

History of Team Honours

From 1922-1938 the Portuguese Championship was carried out as a knock-out competition.

In 1934, an experimental and unofficial League Championship (Campeonato da I Liga) was introduced.

This tournament was the precursor of the Portuguese League which started with the 1938-1939 season.

The previous format continued in renamed form as the cup competition.

Miklos Feher

Miklos "Miki" Feher (born 20 July 1979, 25 January 2004) was a Hungarian footballer, who played as a striker. Feher died during a match between Vitória de Guimarães and S.L. Benfica.



Retired Numbers

Benfica retired the number 29 of Hungarian player Miklos Feher, who died of cardiac arrhythmia on 25 January 2004 at the grounds of Estadio D. Afonso Henriques in Guimaraes during a match between Vitória Guimaraes and Benfica in the Portuguese Liga.

Club career

Feher started playing at Győri ETO FC, where he was spotted by F.C. Porto scouts. He was signed in 1998 but never really made a breakthrough onto the team. Relatively young, he was loaned to gain experience, to another two northern sides, S.C. Salgueiros and S.C. Braga.

At Braga, Feher had his best professional seasons, netting 14 goals in 26 matches in 2000-01. After Porto chairman Jorge Nuno Pinto da Costa quarreled with agent José Viegas (Feher's agent), Feher refused to let go of his agent and left. He joined Lisbon side S.L. Benfica, going on to score seven goals in 28 matches, during two seasons.



Historical results

Benfica 5 - 1 Real Madrid in 1965:

Game for the 1/4 finals of the 1964/65 Champions Cup's season and Benfica demolished the Spanish giants, with Eusebio scoring 2 goals.

It was an attendance record in Portugal, only estimated at seventy thousand, certainly a number incorrectly quantified, because extra seats were mounted, increasing crowd figures near 85-90 thousand.

Despite expensive tickets, it has been said that if there were enough seats to 300 thousand people, the Stadium would also be sell-out.

Benfica was at top form in Europe, probably the best ever, and the career was promising a happy ending.

The Arena Hamburg has been bestowed with the honour of hosting the first final of the UEFA Europe League era, the 2009/10 showpiece taking place in the German city on 12 May 2010 (20:45CET).

Volksparkstadion site

Built on the site of the old Volksparkstadion, where Hamburger SV played the second leg of their 1982 UEFA Cup final against IFK Göteborg, the Arena Hamburg was inaugurated in 2000 when Germany played Greece and serves both as a football ground and a concert hall.

The stadium hosted four group games at the 2006 FIFA World Cup and the quarter final between Italy and Ukraine.

FC Vorskla Poltava

History

The club, Vorskla, was first formed in 1955, but under different name, Kolhosprny.

In 1984, the team's name was renamed to Vorskla after the river Vorskla, which flows through Poltava.

The team debuted in the Ukrainian Premier League in the 1996-1997 season, taking that season the 3rd place, the highest achievement in team's history.

Vorskla have remained in the Premier League since, and participated twice in UEFA Cup. In 2009 Vorskla met Shakhtar Donetsk in the 2009 Ukrainian Cup Final.

Mykola Pavlov's men won the match 1-0 after Vasyl Sachko's goal in the 49th minute.

This is Vorskla's first ever official title.

As a Domestic Cup winner Vorskla participated in the annual opening game of the season Ukrainian Super Cup meeting the champions Dynamo Kyiv.

After a 0-0 draw at full time Vorskla lost the cup to Dynamo on penalties.

Its home games the main team plays at Butovsky Memorial Vorskla Stadium which is named after one of the founders of the modern Olympic games and the International Olympic Committee in 1894.



The presence of FC Shakhtar Donetsk and Werder Bremen in Istanbul ensured that a 25th club would win the 38th and final edition of the UEFA Cup before it made way for the UEFA Europa League.

Happy accident

Shakhtar's technically driven defensive play won the day in the final at Istanbul's Sukru Saracoglu Stadium, with the absence of suspended playmaker Diego undermining Bremen.

Razvan Rat's pass out of defence was perhaps meant for Istinbo, but with the Shakhtar No31 running into referee Luis Medina Cantalejo the ball continued to the lurking Luis Adriano who had the time and space to deftly chip over the advancing Tim Wiese to make it 1-0.

Bremen equalised before the break as Naldo's unorthodox, if powerful, free-kick was palmed into his own goal by Andrey Pyatov.

Jadson decider

With no goals after the interval, Jadson was to be the hero of the day, turning in Dario Sma's low cross seven minutes into extra time to secure Ukraine's maiden European silverware since independence.

"This first trophy is fantastic," said Romanian coach Mircea Lucescu, a UEFA A Super Cup winner with Galatasaray AS in 2000.

"There is a great feeling of satisfaction and I am extremely happy. Now we want other things. We want to do something in the Champions League."
