Match background

Chelsea FC lost their proud European home record on matchday one and they will be looking to make Stamford Bridge a fortress again when they take on FC Schalke 04 having won in Gelsenkirchen last time out.

- José Mourinho's team lost 2-1 at home to FC Basel 1893 but have got back on track with two emphatic away wins, 4-0 at FC Steaua Bucureşti and 3-0 at Schalke. Schalke beat Steaua 3-0 at home before winning 1-0 in Basel.

Previous meetings

- The teams met in the 2007/08 group stage, with Chelsea 2-0 victors in London via goals from Florent Malouda (4) and Didier Drogba (47). The game in Germany ended 0-0.

- The lineups at Stamford Bridge on 24 October 2007 were:

Chelsea: Čech, Ferreira, Alex, Carvalho, Bridge, J Cole (Shevchenko 89), Makelele, Essien (Mikel 70), Lampard, Malouda (Kalou 84), Drogba.

Schalke: Neuer, Rafinha, Westermann, Bordon, Rodríguez (Bajramović 81), Ernst, Jones, Grossmüller (Azaouagh 77) Asamoah (Rakitić 61) Larsen, Løvenkrands.

- The result maintained Chelsea's home record against German visitors which they extended to six games without defeat – winning five and drawing one – in the 2011/12 group stage when beating Bayer 04 Leverkusen 2-0.

- In only one of those fixtures did their opponents manage to score, the 2004/05 quarter-final when FC Bayern München went down 4-2.

- Chelsea's overall record against Bundesliga opponents is W8 D4 L4. They overcame Bayern in the 2011/12 UEFA Champions League final, winning 4-3 on penalties after a 1-1 draw in their opponents' own Fußball Arena München stadium to lift the trophy for the first time.

- The sides met again in the UEFA Super Cup in August, Chelsea losing 5-4 on spot kicks after a 2-2 draw at Prague's Stadion Eden.

- Chelsea also defeated German opposition to win the European Cup Winners' Cup final in May 1998, Gianfranco Zola scoring the only goal against VfB Stuttgart in Solna.

- Schalke faced Arsenal FC in last season's group stage, winning 2-0 with Klaas-Jan Huntelaar and Ibrahim Afellay on target in the final 14 minutes. It was the first time the Gelsenkirchen club had won on English soil, their previous five visits having resulted in four defeats and a draw.

- Schalke went down 4-1 at Manchester United FC in the 2010/11 semi-final second leg, compounding a 2-0 home reverse. In the 1969/70 European Cup Winners' Cup semi-final they lost the away leg 5-1 at Manchester City FC after winning 1-0 at home.

Match background

- The Basel defeat was Chelsea's first in 30 home group stage matches since Beşiktaş JK's 2-0 victory on 1 October 2003. The Blues' record in those 29 games was W22 D7. Overall Chelsea were unbeaten in 13 European fixtures at Stamford Bridge (W11 D2) since a 1-0 reverse against Manchester United FC in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals.

- Chelsea have finished as winners of their group in seven of their last ten campaigns and qualified for the knockout rounds as runners-up in two of the other years.

- Last year, though, they became the first UEFA Champions League holders to have their title defence ended in the group stage, losing at FC Shakhtar Donetsk and Juventus after a 4-0 victory at FC Nordsjælland.

- They won two games at home, against FC Shakhtar Donetsk (3-2) and FC Nordsjælland (6-1), and drew 2-2 against Juventus. Two away defeats left them third in Group E, although they did go on to beat SL Benfica 2-1 in the UEFA Europa League final in Amsterdam thanks to Branislav Ivanović's header in the last minute of added time.

- Chelsea thus became the first side to win UEFA's two top club competitions in reverse order in successive seasons. They also became only the fourth side to win all three of UEFA's major club competitions.

- Mourinho, who has lifted the UEFA Champions League with both FC Porto (2004) and FC Internazionale Milano (2010), is bidding to become the first manager to win the European Cup with three different teams. Only Bob Paisley (Liverpool FC 1977, 1978, 1981) has won the trophy three times as a coach.

- In their fifth group campaign, Schalke were section winners in their past two UEFA Champions League participations.

- Apart from the victory at Arsenal last season, Schalke also won at Olympiacos FC (2-1) and drew 1-1 at Montpellier Hérault SC. In the round of 16 they drew 1-1 at Galatasaray AŞ but then lost 3-2 at home. They have lost just one of

their last 12 European away fixtures.

