This afternoon's match brings West Ham United to the Stadium of Light. Under former Sunderland centre-back Sam Allardyce the Hammers are enjoying a tremendous season and are currently occupying one of the Champions League places, so Sunderland should be used to that by now having faced sides playing in this season's Champions League in each of the last three games.

Some 84 years to the day of last weekend's trip to Anfield Sunderland also met Liverpool with the next home game bringing a 6-1 win over West Ham.

That sort of goal fest may be very unlikely, but a home win this afternoon would certainly boost the Christmas spirits on Wearside ahead of next week's trip to Newcastle.

SUNDERLAND AFC TO UNVEIL TRIBUTE TO WAR HEROES

At noon today Sunderland AFC unveiled a memorial to its players killed in action in the First and Second World Wars.

The memorial, situated outside the Stadium of Light's West Stand, honours the seven SAFC players killed in World War One, along with Percy Saunders, who was killed in action during the Second World War. Timed to coincide with the 100 year anniversary of the start of The Great War, the memorial also pays tribute to all those killed in the line of duty.

The memorial was unveiled in a special dedication ceremony. Two former military chaplains joined the club chaplain, Father Marc Lynden-Smith, and members of the Armed Forces to formally dedicate the monument.

Sunderland AFC chairman Ellis Short said: "Through the creation of this memorial we pay tribute not only to our former players who lost their lives during the First and Second World Wars, but to all the brave men and women who have paid the ultimate sacrifice while serving their country. It also provides a place where we can remember all members of the Sunderland family who are no longer with us."

The memorial sits within a specially created seated area, alongside the existing Fans' Statue.

GREATNESS AWAITS



Turn left coming out of the stadium at the roundabout by the Colliery Inn, just past the miners' lamp you'll see outside the Sunderland ticket office. Travel along this road, which is Keir Hardie Way.

Go straight on at all traffic lights until you reach the A19. You'll pass a big petrol station and shop on your right before reaching the A19.

GOALS ARE THE PRIORITY

In modern football the easiest way to find the back of the net is to buy players. At this moment in time that is not possible as the transfer window is not open and we have a lot of games to play so for the moment we need to find a way of scoring more goals ourselves. That means working with the players, showing them different options so strikers can take advantage of situations we can create.

Confidence comes from goals. We won a couple of games by scoring three goals and also scored three in the cup win at Birmingham. It's more than a coincidence as it shows that if vou can score one or two. more can follow. We've been working hard on this. There are different ways to score goals. Our way needs special players around the box so it is good to have Ricky Alvarez fit again and also we hope to have Emanuele Giaccherini available again next week. Players of this quality can help to open teams up and I'm really looking forward to them being able to participate fully.

I can assure everybody reading the programme that we don't play for draws. We didn't play for a draw against Chelsea and we didn't against Liverpool at Anfield. We play the game in a way that we feel gives us more chances of winning and in both of those matches I thought we were very close to winning - it was nearly perfect.

We have to maintain a level of playing against a top team today because West Ham are fourth and we are not talking about just playing two or three games, we have played 15 so they are so high because of what they have been doing and they deserve to be where they are. They'll present us with a different challenge but we need to believe in what we do.

I'd like to welcome Sam Allardyce and everyone from West Ham to Sunderland today. Sam and his goalkeeping coach Bobby Mimms both played for Sunderland and even though it is a long time ago it is always nice to come back to a former club. My son Diego is with West Ham of course. I don't know if he will be involved but if he was it would be the first time we have ever been in opposition. I just want to win the game and it doesn't matter if my son is in the opposing side. Naturally because he is there West Ham's result is always one of the first I check, so I can see how they've done and if he played. For the rest of the games I wish West Ham well except when they play against us.

We are going into the next four games to the end of the year with the intention of winning as many of them as we can. Of course the main task is to win the next one, so three points todav is our aim. We must focus strongly on this although I know for many supporters the biggest game of the season is the next one. We'll concentrate on next week's trip to Newcastle after today's match is played and we know that as well as providing three valuable points if we can win today, it would also be a timely boost ahead of the derby.

