Match background

Group G leaders Club Atlético de Madrid are looking to make it four wins in a row when they host FK Austria Wien on matchday four.

- Atlético would confirm their qualification for the knockout rounds for the first time since 2008/09 with another victory and would also set a club record for consecutive wins in Europe's elite club competition. Prior to this season their best sequence was three straight victories, posted in their inaugural European Champion Clubs' Cup campaign in 1958/59 when they beat Dublin City FC home and away in the preliminary round and then overcame PFC CSKA Sofia 2-1 at home in the first round.
- Beaten 3-0 at home by Atlético on matchday three, Austria are still seeking their first goal and victory in the UEFA Champions League group stage.

Previous meetings

• Atlético prevailed on the one previous occasion the clubs met, in the 1970/71 European Cup first round. Luis Aragonés and José Gárate scored the goals in a 2-0 first-leg home win and although Eduard Krieger's penalty gave Austria an early lead in the Vienna return, Aragonés and Gárate both struck again to complete a 4-1 aggregate triumph.

Match background

- Atlético have won eight of nine European home games under Diego Simeone, including a 3-1 success against FC Zenit on matchday one.
- Nenad Bjelica's Austria visitors can take heart from three successive clean sheets on the road in this season's UEFA Champions League. Besides their goalless draw at Zenit on matchday two, Austria also drew 0-0 at FH Hafnarfjördur and won 2-0 at GNK Dinamo Zagreb in the qualifying rounds.
- Austria suffered 3-0 home and away losses to Athletic Club in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League group stage. Tomáš Jun, Manuel Ortlechner and Markus Suttner who was sent off in Bilbao are the only survivors of that most recent trip to Spain in September 2009.
- It was in Bilbao that the Austrian side earned their only away win against Liga opposition when beating Athletic 2-1 in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup round of 32, Libor Sionko scoring both goals. They also eliminated Real Zaragoza in a run to the quarter-finals, drawing 2-2 at La Romareda to advance on away goals.
- Austria's overall record in Spain is W1 D2 L6.
- Atlético's only other home encounter with Austrian opponents came against SK Rapid Wien in the 1976/77 European Cup Winners' Cup first round when a 1-1 draw completed a 3-2 aggregate success.

Team ties

- During a six-year spell in Spanish football, Bjelica played for Albacete Balompié, Real Betis Balompié and UD Las Palmas. During that time he lined up against Atlético coach Simeone four times, winning once a 3-2 victory with Betis in March 1997 losing once, and drawing twice.
- Simeone scored in both of their head-to-head meetings in the 1995/96 Liga season, getting the first goal in Spanish double winners Atlético's 2-0 home success against Albacete and an 88th-minute equaliser in a 1-1 away draw.
- Bjelica's overall record against Atlético as a player reads W1 D2 L3. He had a trial with the Madrid club in 1993 but was not offered a contract.
- David Villa was in the Spain squad that won the UEFA EURO 2008 final at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion, Austria's home ground, though he was injured for that game. Villa scored twice at the stadium in Spain's 5-1 friendly win over Austria in November 2009.
- Suttner and Robin Okotie played in Austria's 2-0 friendly victory over Arda Turan's Turkey in Vienna in August 2012. The Atlético player had previously missed an added-time penalty away to an Austria side including Daniel Royer in a goalless UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier in September 2011.
- Okotie is the only survivor of the Austria Wien side that faced Arda's Galatasaray AŞ in Istanbul in a goalless group stage fixture of the 2007/08 UEFA Cup.
- Philipp Hosiner and Christian Ramsebner first came up against Toby Alderweireld in a 2-2 draw between Austria and Belgium in a UEFA European Under-17 Championship qualifier on 23 October 2005.

- Juanfran is a booking away from a suspension after picking up two yellow cards.
- Diego Costa missed matchdays one and two as he finished a four-game ban following his red card against FC Viktoria Plzeň in last season's UEFA Europa League.

General information

- Atlético have won 12 of their last 13 games in all competitions, most recently Sunday's 2-0 home defeat of Athletic Club.
- Diego Costa scored the second goal and now has 12 goals in his past ten outings in all competitions and 15 in 13 in the Liga.
- Diego Godín last week agreed a three-year contract extension, tying him to the club until 2018.
- Atlético have conceded just once in the opening 30 minutes of games this season, Jackson Martínez's 16th-minute strike for FC Porto on matchday two.
- Atlético's eight-match winning start to the Liga, their best ever opening to a domestic campaign, ended with a 1-0 loss at RCD Espanyol on 19 October. They fell one short of Real Madrid CF's league record of nine consecutive wins at the beginning of 1968/69 and it also ended Diego Simeone's side's 17-game unbeaten away run in all competitions.
- Atlético conceded the fewest goals in the Liga (31) last term with Thibaut Courtois now in his third season on loan from Chelsea FC winning the Zamora Trophy, awarded to the goalkeeper with the lowest goals-to-game ratio.