Team ties

- André Schürrle scored for 1. FSV Mainz 05 and Bayer 04 Leverkusen in two victories against Schalke between 2009 and 2013 before his move to London this summer. His other six games against the Royal Blues resulted in two draws and four defeats.
- Schürrle is an international colleague of Benedikt Höwedes, Julian Draxler, Dennis Aogo and Roman Neustädter for Germany.
- Substitute Schürrle scored in Germany's 3-2 win over Ramires' Brazil in a Stuttgart friendly on 10 August 2011. Aogo and Höwedes were on the bench for the home team.
- Kevin-Prince Boateng played for Portsmouth FC in the 2010 FA Cup final against Chelsea, losing 1-0. Petr Čech, Ivanović, John Terry, Ashley Cole and Frank Lampard all lined up in opposition.
- Boateng also played for Tottenham Hotspur FC between 2007 and 2010 and with both clubs lost all three games against the Stamford Bridge side.
- Demba Ba scored in TSG 1899 Hoffenheim's 3-2 win against Schalke on 23 May 2009. In four years with Hoffenheim from 2007 he was unbeaten against Schalke, winning two and drawing two.
- Huntelaar scored as the Netherlands lost 4-2 in a friendly against Belgium in Brussels on 15 August 2012. Eden Hazard and Kevin De Bruyne played for the home team.
- De Bruyne was on loan at SV Werder Bremen in 2012/13, losing both games against Schalke.
- Huntelaar and Marco van Ginkel play together for the Netherlands; John Obi Mikel and Chinedu Obasi are teammates for Nigeria.
- Mark Schwarzer has German parents and both Australian and German citizenship. He played for 1. FC Dynamo Dresden in 1994/95 and 1. FC Kaiserslautern the following season, making a total of six Bundesliga appearances.

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- Chelsea were 29 home group stage games unbeaten prior to their 2-1 loss to FC Basel 1893 on matchday one.
- Chelsea have won 99 games in UEFA competition and drawn 49.

General information

- The Blues lost 2-0 at Newcastle United FC on Saturday to end their six-match winning run and sequence of nine games unbeaten. Chelsea's haul of five points from their opening five away matches in the league this season is their worst return since 2000/01.
- Burkina Faso midfielder Bertrand Traoré, 18, agreed a four-and-a-half-year contract with Chelsea on 31 October.
- César Azpilicueta scored his first goal for the club and Juan Mata opened his 2013/14 account on 29 October as Chelsea won 2-0 at Arsenal FC in the League Cup. They will face either Southampton FC or Sunderland AFC in the quarter-finals.
- Ashley Cole, out since suffering a rib injury against Norwich City FC on 6 October, returned on 27 October in a 2-1 victory over Manchester City FC. Fernando Torres scored a late winner, only his second league goal of 2013.
- José Mourinho is unbeaten at Stamford Bridge in 65 Premier League fixtures.
- Marco van Ginkel is expected to be out until March after suffering knee ligament damage against Swindon Town FC on 24 September.
- André Schürrle scored his first professional hat-trick as Germany won 5-3 in Sweden on 15 October.
- Eden Hazard has been nominated for the 2014 FIFA Ballon d'Or, which will be announced on 13 January. Mourinho is on the shortlist for the FIFA World Coach of the Year for Men's Football award.

Schalke

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- The 3-0 loss to Chelsea on matchday three was Schalke's worst at home in the UEFA Champions League and equalled their biggest margin of defeat home and away set when they went down 4-1 to Manchester United FC at Old Trafford in 2011.
- Schalke's haul of six points from their first two games represented their best start to a group stage in this, their sixth campaign.
- Marco Höger is one booking away from a suspension after picking up two yellow cards.

