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### Match background

Rivals on the road to UEFA EURO 2008™ Sweden and Spain will meet again in their second Group D fixture in Innsbruck, each aiming to take another stride towards to the last eight.

- Spain started the tournament in impressive fashion, beating Russia 4-1 in Innsbruck on Monday as David Villa became the seventh player to score a hat-trick in UEFA European Championship finals history. After Villa's treble (20, 44, 75), Cesc Fàbregas restored Spain's three-goal winning margin in added time following Roman Pavlyuchenko's 86th-minute reply for Russia.

- Sweden joined Spain on three points later in the day when they defeated reigning champions Greece 2-0 in Salzburg through second-half goals from Zlatan Ibrahimović (67) and Petter Hansson (72).

- The target for both sides is to build on their winning starts. Spain fans, in particular, will need no reminding that their favourites won their opening match at UEFA EURO 2004™ – 1-0 against Russia – yet failed to get out of their group.

- The two teams will need little introduction after their contests in qualifying, when each claimed a home victory against the other. Sweden defeated Spain 2-0 early in the qualifying campaign – in Solna on 7 October 2006 – winning through goals from Johan Elmander (ten minutes) and Marcus Allbäck (82).

- Spain gained revenge with a 3-0 triumph at the Santiago Bernabéu on 17 November last year, Joan Capdevila (14), Andrés Iniesta (39) and Sergio Ramos (65) the scorers. That result secured the home side's qualification and meant they eventually finished two points above their Scandinavian opponents at the top of Group F.

- Overall, Spain have got the better of the countries' head-to-head meetings. They were 2-1 winners in the first ever encounter at the 1920 Olympic Games and the matches since then have produced three wins for Sweden, four for Spain and four draws.
- Sweden beat Spain 3-1 in the final round of the 1950 FIFA World Cup. Stig Sundqvist, Bror Mellberg and Karl-Erik Palmer scored for the Scandinavians and Zarra found the net for Spain – the result, however, helped neither team as they filled the bottom two places of the section, below winners Uruguay and Brazil.
- It was 28 years before the sides met again on the big stage, Spain overcoming Sweden 1-0 in the first round of the 1978 World Cup through a Juan Manuel Asensi strike.
- Spain coach Luis Aragonés enjoyed success against Swedish opposition in his playing days. As a striker with Club Atlético de Madrid, he scored in both legs of a European Champion Clubs' Cup victory against Malmö FF in the first round of the 1966/67 competition. Atlético prevailed 2-0 in Sweden, then 3-1 at home to progress as 5-1 aggregate winners.
- Spanish internationals Capdevila and Marcos Senna were in the Villarreal CF team that defeated IF Elfsborg 2-0 in a UEFA Cup group stage fixture in Spain in December. Sweden midfielder Anders Svensson was part of an Elfsborg side eliminated with that reverse.
- Sweden striker Markus Rosenberg scored past Spain goalkeeper Iker Casillas when he got the opening goal in Werder Bremen's 3-2 victory against Real Madrid CF in the UEFA Champions League group stage in November.
- Sweden striker Henrik Larsson played alongside Spain's Xavi Hernández, Andrés Iniesta and Carles Puyol during his two years with FC Barcelona between 2004 and 2006.
- Spain's Fàbregas played alongside Sweden midfielders Fredrik Ljungberg and Sebastian Larsson during their time at Arsenal FC.
- Kim Källström registered one of Sweden's goals in a 2-0 home success against Spain en route to a 3-1 aggregate win in a November 2003 play-off for the 2004 UEFA European Under-21 Championship.
- Sweden are participating in their fourth EURO finals in Austria/Switzerland. Their best performance came in 1992 when they reached the semi-finals on home soil.
- Spain are playing in their fourth successive EURO finals. Runners-up in 1984, they lifted the European crown in 1964 when they beat the USSR 2-1 on home soil in Madrid.
- This is the 13th edition of the UEFA European Championship and the eighth edition that features a final tournament with a group phase.

