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Previous meetings

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Match background

There will be a new face and an old face on show when FC Barcelona take on AFC Ajax in their opening Group H fixture. For home coach Gerardo Martino it is a first UEFA Champions League match since taking the Barça helm in the summer, while for his opposite number Frank de Boer this is a return to the club he played for between 1999 and 2003.

- Martino's task will be to continue Barcelona's recent history of success in the competition and his first assignment comes against an Ajax side whose goal is to progress to the knockout rounds for the first time since 2005/06.
- Surprisingly this is the first meeting between two clubs with a long history of European Cup success and a shared connection in the famous figure of Johan Cruyff, who won the trophy three times with Ajax as a player before coaching Barcelona to their first title in 1992.

Match background

- Prior to their 3-0 semi-final home loss to FC Bayern München in May, the Blaugrana had gone 21 matches unbeaten at the Camp Nou in the UEFA Champions League, winning 16 of them.
- This is Barcelona's first home fixture against a Dutch team since a 2-2 draw with PSV Eindhoven in 1997/98 during the reign of Louis van Gaal, a UEFA Champions League winner as Ajax coach in 1995. Their last home victory against Dutch visitors was back in 1983/84 and a 2-0 success against NEC Nijmegen in the European Cup Winners' Cup second round. Barcelona's overall home record against Eredivisie opposition is W3 D3 L0.
- In each of the past three UEFA Champions League campaigns, Ajax have met Real Madrid CF in the group stage, and lost both home and away. Last season they went down 4-1 in both meetings.
- Overall Ajax are on an eight-game losing streak against Spanish opposition, their last success 1-0 at home against RC Celta de Vigo in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Ajax coach De Boer was playing his brother Ronald scored when the Amsterdam side last won in Spain, a 3-2 extra-time success at Club Atlético de Madrid in the 1996/97 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals.
- The Dutch title holders took one point on their travels in last term's group stage and then lost 2-0 at FC Steaua Bucureşti in the UEFA Europa League round of 32 before elimination on penalties.

Team ties

- As a Barcelona player, De Boer won the Spanish league title in 1999 alongside twin brother Ronald.
- De Boer scored twice against Spain as a Netherlands player, hitting the winner in a 2-1 friendly victory on the night Carles Puyol made his international debut in November 2000. He later got the only goal when the Oranje beat Spain in another friendly in March 2002, with Puyol once more in opposition.
- De Boer was an assistant coach of the Netherlands team beaten 1-0 in the 2010 FIFA World Cup final by a goal from Andrés Iniesta.
- Bojan Krkić scored 26 times in 104 Liga appearances for Barcelona between 2007 and 2011.
- In two seasons with Sevilla FC between 2006 and 2008 Christian Poulsen came up against Barcelona six times, winning once.
- As an Arsenal player, Cesc Fàbregas faced Ajax in the 2005/06 group stage, winning 2-1 in Amsterdam in September 2005 and drawing 0-0 in London three months later. The following season he was in the Arsenal side eliminated on away goals by PSV Eindhoven in the round of 16. Javier Mascherano's Liverpool FC beat PSV in the next round.
- Niklas Moisander captained Finland in their 1-1 draw with Spain in a 2014 World Cup qualifier in Gijon on 22 March this year. Iniesta, Fàbregas, Víctor Valdés, Gerard Piqué, Sergio Busquets, Jordi Alba and substitute Pedro Rodríguez all featured for Spain.
- Moisander was also Finland skipper in their 2-0 home defeat by Spain on 6 September, Alba scoring the visitors' first goal in Helsinki. Iniesta, Xavi, Fàbregas and Pedro were also in the Spain lineup.
- Danny Hoesen was in the Netherlands side beaten 3-0 by Spain in the group stage of June's UEFA European Under-21 Championship a match that Martín Montoya, Marc Bartra and Cristian Tello watched from the bench.