I know how important the derby is to supporters. They've been great for me so far and it would be fantastic if we could get the three points next week. The only thing I can say about next week's game is let's make sure it is a nice party day with no crazy things goings on. Remember it is a football game and let's enjoy being part of it with a great competitive spirit but no problems.

I've experienced two North East derbies now and I've learned that you need to live here to know what they're like. You need to live it to know it and it is fantastic. Of course I've enjoyed them so far because we've been winning and we'd love to produce another special day for everyone.

Talking about special games, we now know about the game we have to play in the FA Cup. I always want the smallest team at home but in Leeds United we certainly do not have the smallest team. Having not played them in the FA Cup since the final in 1973 is going to make it special. It is much tougher than I would like to have at this moment in time but I am really looking forward to it. Leeds will bring a lot of supporters and I had a great relationship with those fans from when I was at Elland Road. The away fans helped us a lot when I was there so I know the backing they will give to the Leeds players when they come here. It will be a nice atmosphere at the Stadium of Light because I know our supporters won't want to let anyone get the better of them.

Our support has been terrific and we're expecting another crowd of over 40,000 today which I thank you for. This is the last home game before Christmas, so in wishing you all the best I hope that by the time we are here again on Boxing Day we have done all we can on the pitch to make it a happy one.


FROM THE TOP

PANTILIMON HEAD AND SHOULDERS ABOVE THE REST

Black Cats goalkeeper **Costel Pantilimon** has kept three clean sheets in his last four games for the club, against tough opposition and he is hoping to continue his rich vein of form this afternoon against a high-flying West Ham United side.

Shut outs against Leicester City, Chelsea and Liverpool over the past few weeks have seen the club's defensive performances praised. Anthony Reveillere has come in at left-back following injury to Patrick van Aanholt, while Santiago Vergini is becoming a fans' favourite for his efforts at right-back.

With the experience of John O'Shea and Wes Brown in the heart of the back-line, Pantilimon has praised the back-four in front of him: "I think it's important not just for me, but for the team to try and keep clean sheets as it shows good teamwork. I hope that I can improve all the time and keep on helping the team.

"It's important. Everybody in this team is important. Everybody knows what his job is on the pitch and that is good for the team. It is important that we are a great group like we are. We try to be a good group and get the results together."

West Ham come to the Stadium of Light in fine form, winning their last three Barclays Premier League games, sitting fourth in the table. An impressive victory at home to Swansea City last Sunday saw Andy Carroll get on the scoresheet twice. At 6ft 8ins, Pantilimon is ready for the aerial threat that The Hammers possess in their ranks.

"I prepare for every game, watching the opponent," he added. "It is normal to watch the opponent and the way they play, their style and how they will be in the games. Of course we study the opponent but it is our game and its important how we play and how we react to everything in the game.

"We know that West Ham are a strong team. They are a good team and in a great position at

this moment with good results. For us though, it's important to have a strong mentality and to win these games is very important for us and hopefully we can get the result today.

"To be honest I'm not surprised by West Ham this season and the results that they have picked up. They have very good players and I think that they are doing really well right now. They are in a good moment but it's important for us to respect the opponent but at the same time, know that we are a great group of players at a great club and we need to win games." ➡ Famously John Terry once thought Kenwyne Jones at Sunderland was the best he'd seen in the air wonder what he made of trying to challenge Pantilimon? After a tough run of three games against last season's top three, Pantilimon is looking forward to another game on home soil being backed by home support that has impressed him, even before he joined the club from Manchester City in the summer.

"I played at the Stadium of Light last season and I know it is a great stadium with fans singing so it is good to have them on my side now and it is good to be a part of it," he said.

This afternoon's game is already the third game for the Black Cats in December, in a month that will see the team play six top-flight games. With the games coming thick and fast, it is something that the 27-year-old Romanian is looking forward to, with an opportunity for the team to pick up more points before the New Year. "I prefer that there are a lot of games at this time of year," he confessed. "I like to play like that and we need to make sure that we do our best in every game."

Today's clash against The Hammers is the final home match before Christmas, with the hotly anticipated Tyne-Wear derby falling just four days before 25th December, And with the excitement and adrenaline already building up throughout the region, Pantilimon admits that he knows all about it, now that he lives in the North East: "I have found out all about the derby and the two teams by living here. I understand what it means for everybody in these games and people talk about it all the time. Of course it is a big game but first of all we have to look at today's game against West Ham and hope to get a good result today."