### Match facts

#### SWEDEN

##### UEFA EURO 2008™ statistics

- No Sweden player has appeared in all 13 matches in qualifying and at these finals, although Anders Svensson, Petter Hansson, Christian Wilhelmsson and Mikael Nilsson have all missed just one game.
- Of the final 23-man squad six players did not feature in qualifying: Johan Wiland, Fredrik Stoor, Andreas Granqvist, Mikael Dorsin, Sebastian Larsson and Henrik Larsson. The latter started against Greece, however.
- Marcus Allbäck was Sweden's top scorer in qualifying with six goals, two more than Johan Elmander. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- Allbäck also set up three goals, with Slovakia's Ján Kozák the leading assist provider with seven.
- Elmander had 17 shots on goal in qualifying, with Cristiano Ronaldo having the most with 31.
- Sweden scored 23 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.92 goals per game. Germany led the way overall having found the net 35 times.
- Sweden also conceded nine goals, with Czech Republic, the Netherlands and France having the best defensive records allowing just five goals each.

- Of the teams at UEFA EURO 2008™, only Greece and Turkey, with 63 each, managed fewer shots on goal in qualifying than Sweden's total of 62 attempts on target. Portugal had the most shots on goal with 101.

### Latest information

#### • Tuesday 10 June: Greece 0-2 Sweden (Ibrahimović 67, Hansson 72)

Second-half goals from Zlatan Ibrahimović and Hansson gave Lars Lagerbäck's team all three points in their opening Group D match in Salzburg. Sweden were unable to pick a way through a characteristically disciplined Greece defence until a moment of inspiration from Ibrahimović. Hansson added a second five minutes later.

- Sweden coach Lars Lagerbäck said: "Greece are a very tough team to play against. We knew it was very important to win the opening match and we've done that. We also knew Greece might have five defenders – we thought Zlatan and Henrik [Larsson] would generate a certain amount of respect and we had prepared the players for that. Zlatan's goal was a beautiful one and it was also a very good move – but the finish was world-class, wonderful to see. The whole team played very well – it's not perfect but it's very close to it.

- It was Ibrahimović's first international goal in 14 games, a run stretching back almost three years to October 2005 when he struck against Iceland in a FIFA World Cup qualifier.

- Strike partner Henrik Larsson was also ending a long wait. It was his first competitive international since the 2-0 defeat by Germany in the last 16 of the 2006 FIFA World Cup.

### Injury news

- The Greece win came at a cost as right winger Wilhelmsson tore his hamstring in the closing stages and according to Sweden team doctor he "probably won't be able to play again in the tournament".

- Right-back Niclas Alexandersson had gone off moments earlier after a strained calf muscle, and will miss the Spain game. "Had it been a more serious strain my EURO would have been over," said the IFK Göteborg player.

- Sweden's pre-tournament preparations were hit by injuries to Ibrahimović (knee) and Fredrik Ljungberg (rib), yet both started against Greece. Markus Rosenberg and Elmander (foot) have also had niggles but took their places on the substitutes' bench.

- Tobias Linderöth has just returned from a six-month lay-off with a hip injury, scoring on his comeback against Slovenia at the end of May.

### Miscellaneous

- Henrik Larsson came out of international retirement to take his place in Austria and Switzerland. Lars Lagerbäck showed a sense of theatre as he named Sweden's UEFA EURO 2008™ squad on 13 May, saying he would announce them in a random order and then leaving Larsson until last, his name greeted by a cheer among the Swedish press corps. The 36-year-old quit international football on 17 July 2006.

- Sweden geared up for the finals with a training camp in Stenungsund, north of Gothenburg, combining regular training with a series of team-building exercises like boat trips and fishing. On 29 May they travelled to Stockholm before leaving for Switzerland and their base at Lugano.

- Sebastian Larsson turned 23 on 6 June, Sweden's National Day.

### Domestic information

- Ibrahimović struck 17 goals in 26 Serie A appearances as FC Internazionale Milano claimed the Scudetto. He struggled with injury during the final stages of the season but returned for the final game, coming on as a 51st-minute substitute and scoring twice against Parma FC to seal the title. He did not feature at all in the Nerazzurri's Coppa Italia campaign, however, which ended in final defeat by AS Roma.

- Kim Källström secured the double in France, playing a crucial role as Olympique Lyonnais claimed the league and cup together for the first time.