UEFA milestones and competition statistics

- Víctor Valdés became the 17th player to reach 100 UEFA Champions League appearances in Barcelona's semifinal, second-leg defeat by FC Bayern München last season.
- That tie was the Blaugrana's sixth consecutive appearance in the UEFA Champions League semi-finals, a tournament record. The 7-0 defeat over two legs represented Barça's heaviest aggregate loss in UEFA club competition.
- Lionel Messi has scored 59 UEFA Champions League goals and is behind only Raúl González (71).

- Barça had 11 players on senior duty during the international break: Víctor Valdés, Jordi Alba, Xavi Hernández, Andrés Iniesta, Pedro Rodríguez, Cesc Fàbregas (Spain), Alexis Sánchez (Chile), Messi (Argentina), Daniel Alves, Neymar (Brazil) and Alex Song (Cameroon).
- Alba registered his fifth senior international goal in Spain's 2-0 FIFA World Cup qualifying win away to Finland on 6 September. Four days later Pedro set up both of La Roja's goals in a 2-2 friendly international draw with a Chile side featuring Alexis Sánchez.
- Messi netted a penalty in each half as Argentina booked their place at the 2014 FIFA World Cup with a 5-2 win away to Paraguay on 10 September. Javier Mascherano was suspended for the encounter.
- Neymar found the net for Brazil in their 6-0 friendly victory over Australia in Brasilia, adding a solo effort in a 3-1 success against Portugal played in the United States.
- Tello, Martín Montoya and Marc Bartra were in the Spain team that won this summer's UEFA European Under-21 Championship in Israel. Tello made his senior international debut in Spain's 2-0 friendly win in Ecuador last month.
- Alves and Neymar won the FIFA Confederations Cup in June, winning the final 3-0 in Rio de Janeiro against a Spain team featuring Iniesta, Xavi, Pedro, Sergio Busquets, Alba and Gerard Piqué, who was sent off.

General information

- Gerardo Martino became the fourth Argentinian after Helenio Herrera, Roque Olsen and César Luis Menotti to take up the reigns at Barcelona after Tito Vilanova stepped down for health reasons in July.
- Alves did not register in the Liga last season but already has two goals to his name this term.
- Despite a hamstring injury towards the end, Messi contributed 46 of Barça's club record 115 Liga goals last term and became the first player to score against every opponent in the division consecutively. He scored his 23rd hat-trick for Barça in the 3-2 win against Valencia CF on 1 September.
- The club's Spanish Super Cup success against Club Atlético de Madrid in August represented Xavi's 25th career title and 22nd with Barcelona. The midfielder is Spanish football's most decorated player.
- · Adriano (2017), Busquets and Tello (both 2018) all signed improved deals at Barcelona over the summer.
- Carles Puyol and Isaac Cuenca both underwent knee surgery over the summer. Alba tore his right hamstring in Saturday's 3-2 defeat of Sevilla FC.

- Ajax have scored 549 goals in UEFA competition.
- Ajax have failed to win any of their last four UEFA Champions League group stage games away from home, since prevailing 2-0 at GNK Dinamo Zagreb on 18 October 2011.
- The Dutch champions conceded 16 times in the group stage last season; only FC Nordsjælland shipped more (22).

- Seven of Frank de Boer's men were called up for senior duty during the international break: Kenneth Vermeer (Netherlands), Nicolai Boilesen, Viktor Fischer (Denmark), Kolbeinn Sigthórsson (Iceland), Niklas Moisander (Finland), Thulani Serero (South Africa), Eyong Enoh (Cameroon).
- Sigthórsson scored Iceland's second in Switzerland as they came from 4-1 down to draw 4-4 in FIFA World Cup qualifying on 6 September. Four days later he hit the winner in a 2-1 victory against Albania.
- Mike van der Hoorn headed in the third Netherlands goal in the 4-0 Under-21 qualifying win against Scotland on 5 September; Lesley de Sa made his U21 bow four days later in the 1-0 victory over Luxembourg.