NEW DEAL FOR CONNOR

Connor Wickham has signed a new four-year deal with the club, until 2019. An ever-present so far this season in the Barclays Premier League, Wickham scored in the last home game against Manchester City.

It was, of course, City who Connor bagged two against late last season to spark the 'Greatest Escape' which led to Sunderland still being in the top-flight. Another goal in the win at Chelsea, plus two and the winning of a penalty in the big win over Cardiff contributed to Wickham being named Barclays Premier League Player of the Month at the business end of the season - an accolade he marked with the assist for Seb Larsson's winner at Old Trafford as Sunderland defied the odds.

Now 21, Wickham is moving towards what should be the best years of his career. Having debuted for Ipswich as a 16-year-old it is easy for people to forget that Connor is still so young and like any good player is still learning.

"He keeps learning, he is able to adapt to different positions up front and he is enjoying our philosophy of play so I'm really looking forward to keep working with him for the benefit of our club," noted Gus Poyet, who commented: "I think it was very important to tie down a young English centre forward as there are not many around, this shows clearly the way this football club wants to progress. I'm delighted that Connor has committed his future to us for the next few years. After his contribution at the end of last year, he continued to improve his football and become an important part of our team."

LEEDS IN CUP

Monday's cup draw provided Sunderland with a home tie for the 10th time in the last 12 cup draws. Being drawn at home to Leeds United will inevitably set people reminiscing about the day that led to the building of the statue of Bob Stokoe outside the stadium.

Sunderland though also met Leeds in the FA Cup in 1967. In those far off days before penalty shoot-outs the Fifth Round tie went to two replays before Sunderland were beaten at Hull in the most controversial circumstances with two of the team sent-off. Bobby Kerr would captain Sunderland to the cup triumph in '73 but had broken his leg in the '67 tie during an era when Sunderland v Leeds fixtures were fierce clashes.

Just as it's four decades since the clubs met in the cup there were



four decades between the 1967 meeting and the previous tie in 1926-27, when Leeds won a Third Round tie by the odd goal in five at Elland Road.

The most recent cup clash between the clubs came in 1993-94 in the League Cup. In a two-legged Second Round tie The Lads won home and away against Leeds who were a division higher than Sunderland at the time, which - like the '73 final - should serve as a reminder that league status is no guarantee of cup progress. The only other League Cup tie saw Leeds win 2-0 at Roker Park in 1967-68.

There was one other cup tie between Sunderland and Leeds. This was when Sunderland met the forerunners of Leeds United - Leeds City - in 1910 when a goal from George Holley was enough to provide the iconic scoreline of Sunderland 1 Leeds 0.

THE HAMMERS

Not everyone will get to play there but West Ham United's Stadium 2016 project is already impacting on the current squad.

That the football landscape in the capital city will be changed forever has not been lost on those entrusted with making sure the Hammers should open their new headquarters as a vibrant Barclays Premier League club for the 2016-17 season.

The move to a re-configured Olympic arena will give the club facilities and capacity on a par with Arsenal at the Emirates Stadium and, for the time being at least, ahead of Chelsea and Tottenham.

Influential midfielder Alex Song made a big splash in The Sun, suggesting that West Ham could emulate Atletico Madrid's achievement in upsetting the established power base in Spain. "Of course you can feel the excitement around the squad with the Olympic Stadium," he said.

It was in March last year that the Hammers were named as anchor tenants of the showcase venue for the London Games in 2012. The joint-chairmen, David Sullivan and David Gold, spoke of their pride making "the nation's iconic Olympic Stadium" the club's new home."

Players have been encouraged to keep in touch with progress at the site. In November last year skipper Kevin Nolan and long-serving Mark Noble were among those pictured to mark the start of work on the new cantilevered roof. This November Noble was there again for a tour of the facilities the squad will be using in less than two years' time.

Not surprisingly, Sam Allardyce has made the double-edged attraction of London AND a spectacular stadium a selling point in transfer negotiations. And judging by results in the opening third of this season, it has worked pretty well for the manager.