- Alexandersson is also a reigning champion with IFK Göteborg, albeit a title that was claimed last October as the Swedish league is played out over the summer.

- No Spain player has appeared in all 13 matches in qualifying and at these finals, although David Villa, Sergio Ramos and Andrés Iniesta all missed just one game.
- Of the final 23-man squad six players did not feature in qualifying: Andrés Palop, Fernando Navarro, Álvaro Arbeloa, Santi Cazorla, Rubén de la Red and Sergio García. Cazorla came on as a substitute against Russia.
- Villa was Spain's top scorer in qualifying with seven goals, three more than Xavi Hernández while Iniesta contributed three goals. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.
- Villa had 22 shots on goal in qualifying, with Cristiano Ronaldo having the most with 31.
- Spain scored 23 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.92 goals per game. Germany led the way overall having found the net 35 times.
- Spain also conceded eight goals, with Czech Republic, the Netherlands and France having the best defensive records allowing just five goals each.
- Spain won more corners than anyone else in qualifying, earning a total of 110 at an average of 9.17 per game.
- The Iberian side committed only 85 fouls in qualifying at an average of 7.08 per match – fewer than any other side.

#### Latest information

##### • Spain 4-1 Russia (Villa 20 44 75, Fàbregas 90; Pavlyuchenko 86)

A scintillating hat-trick from Villa gave Spain a clear-cut victory in their first outing. Combining brilliantly with strike partner Fernando Torres, Villa was in fine touch, his second coming from a stunning team move. Roman Pavlyuchenko's header reduced the arrears before substitute Cesc Fàbregas made it 4-1 in stoppage time.

- Spain coach Luis Aragonés said: "David Villa is a born goalscorer and he's in form – it's as simple as that. We like to counterattack and when we control the ball with such purpose then we'll score goals and make life difficult for any team. Of course a result like this will help our confidence and help in the process of changing our reputation. Today I would have liked us to score a couple more because the chances were there."
- Villa became only the seventh player in finals history to score three in a game, his treble the first in a EURO since Patrick Kluivert's against Yugoslavia eight years ago. Sérgio Conceição, Marco van Basten, Michel Platini (twice), Klaus Allofs and Dieter Müller have also hit finals hat-tricks.
- It was Fàbregas' first ever international goal after 27 caps.

#### Injury news

- Villa (right thigh muscle), Torres (sprained ankle) and Sergio García (ankle) all played against Greece, despite picking up knocks in training on the eve of the match against the United States. Iniesta also sat out the US fixture because of a virus.

#### Miscellaneous

- Bojan Krkić is not at UEFA EURO 2008™ after admitting to suffering from fatigue caused by a year of competitive football. The 17-year-old said that he and Spain coach Aragonés had "reached a pact" and that, after talking, both parties agreed the youngster needed a break.
- Daniel Güiza admits he once nodded off while sitting at the back of the briefing room when Aragonés was in charge at Mallorca. He said: "It's happened twice, but with Aragonés it was when I was exhausted. The screen of the television was really small, I could barely see anything and I dropped off. Not once, but twice."

- Former Austrian international Kurt Jara played a big part in bringing Spain to their UEFA EURO 2008™ training camp in Neustift. The one-time Valencia CF midfielder is a native of the tiny, picturesque community just outside Innsbruck, and having struck up a friendship with Aragonés during his time in Spain he suggested that La Furia Roja live and train in the countryside of his youth.

### **Domestic information**

- Iker Casillas and Ramos were key components as Real Madrid CF defended their Primera División crown in Spain. Casillas missed just two games all season – though that is more than in any of his previous five league campaigns – and conceded just 32 goals to earn the annual Zamora Trophy, awarded to the keeper that lets in the fewest goals in Spain.
- Valencia CF quartet Raúl Albiol, Carlos Marchena, David Silva and Villa endured nothing but frustration by comparison as their side struggled to tenth. There was some consolation, however, as Valencia beat a Getafe CF team that included De la Red in the Copa del Rey final.
- Palop and Güiza also had cause to celebrate. Palop claimed his fifth trophy in 15 months with Sevilla FC when they beat Real Madrid in the Spanish Super Cup while RCD Mallorca's Güiza ended as the Primera División's top scorer with 27 goals.

