dismissed in a 2-0 victory on 27 July and Giovanni Sio saw red in a 2-1 away triumph on 6 October.
- Basel won a fourth consecutive league title in 2012/13, matching BSC Young Boys' Swiss top-flight record set between 1956/57 and 1959/60.

Steaua

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

• Of Steaua's UEFA Champions League squad, only Pantelis Kapetanos (with CFR 1907 Cluj) and Ionuţ Neagu (FC Oţelul Galaţi) had played in the group stage before this season.

General information

- Steaua are undefeated in the league this season, winning nine and drawing two of their opening 11 fixtures.
- Mihai Pintilii is expected to sit out matchday four after suffering a recurrence of a muscle strain at home to Basel.
- Steaua won 2-0 at home to ACS Poli Timişoara on 30 October to reach the Romanian Cup quarter-finals for the first time since winning the competition in 2010/11.
- Federico Piovaccari has scored in eight of his last 12 appearances for Steaua in all competitions.
- Alexandru Chipciu was a late substitute as Steaua beat FC Viitorul Constanţa 4-0 on 18 October, his first appearance since having surgery on his tibia in May. He started in the cup against Poli Timişoara.
- Steaua won their 24th title in 2012/13, their first in seven years, by a record 16-point margin. They added a sixth Romanian Super Cup (also a record) by beating cup holders FC Petrolul Ploieşti 3-0 on 10 July.

• The older brother of fellow former Swiss international Hakan Yakin, Basel-born Murat was capped 49 times as a defender and midfielder.

- Won consecutive championships in a five-season spell with Grasshoppers at the beginning of his career. A campaign in Germany with Stuttgart, with whom he was a runner-up in the 1997/98 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final against Chelsea FC, followed before he spent just over a season with Fenerbahçe.
- Of Turkish descent, Yakin returned to Switzerland and Basel during 1999/2000, but was soon off to Kaiserslautern. Re-joined Basel permanently and gained the adoration of the northern club's support, registering seven goals in 32 games during the double-winning 2001/02 season and featuring in Basel's spectacular UEFA Champions League run the next term.
- Made his international debut against the United Arab Emirates in September 1994 but was overlooked for EURO '96 and further disappointments followed as Switzerland failed to qualify for the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cups, as well as UEFA EURO 2000. However, he played all 270 minutes of the Nati's UEFA EURO 2004 campaign in Portugal.
- Retired in 2006 and quickly moved into coaching with Concordia Basel. Rejoined Grasshoppers in 2007 for a twoyear stint as assistant coach before returning to front-line management with Thun, whom he led to promotion from the second tier at the first attempt. Took charge at Luzern in 2011, securing runners-up finishes in the league and Swiss Cup, before becoming Basel coach in October 2012 and ending his first season with the Swiss title.

- A right-back who could also play in midfield, Reghecampf started his career at hometown club Târgovişte before joining Steaua in 1996 aged 21. Stayed four years and won two league titles, one Romanian Cup and one Super Cup, adding a Bulgarian league title during a six-month loan at Litex in 1998/99.
- Moved to Germany in 2000 and spent four years with both Cottbus and Aachen, where he was captain influencing his mentality, approach and later work as a coach. Hung up his boots in 2009 following a season with Kaiserslautern and returned home to start his managerial career with second division Snagov.
- Moved on to Universitatea Craiova for the second half of 2009/10, helping the club avoid relegation; short spells at Gloria Bistriţa and back at both Snagov and Universitatea Craiova followed.
- Took charge of Concordia Chiajna in December 2011 and lifted the club from 17th position to tenth, collecting 34 points from a possible 48 in the second half of the campaign which won him a return to Steaua 12 years after he had left the club.
- In his first season back led Steaua to a first league title in seven years and the Romanian Super Cup; guided the club into the UEFA Europa League round of 16 and took them into the UEFA Champions League group stage at the start of 2013/14.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

Passing distribution