Nine signings, two on loan, considerably altered the shape of the team since the difficulties of last season, the second back in the Barclays Premier League after coming up through the play-offs in Allardyce's first year at the Bolelyn Ground.

Back in January this year the Hammers were in the bottom three and essentially they made their position secure with four wins and the Manager of the Month award for February. This gave them the breathing space to withstand five defeats in the last six matches.



Corrective action in the summer helped Allardyce to further recognition by the awards panel in October and saw his side back into the top four on the current run of three consecutive wins.

Diafra Sakho was the newcomer who caught the headlines by becoming the first Hammers player to score in six consecutive games in the Premier League.



DON'T I KNOW YOU?

Notice a particularly warm handshake after the match? **Dominic Gold** examines where the paths to today's two squads have crossed.

Despite both players not starting for their respective teams last week in the Barclays Premier League, both Steven Fletcher and Matt Jarvis will hope to be involved this afternoon and have the chance to reminisce about their time together at Wolverhampton Wanderers between 2010 and 2012.

Born in Middlesbrough in 1986, Jarvis started footballing life on the books of Millwall before moving to Cillingham as a trainee. Debuting in a 3-1 loss at home to Sunderland (Stewart Downing on target for the Black Cats), Jarvis went on to make over a century of appearances for the Gills before making the move to Molineux in the summer of 2007 for an undisclosed fee.

Helping Wolves to promotion in 2008-09, Jarvis made his Barclays Premier League debut against the Hammers in August 2009 and would go on to score three league goals as Mick McCarthy's men narrowly avoided relegation, ending the season in 15th place after a final day success against Sunderland.

After tasting top-flight relegation that same campaign, Fletcher made the move from Burnley to Wolves in the summer of 2010 with the aim of bolstering a shot shy side, and the Scottish international certainly managed that, notching 12 times in his maiden season, including a strike in a 3-1 success at the Stadium of Light in May 2011.

The threat of relegation was never far away however, and despite surviving in 2010-11, the

Clearly the stars of a relegated side, Fletcher and Jarvis made moves to remain at the top level, and go head-to-head today as regulars in the Barclays Premier League.

Seletch and Matt Jarvis are opponents today but were team-mates at Molineux

VIEW FROM AFAR

Andy Greeves talks to a former member of Sunderland's matchday opposition. Today, ex-Hammers hero **Tony Cottee** recalls his excellent goal scoring record against the Black Cats.

"Sunderland fans won't thank me for mentioning this, but I only managed to score four goals in a match twice during my career and one of those games was against the Black Cats," comments Tony Cottee.

The former striker is referencing a Full Members Cup game for Everton against Sunderland at Goodison Park on 22nd January 1991, when he got all four Toffees goals in a 4-1 win. He had a very good record against the Black Cats during his playing career, with eight goals in ten appearances against them overall.

"I treasure the three goals I got for Leicester over the two legs in the League Cup semi-final against Sunderland," adds Cottee. "We went to the Stadium of Light for the first-leg (26th January 1999) and I got two goals with my left foot, which was great as a right-footer! Gavin McCann got a goal back for Sunderland on the night. At Filbert Street in the second-leg (17th February 1999) Quinny (Niall Quinn) put the visitors one up in that game, only for me to get the equaliser and send us to Wembley with a 3-2 aggregate win."

Cottee played 184 league games for Everton between 1988 and 1994, scoring 72 times and got 27 goals in 85 league appearances for Leicester City between 1997 and 2000. He also spent spells at Selangor, Birmingham City (Ioan), Norwich City, Barnet and Millwall during his 19-year-long professional career.

It is the two spells the striker spent at his beloved boyhood club West Ham United that Cottee is perhaps best remembered for. He netted an impressive 145 times in 355 appearances between 1982-88 and 1994-96.

"Being born in the East End, I was only ever going to be brought up a

West Ham fan," smiles Cottee. "Playing for the club I supported as a kid meant so much to me and I'm very lucky to have such a great relationship with the supporters there.

"My visit to Sunderland was actually as a West Ham fan. Travelling up there, I was thinking 'what's this Roker Roar all about'. You quickly found out as a visiting supporter or player that's for sure!"