Head coach

**Sweden: Lars Lagerbäck**

**Date of birth:** 16 July 1948

**Nationality:** Swedish

**Playing career:** Alby FF, Gimonäs CK

Lars Lagerbäck oversaw Sweden's progress to a record fifth successive major tournament when they qualified for UEFA EURO 2008™ as the second-placed team in Group F behind Spain. For the coach himself it was his second consecutive qualifying success since he took sole charge of the national side when Tommy Söderberg, with whom he had shared the reins, stepped down after UEFA EURO 2004™.

Lagerbäck started out as Söderberg's right-hand man in 1998 before earning equal billing two years later. He was regarded as Sweden's master tactician while his colleague played more of a hands-on role. The pair had an unhappy final tournament at UEFA EURO 2000™, but qualified for the 2002 FIFA World Cup, eliminating Argentina in the group stage before losing narrowly to Senegal in the second round. UEFA EURO 2004™ also ended in frustration as the Swedes succumbed on penalties to the Netherlands in the quarter-finals.

With Söderberg having departed, Lagerbäck – now assisted by Roland Andersson – led Sweden to the 2006 World Cup finals where they lost 2-0 to hosts Germany in the first knockout round. Lagerbäck nevertheless said he would stay to lead the team to UEFA EURO 2008™ and in January signed a new deal that will take him to the end of Sweden's 2010 World Cup campaign.

Born in July 1948, Lagerbäck was a lower league player with Alby FF and Gimonäs CK, then began his coaching career in 1977 with Kilafors IF. After spells with two other modest club sides, Arbrå BK and Hudiksvalls ABK, he joined the Swedish Football Association as a youth coach in 1990. He did that job from 1990 to 1995 before running the national 'B' team and then joining forces with Söderberg.

Luis Aragonés faced a test of his credentials in the early stages of Spain's UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying campaign, when successive defeats in Northern Ireland and Sweden left them with three points from a possible nine. However, this vastly experienced coach soon led the Spanish out of their 'crisis' and they took 25 points out of the next 27 en route to qualifying as Group F winners.

Born in 1938 in Hortaleza, Madrid, Aragonés represented Real Betis Balompié, Real Oviedo and RC Recreativo de Huelva as a player but made his biggest impact in a decade at Club Atlético de Madrid from 1964 where his scoring touch and set-piece expertise earned him the nickname 'Zapatones' (Big boots). Moving straight into coaching after retiring in 1974, the no-nonsense coach with a notoriously short temper has not always had it easy. Indeed he briefly retired from football in 1986 due to mental illness before leading Atlético to the Copa del Rey in 1992.

His crowning achievement with Atlético came when they captured the league and cup double in 1995/96, and he then moved on to spells at FC Barcelona, Sevilla FC, Valencia CF, RCD Espanyol, Betis, Oviedo and RCD Mallorca before taking over from Iñaki Sáez as Spain coach following UEFA EURO 2004™. Aragonés's first challenge was to take Spain to the 2006 FIFA World Cup, which he achieved via the play-offs. At the finals, Spain won many admirers as they cruised through their group but then lost 3-1 to France in the last 16. It was their first defeat in 25 matches but Aragonés had done enough to earn a new two-year contract, although he announced in November 2007 he would not renew it after UEFA EURO 2008™.

Pieter Vink has made great strides in recent years after being the man in the middle for the 2006 Dutch Cup final as AFC Ajax beat PSV Eindhoven 2-1 in Rotterdam and earning his first appointment in the UEFA Champions League the following November.

The policeman from Noordwijkerhout has been on the FIFA list since 2001, but actually began refereeing back in 1987. His first European appointment came with two UEFA European Under-17 Championship matches involving eventual semi-finalists Portugal back in March 2004, as Greece and Israel were defeated 2-0 and 3-0 respectively. By that August, he had worked his way up to U21 level but a major honour was still to come his way in the U19 category in May 2005.

Vink was given the honour of officiating at the 2004/05 UEFA European Under-19 Championship final played in Belfast, which France won 3-1 against England. It was his third match of the finals in Northern Ireland. A keen family man who enjoys a round of golf, Vink has been a regular face in the UEFA Cup in recent years. He has also been in charge for UEFA Champions League qualifiers and had his first taste of UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying with Norway's 4-1 win in Hungary in September 2006.