General information

- Schalke are seven matches unbeaten away from home, winning six.
- Saturday's 2-0 win at Hertha BSC Berlin was Tim Hildebrand's 100th clean sheet in the Bundesliga, in his 296th league appearance.
- Max Meyer, aged 18 years and 38 days, became the youngest player in Bundesliga history to score in three successive games on 26 October but could not prevent a 3-1 derby defeat at home to Borussia Dortmund. Kevin-Prince Boateng missed a penalty with the score 1-0.
- Meyer scored his first Bundesliga goal for Schalke on 5 October in a 4-1 win against FC Augsburg. He had set up a goal for Boateng inside 157 seconds of his first start for the club on 28 September, a 3-3 draw at TSG 1899 Hoffenheim, and scored his first competitive goal in September's German Cup win at third-tier SV Darmstadt 98.
- Höger suffered cruciate ligament damage in the 3-2 victory over TSV Eintracht Braunschweig on 19 October. Jefferson Farfán has not featured since suffering a groin injury against FC Basel 1893 on matchday two. Chinedu Obasi (tibia, out since April) and Kyriakos Papadopoulos (knee, November) have not played this term but the Greek defender stepped up his recovery with 90 minutes for Schalke's second team on Saturday.
- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar returned to training on 14 October after nearly two months out but suffered a relapse of his knee ligament injury and will be out until the new year.
- On 21 September Schalke lost 4-0 to FC Bayern München – their biggest home defeat in 32 years.

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after arriving at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007 but left the club that September.
- Joined Inter in June 2008 and in his first campaign retained the Scudetto, a feat the Nerazzurri repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League title, their first European crown since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before he joined Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and his second brought the Liga title; also led Madrid to three successive UEFA Champions League semi-finals, equalling Sir Alex Ferguson's record of seven last-four appearances, before returning to Chelsea at the start of June 2013.

FC Schalke 04: Jens Keller

Coaching career: VfB Stuttgart (youth), VfB Stuttgart, FC Schalke 04 (youth), FC Schalke 04

- Having risen through Stuttgart's youth department, Keller made his first and only Bundesliga appearance in 1990 before leaving for third-tier 1860 München, where he helped the club to win promotion to the second and then first divisions.
- A fringe player in the Bundesliga, he moved to second division Wolfsburg and again won promotion, subsequently becoming a top-flight regular and earning a return to Stuttgart, where he played in the 1998/99 UEFA Cup.
- Joined Köln in 2000 but relegated two years later, prompting a switch to Eintracht, whom he helped into the Bundesliga only to miss most of the season with cartilage damage; relegation and further injury problems led to retirement in 2005.
- Took over Stuttgart's Under-19 side in 2008/09 and became Christian Gross's assistant with the first team in December 2009; the following October, replaced Gross as head coach but lasted only two months before making way for Bruno Labbadia, although Keller continued to work for the club as a scout.
- Appointed Schalke's U17 coach in summer 2012; on 16 December that year he stepped up to the senior side following Huub Stevens' departure and took the club to fourth place and a UEFA Champions League berth.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 – came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