On the field, one of the earliest appearances of Cottee's career came as West Ham beat Sunderland 1-0 at Roker Park on 19th November 1983. Two seasons later, he was part of a team that made West Ham history finishing third in the old Division One (now Barclays Premier League) - the club's best ever league finish.

"There's barely a week goes by without someone mentioning that 1985-86 season to me," comments Cottee. "It was a very special season, although it's probably tinged with a little bit of regret too as we probably should have gone on to win the title. I'm going to redeem myself with the Sunderland fans for mentioning my goals against them earlier by also adding that we beat Newcastle 8-1 (21st April 1986) that season!"

Cottee, who won seven caps for England during his career before hanging up his boots in 2001, is currently in his 13th year working for Sky Sports and is a regular on Gillette Soccer Saturday and Gillette Soccer Special.

"I absolutely love being part of those shows and I get as much banter with the other ex-pros and presenters as I did during my playing days for sure," he adds.


PLAYED FOR BOTH

WEST HAM VS SUNDERLAND

Until the same weekend this season this was the last time Sunderland had equalled their record defeat. On this occasion Sunderland were well and truly hammered with Geoff Hurst doubling the hat-trick he'd scored in the World Cup final two years earlier. During this era West Ham's programmes were distinctively pocket sized and amongst the best in the country for the time.



5th March 1977 SUNDERLAND VS WEST HAM

This time it was The Iron's turn to get hammered as Sunderland made it 16 goals in three games by winning 6-0. The late Mel Holden was the cover star and scored twice, as did a young lad by the name of Gary Rowell who scored his first brace for the club. Bobby Kerr and Bob Lee also scored on a day when I gave up trying to get my wife to come to every game, "It was a bit one sided" was her verdict.

17th November 1984 WEST HAM VS SUNDERLAND

Paul Allen graced the cover of 'Hammer' on a day when a goal from Tony Cottee was enough to give the home side victory. Sunderland went into the game in the top half of the table but dropped to 12th with the defeat and continued to slide to relegation, never being as high in the league again that term. There was progress in the League Cup though with Wembley reached for the first time.

24th October 1999 WEST HAM VS SUNDERLAND

Kevin Phillips gave Peter Reid's thirdplaced Sunderland a half-time lead at the Boleyn Ground, only for Trevor Sinclair to level things up after the break for Harry Redknapp's side, who had just returned from a long midweek European trip in the UEFA Cup that they'd qualified for by Intertoto Cup success at the start of the campaign.



6th May 2000 SUNDERLAND VS WEST HAM

'Superkev's' goal at West Ham had been his 13th of the season. In scoring the only goal of the return fixture he hit his 30th Premier League goal of the season. Red & White Review included a quartet of photo's of people likely to loom large in the game. West Ham's Paolo Di Canio was featured, 'Superkev' and Alex Rae were two of the Sunderland players, and the third? Milton Nunez.

29th March 2008 SUNDERLAND VS WEST HAM

Danny Collins was the full face that adorned this particular cover on an afternoon when a spectacular volley from Andy Reid five minutes into injury time sealed a dramatic 2-1 victory. It was Reid's first goal for the club on an afternoon when West Ham's George McCartney made his first return to the Stadium of Light.

Yes. I've featured Brvan 'Pop' Robson before, but I make no apology for discussing him again. New readers, young and old, keep joining us, anyway, and Pop served both West Ham United and Sunderland so well he doesn't deserve to be shelved. Another good reason for my writing about him? He's been a friend for more than 50 years.

We first met at his home in Prudhoe on Tyne. As a sports reporter, I wanted to know as much about the 19-vear-old as possible since he would make his League debut for Newcastle United at Charlton Athletic the following niaht.

On such occasions a reporter is delighted when "newsy" facts emerge from an interview. And I soon had a good angle with which to start my piece. I established that Pop was born near Roker Park, then the home of Sunderland, and, as a kid, he would pop in there when the gates were opened after half-times to see Wearside heroes like... Stan Anderson.

Well, by now, the former Sunderland captain and right-half was the very skipper who would play behind the right-wing debutant at The Valley. And in Pop's autograph book was the signature of... Stan Anderson. Reporters love lines like that.