### Competition facts

#### UEFA European Championship: Did you know?

- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has appeared in two victorious finals.
- Since 1980, when the tournament became an eight-team event, the hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals – or better – twice. Italy finished second in Group 2 in 1980, when only the top side in each section progressed to the final, and in 2000 Belgium – co-hosts with the Netherlands, who did reach the semi-finals – came third in their section.
- UEFA EURO 2008™ is Germany's tenth successive UEFA European Championship final tournament, more appearances than any other side – they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the sixth successive edition.
- Italy are bidding to become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France claimed the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000™.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals; for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller and France's Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Yuri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinedine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry.
- Having played in Manchester United FC's UEFA Champions League final victory in Moscow on 21 May, Edwin van der Sar, Patrice Evra, Nani and Cristiano Ronaldo can join the exclusive band of five players who have appeared in European Champion Clubs' Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year. Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breukelen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka won the European Cup with PSV and Real Madrid CF in 1988 and 2000 respectively yet remaining on the bench for the Netherlands' and France's European Championship triumphs in those years. Anelka's Madrid and France team-mate from 2000, Christian Karembou, holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both final victories in the same year.
- A total of ten players have been UEFA European Championship final losers after appearing in a European Cup victory: Sepp Maier, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Franz Beckenbauer and Uli Hoeness (1976, FC Bayern München and West Germany) and Paulo Ferreira, Ricardo Carvalho, Nuno Valente, Costinha, Maniche and Deco (2004, FC Porto and Portugal).
- Conversely six Chelsea players – Petr Čech, Claude Makelele, Carvalho, Michael Ballack, Florent Malouda and Anelka – could join a list of four players who followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Hörst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

UEFA information

**Platini positive**

UEFA President Michel Platini has given a positive overview of the first eight matches at UEFA EURO 2008™. "There is no denying that the instructions calling for respect have had an undeniable impact. On the field – and this is the most significant effect – we have seen a spectacular decrease in the number of yellow and red cards. In fact, no red cards have been shown so far and the number of yellow cards is down by 40 per cent compared with UEFA EURO 2004™. In the stadiums, there have been no incidents to report; the crowds have been enthusiastic and excited by all the action on the field. We've heard all the different groups of supporters singing their national anthems, as well as respecting and even applauding the national anthem of the other team. Bravo!

"The fan zones and their giant screens are proving extremely successful, and although a few minor incidents regrettably broke out in Klagenfurt, the Austrian police rapidly and efficiently restored order. This first series of matches also produced a nice bit of controversy about the laws of the game; that triggered superb debate about the offside rule which was worthy of the finest debates that take place in the courts of our continent. I think everyone has learned something from this episode. I must also mention the exemplary conduct of the coaches, who are setting a fine example to all their less experienced fellow coaches. On the field, we've seen some great football, with some exciting action and a quantity of goals which is well within the average for a 16-team European Championship final round. Everyone agrees that the quality of the television broadcasts is excellent, and the viewing figures are breaking records in many countries. I hope, therefore, that all these positive trends continue – and that the weather improves."

**Offside rule clarified**

UEFA has emphasised that the goal scored by Netherlands striker Ruud Van Nistelrooy in Monday's Group C match against Italy in Berne was valid and that the referee acted correctly in awarding it. The UEFA General Secretary David Taylor was reacting to claims from some quarters that Van Nistelrooy was standing in an offside position when he scored the first goal in the Netherlands' 3-0 win. "I would like to take the opportunity to explain and emphasise that the goal was correctly awarded by the referee team," he said. "I think there's a lack of understanding among the general football public, and it's understandable because this was an unusual situation. The player was not offside, because, in addition to the goalkeeper, there was another Italian player in front of the goalscorer. Even though the other Italian player at the time had actually fallen off the pitch, his position was still relevant for the purposes of the offside law."