General information

- Thulani Serero scored his first goal in over a year on Saturday as Ajax won 2-1 at home to PEC Zwolle.
- Club captain Siem de Jong made his comeback on Saturday after a collapsed lung that had kept him out since the 3-2 defeat by AZ Alkmaar on 11 August. That loss ended Ajax's 15-match unbeaten run in the league.
- Last season's Dutch title was a third successive championship under Frank de Boer, matching the achievement of Rinus Michels (1966, 1967, 1968) and Louis van Gaal (1994, 1995, 1996) as Ajax coach.
- De Boer signed a new four-year contract in May that runs until 30 June 2017. Daley Blind (until 2016) and Joël Veltman (2017) also agreed new deals.

- An attacking central midfielder, Martino commonly known as 'Tata' took his first steps in the game at Newell's Old Boys, the club that would have a heavy influence on his playing and coaching career.
- Made first-team for Rosario-based side as a 17-year-old and went on to score 38 goals in a club record 505 appearances over three spells, captaining the team as they won four domestic titles in five years between 1988 and 1992.
- A former Argentina international, Martino's only experience in Europe as a player came with Tenerife where he scored once in 15 Liga games. Later influenced by Marcelo Bielsa, the 50-year-old began his coaching career in Argentina's lower divisions.
- Impressed in Paraguay with Libertad and Cerro Porteño, gaining championship-winning experiences that would lead to chance to take charge of Paraguay; took the national team to the 2010 FIFA World Cup quarter-finals and the Copa América final the following year.
- Agreed a return to Newell's in 2012 and immediately improved the side's fortunes, leading them to victory in the 2013 Torneo Final; subsequently agreed to take over at Barça on a two-year deal following Tito Vilanova's enforced departure.

AFC Ajax: Frank de Boer

Date of birth: 15 May 1970

Coaching career: AFC Ajax (youth), Netherlands (assistant), Ajax

- Started as a left-back but matured into a dominant centre-half at Ajax, where he came through the ranks along with his twin Ronald. Broke into the first team aged 18, winning the first of five Eredivisie titles in 1990.
- Part of the team that lifted the 1992 UEFA Cup, he helped Ajax beat AC Milan in the 1995 UEFA Champions League final in Vienna, adding the UEFA Super Cup and European/South American Cup later that year. Won the domestic double in 1997/98, his last full season with Ajax before moving to Barcelona with Ronald. A Liga title followed in 1999 and De Boer made over 150 appearances for the Catalan giants.
- Moved to Galatasaray in summer 2003, signing for Rangers the following January. Hung up his boots in 2006 after a spell in Qatar, ending a career that also brought 112 Netherlands caps. De Boer was in the Oranje side that reached the 1998 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000 semi-finals, missing two penalties in a defeat by Italy in the latter.
- Returned to Ajax as a youth coach in 2007 and the following year was appointed assistant to Bert van Marwijk with the senior national side, who reached the 2010 World Cup final.
- In December 2010 he was installed as Ajax's caretaker coach following Martin Jol's departure, good results subsequently earning him a permanent deal as his first season in charge ended with the club's first league title since 2004. After completing a hat-trick of Eredivisie crowns in 2013, equalling the record of Rinus Michels and Louis van Gaal, he signed a new contract until summer 2017.

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with seven triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011 and 2014 came from 11 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008 and 2012 and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001 and 2013 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan, who made their sixth appearance in 2007. Real Madrid CF, however have four final victories (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014), one more than both AC Milan (1994, 2003, 2007) and FC Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011).
- With 26, Italy has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Spain has recorded 14 wins from 24 final appearances; England has 12 wins from 19 final appearances, with Germany on 17 appearances, (seven wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been five finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia CF 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea FC in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 FC Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley and in 2014 Real Madrid overcame Club Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city.
- In the previous 22 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 16 outright wins and six matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 59 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on five occasions; there have been four 1-1 draws, and three finals have finished 1-0.
- Sixteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, including the 2014 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other ten finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008 and 2012 when Chelsea defeated Bayern 4-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007) and Diego Milito (FC Internazionale Milano 2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) and Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United FC 2008, Real Madrid CF 2014) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals part of an exclusive club of 17 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Paolo Maldini's goal 51 seconds into the 2005 showpiece is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) equalled.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United

(2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