Stan and Bryan loved the postscript on 1st September 1964 when the kid scored Newcastle's lone-goal winner

goals in a marvellous career. By the time he was helping Newcastle to win the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup in 1969 he was their main striker alongside big centre-forward Wyn Davies. Some of his goals on European nights like those against Real Zaragoza and Sporting Lisbon had to be seen to be believed.

He was such a fabulously clean striker of the ball that Newcastle goalkeeper Willie McFaul reckoned he might have managed even more goals if he hadn't been. "Often mishits or slices turn out to be goals because 'keepers can't anticipate them." Willie explained.

Sadly, Bryan's Newcastle career ended sourly. He'd asked for a transfer because he believed correctly in my opinion - that he had been unfairly singled out by manager Joe Harvey after the

club's exit from the UEFA Cup, beaten on penalties by Pecsi Dozsa.

After 97 goals in 244 appearances for the Magpies he was off to West Ham in February 1971. The £120.000 fee was a record for both clubs.


Again he scored on debut and was the Hammers' top scorer in two of his three seasons with them. He was their Hammer of the Year when they were sixth in the top division in 1972-73 as he was the top scorer in the First Division.

To the delight of Roker-born Brvan. Sunderland, of course, beat Leeds United to win the FA Cup that season.

Only 14 months later he joined Sunderland for £145.000. No surprise to me that he was their top scorer in his first season with 21 League and Cup goals. He notched 15 as Sunderland won promotion as champions the next season.

Back he went to West Ham in 1976. Still adored by their fans, he was runner-up to Alan Devonshire as Hammer of the Year in the 1978-79 season. Yet in June '79 he returned to Sunderland, again shooting them to the top division.

His fine career was to take him as a player, coach or manager with Carlisle, Chelsea, Hartlepool, Manchester United and Leeds as well as Sunderland where he was chief scout. Now in his 70th year. he can be proud of all he achieved - and the memories he dave us.



Today's game comes at the end of **'Football Remembers Week'**, a period covering 6th to 14th December in a collaboration between The Premier League, The FA, the Football League and the British Council. The aim of 'Football Remembers Week' is to engage football fans in what took place on Christmas Day in Flanders, Belgium, 100 years ago this year, the first Christmas of The Great War.

'Football Remembers Week' will also see the unveiling of the UK's first memorial to the Christmas Truce at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.

FOOTBALL REMEMBERS







The First World War was a conflict that when Britain declared war on 4th August many people thought it would be over by Christmas. This was one of the reasons the football season continued right to the end of the 1914-15 season even though the football authorities came in for vehement criticism for allowing the game to continue.

Players were contracted to their clubs so, unless they were registered with the Territorial Army as reservists, they couldn't join up until their contracts ended. Sunderland's still record league goalscorer Charlie Buchan for example, in his autobiography first published in 1955, recalled: "I wanted to join up but, when the league decided that the competition should run until the following April I was reminded that I had a contract to carry out. There was little interest in the league programme and the Sunderland players found it hard to concentrate on the game. Every weekday we went through military training, with broomsticks instead of rifles, from an Army instructor, preparing for the day when we could do our bit."

Buchan's contract ended in April 1915 - having scored a hat trick on the last day of the season to finish as top scorer - and he duly enlisted as a Private in the Grenadier Guards. Buchan was to see action at the Somme, Cambrai and Passchendaele, three of the major battles of The Great War. He rose to the rank of sergeant and was awarded the

Military Medal for bravery. In September 1918 following a commission to the Officers' Cadet School at Catterick Camp, Charlie was posted at Hylton Castle as a temporary second lieutenant with the Sherwood Foresters who were based there, and from where he returned to France just as the war ended.

100 years ago yesterday Buchan was on the mark in a 2-1 home win over Burnley in front of an estimated crowd of just 2,000, the lowest ever in Roker Park's 99-year history. The war by now was uppermost in everyone's thoughts. The first battle of Ypres had begun in October, while in three days time it will be 100 years since Hartlepool became the first place in Britain to come under bombardment from the German First High Sea Fleet.