**Zero tolerance for racism**

The football family and anti-racism campaigners have joined forces at the start of UEFA EURO 2008™ to deliver a strong message: racist conduct, discrimination and intolerance will have no place at the tournament, or in the future. A key gathering in Basel brought together representatives of UEFA and the FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe) network for a reception featuring former players, administrators and non-government organisations to signal the beginning of a three-week anti-discrimination programme at UEFA EURO 2008™. The Unite Against Racism programme, run by the FARE network with UEFA's backing, as well as with the support of the professional players' union FIFPro, will include an advertising spot broadcast at every game – Different Languages, One Goal: No To Racism – pitch-side boards and activities with fans, culminating in high-profile activities on the field at the semi-finals in Basel and Vienna on 25 and 26 June.

**Anti-doping drive**

In the run-up to UEFA EURO 2008™ an unprecedented programme of out-of-competition doping controls was carried out – including blood testing – and all 160 samples examined at the World Anti-Doping Authority (WADA) accredited laboratory in Seibersdorf produced negative results. The results were communicated to UEFA's 12 doping control officers (DCOs) when they met in Lausanne on 6 June. The programme of blood controls alongside the usual urine samples, which will continue with the testing of two players from each side in every finals match at the Swiss doping analysis laboratory in Lausanne, is another innovation for UEFA.

### Competition information

• **Format:** The UEFA EURO 2008™ group stage draw in Lucerne on 2 December 2007 divided the 14 qualifiers and co-hosts Austria and Switzerland into four groups of four. Each country plays each other once. Three points are awarded for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat. If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings:

- number of points obtained in the matches among the teams in question;
- goal difference from the matches among the teams in question;
- number of goals scored in the matches among the teams in question (if more than two teams finish level on points);
- goal difference in all group matches;
- number of goals scored in all the group matches;
- coefficient from the qualifying competitions for the 2006 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2008™ (points obtained divided by number of matches played);
- Fair Play conduct of teams in the final tournament;
- drawing of lots

If two teams which have the same number of points, the same number of goals scored and conceded play their last group match against each other and are still equal at the end of that match, the ranking of the two teams in question will be determined by kicks from the penalty mark, provided no other teams within the group have the same number of points on completion of all group matches. Should more than two teams have the same number of points, the criteria (a) to (h) will apply.

• **Key dates:** The quarter-finals are played on 19, 20, 21 and 22 June in the following format:

- Match 1 Winner Group A v Runner-up Group B
- Match 2 Winner Group B v Runner-up Group A
- Match 3 Winner Group C v Runner-up Group D
- Match 4 Winner Group D v Runner-up Group C

The semi-finals are played on 25 and 26 June:

- Winner Match 1 v Winner Match 2
- Winner Match 3 v Winner Match 4

The final is played at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion in Vienna on Sunday 29 June, with the winners of Semi-final 1 being designated as the home team for administrative purposes.

• **Disciplinary information:** As a rule, a player who is sent off is suspended for the next match in the competition. The Control and Disciplinary Body is entitled to augment this punishment. In the case of repeated cautions, a player is suspended for one match after two cautions in two different matches. In May, UEFA's Executive Committee decided at its meeting in Moscow to cancel single yellow cards after the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2008™. Consequently, a situation will not arise whereby players receive a second yellow card of the tournament in the semi-finals and are suspended for the final as a result.

• **Player eligibility:** The 16 participants in the final tournament had to submit a final list of 23 players – of which three had to be goalkeepers – at least ten days before the opening match of the tournament, on 7 June. In the event of a serious injury to a listed player before his team's first match in the final tournament, the player in question could be substituted only if a doctor from the UEFA Medical Committee and the team doctor both confirmed the injury was serious enough to prevent the player taking part.

• **Financial information:** UEFA has earmarked a total of €184m for the 16 teams competing in UEFA EURO 2008™ compared to €129m at UEFA EURO 2004™. The 16 teams in the final tournament will each receive a participating fee of €7.5m with a performance bonus of €1m for a win during the group stage and €500,000 for a draw. The eight teams who reach the quarter-finals will all receive an additional payment of €2m, with the four teams who progress to the semi-finals collecting an extra €3m. For the teams who take the field for the final at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion on 29 June, the runners-up will receive €4.5m with the winners collecting €7.5m. Therefore, if the victorious side at the final win all three of their group games, they would collect a maximum of €23m.