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- This campaign is the club's first in the group stage and they still await their first goal after hitting the woodwork against FC Porto and Club Atlético de Madrid. Five separate scorers struck Austria's five goals in qualifying: Daniel Royer, Marin Leovac, Marko Stanković, Florian Mader and Roman Kienast.
- The 0-0 draw at FC Zenit on matchday two was the first point claimed by an Austrian side in the competition since 2001, when SK Sturm Graz beat Panathinaikos FC 2-1.
- Tomáš Jun and Kienast are the only Austria players with UEFA Champions League experience before this season. Jun appeared 12 times for AC Sparta Praha in 2003/04 and 2004/05 while Kienast played four minutes for SK Rapid Wien against Juventus in 2005/06.
- · Austria became the 128th club from 31 countries to participate in the group stage on matchday one.
- Nenad Bjelica serves a touchline ban after being sent to the stands on matchday three; Philipp Hosiner is a booking away from a suspension after picking up two yellow cards.

General information

- Sunday's 3-0 home defeat of SC Wiener Neustadt ended Austria's seven-game winless run in all competition, although they have lost eight of their last 13 matches in all competitions.
- Seventeen-year-old Sascha Horvath made his Austrian Bundesliga debut as a late substitute on Sunday.
- Before the weekend Bjelica's side had scored just twice in their previous six outings, two goals in 590 minutes in all.
- Austria had also lost five in a row at home, most recently going down 1-0 in the 307th derby against Rapid on 27 October.
- Alexander Grünwald has been out with knee ligament problems since 15 September while Alexander Gorgon is expected to be sidelined until the new year after undergoing knee surgery.
- Stanković has not featured since being forced off with a muscular problem after 14 minutes on matchday three.
- The Violets won the 2012/13 Austrian Bundesliga with a record points total, their tally of 82 surpassing the previous high of 81 set by Sturm Graz in 1997/98.

- Launched career as a combative midfielder with Vélez Sarsfield and was a full Argentinian international at 18, making debut in a July 1988 friendly against Australia; went on to play in three FIFA World Cups and retired as Argentina's most-capped player (106 appearances, 11 goals). Moved to Italy in 1990 to join Pisa; two years later he left for Sevilla, where he played under Argentina's 1986 World Cup-winning coach Carlos Bilardo and for one season alongside Diego Maradona.
- Joined Atlético in 1994 and won the Spanish domestic double in his second season, his first major club honours to add to two Copa América titles (1991 and 1993) plus the 1992 FIFA Confederations Cup with Argentina.
- Enjoyed further success after returning to Italy, winning the UEFA Cup with Inter, plus a Serie A and Coppa Italia double in his debut campaign with Lazio (1999/2000). After four years in Rome, he returned to Madrid for a second spell with Atlético before ending his playing career in Argentina with Racing Club.
- Started coaching career with Racing Club and won Argentinian titles with Estudiantes (2006 Apertura) and River Plate (2008 Clausura); brief spells at San Lorenzo, Italian club Catania and Racing (again) preceded his appointment in December 2011 at Atlético.
- Made immediate impact, leading them to victory in the 2012 UEFA Europa League final against Athletic Club and to a Copa del Rey final triumph over Real Madrid CF in 2013. Even better followed a year later as Atlético held off FC Barcelona and Madrid to win their first league title since 1996.

- Aged 19, Bjelica made his professional debut for home-town club Osijek, scoring seven goals in 23 games in his first full season. In 1992 the Croatian joined Albacete where he spent four successful years before spells at Betis and Las Palmas. In summer 1999 he rejoined Osijek for a year, prior to closing out his career in Germany and Austria.
- The playmaker, voted Croatia's player of the year in 2000, was awarded his international debut against Austria in 2001 and was capped nine times by his country. He made two appearances at UEFA EURO 2004 in Portugal.
- Bjelica started life in the dugout in autumn 2007 as player-coach at Kärnten registering 29 Austrian second division outings that season.
- Then hung up his boots but remained in charge until early 2009, subsequently taking over at Lustenau and Wolfsberger, whom he guided from the third tier to the Austrian Bundesliga.
- During his final campaign with Wolfsberger, in 2012/13, Bjelica's side missed out on UEFA Europa League qualification by a solitary point. Bjelica left his post to replace Peter Stöger at Austria Wien and soon led his new employers to the UEFA Champions League group stage.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.