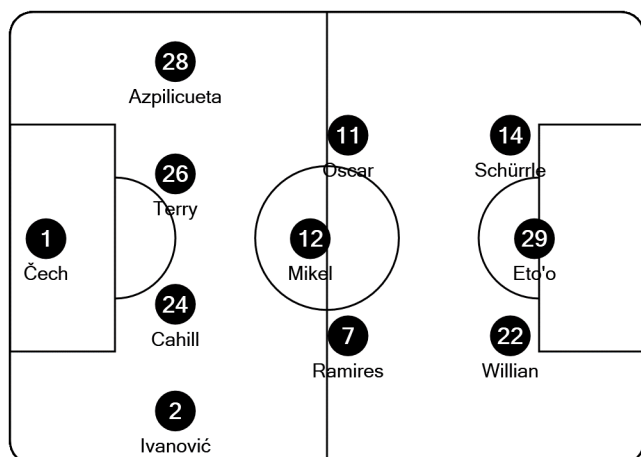

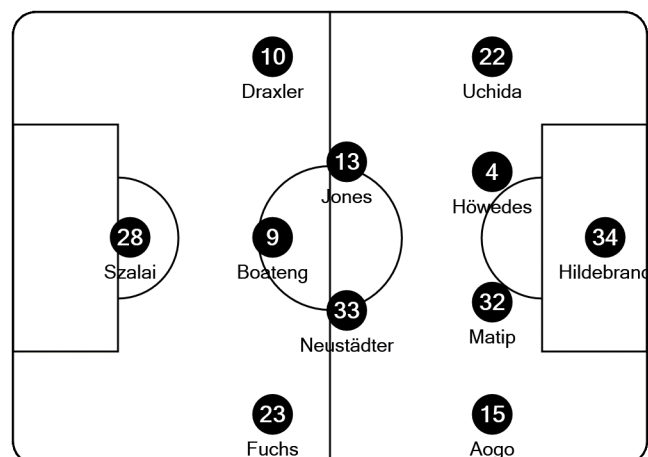

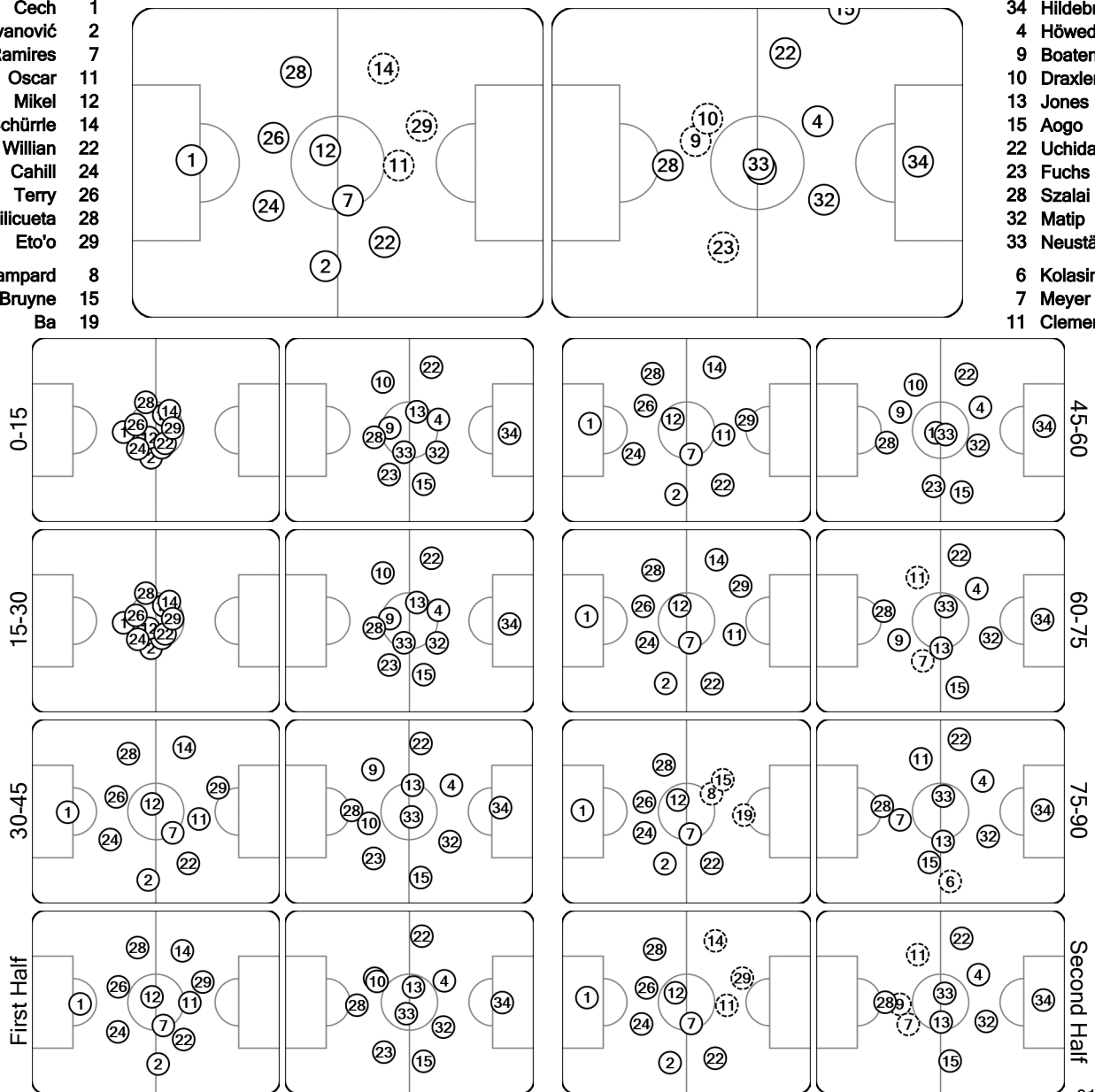