In 2014 when people think about the First World War it is images of trench warfare that are most commonly conjured up. A relatively small percentage of the army actually served in the trenches, which were the front lines and the most dangerous place for infantrymen. While trenches had been used in previous wars the Great War was the war when trench warfare became something that largely







stayed the same, with little movement. From September 1914 until August 1918 for men in many of the trenches it was a matter of holding what they had and not giving an inch. In other trenches, the situation was temporary until a push over 'No-Man's Land' - the murderous space between the trenches - where advances would try to push forward.

By the end of November 1914 there was a continuous line of trenches covering around 400 miles from Switzerland to the North Sea. Conditions in the trenches could vary, some collapsing after heavy rains. Around Ypres the ground was reportedly particularly boggy.

The German trenches could be as little as 30 yards away, a dangerous distance for a modern day goalkeeper facing a shot on a football pitch, let alone someone sticking their head above the parapet with the risk of being shot and killed by a bullet. Life in these trenches was abysmal. Soldiers tended to be in the front line for four days at a time - if they survived - then be moved back to a back up support line for four days then have four days rest, although this could vary enormously depending upon circumstances.

Quite apart from the dangers posed by the enemy, many died as a result of disease from the often flooded, rat and lice infested squalor of trench warfare. Indeed Sandy McAllister, one of seven Sunderland players to die in the war. did so from Bright's Disease in 1918. McAllister had played for The Lads in the final crucial 'Test Match' of 1897 and later had missed just one game in the first four seasons at Roker Park. His title-winning medal of 1902 is on display in the Stadium of Light foyer.

The men in the trenches on both sides of No Man's Land were not people who had any reason to fight each other apart from the fact that the leaders of their respective countries had gone to war. Some of the men were footballers, others came from every walk of life and many of you, like me, will have relatives who fought in the war. Friends not foes for a day, as men from both sides of the divide, share a chat on the day of the Christmas truce

So it was that when on Christmas Day in 1914 a truce broke out. In the previous couple of days hymns had been heard from both British and German lines, men returning to the front had even reportedly tied small conifer trees to the parapets. On Christmas Dav itself. astonishingly men from both sides of the great divide stepped into No-Man's Land not as foes but as friends. The fact that after exchanging gifts and handshakes they buried their dead, sang hymns and then played a game of football is perhaps the finest example in the history of the world's most popular game of its power to be a shining light of goodwill and peace. Reportedly the Germans won the match 3-2, full-time coming when the ball burst upon striking barbed wire.

Tragically the war would not end until 1918 with over 16 million people killed and over 20 million wounded. Even more tragically it was not the war to end all wars that people hoped it would be. This week as 'Football Remembers' it is to be hoped that leaders across the world do so, and work to bring people together rather than setting them against each other.



FOOTBALL REMEMBERS











Last month an Under-12 team from Sunderland and every other Barclays Premier League club travelled to Ypres to play in a commemorative tournament and as a new generation to learn about the First World War and those the planet pledged to never forget.

"The educational day was amazing," explains Sunderland Academy Under-12 coach Stuart Brightwell. "We visited a British Cemetery where Jimmy Speirs is buried. He captained Bradford in the 1911 FA Cup Final [Speirs scored the only goal of the final when Bradford beat Newcastle in a replay]. We also learnt about the role of football in the world war.

"We then visited a German cemetery which was breathtaking. We also visited a recruitment stand where some of the players got to handle equipment and weaponry and dress up in uniform. We visited Tyne Cot which is the biggest war cemetery in the world and that was incredible to see with 12,000 soldiers buried there and 38 000 names of the missing soldiers on the wall."

them was Jack Huggins who was featured in the most recent Legion of Light. A debut scorer against Manchester United in 1906, Huggins was killed at the battle of Ypres on 25th April 1915, just five days after setting foot on the continent as part of the 8th battalion of the Durham Light Infantry. Stuart Brightwell and the Sunderland squad went to visit hid grave of Private Huggins: "We laid a poppy cross and said a few words," reveals Brightwell.

"Overall the lads behaved impeccably and thoroughly enjoyed the trip and learnt a lot," he adds. They also performed with distinction on the pitch, finishing fourth out of the 20 Premier League clubs. Brightwell's boys achieved the following results to qualify for the semi-final as group winners:

Sunderland 5-0 Leicester City Sunderland 2-1 Tottenham Sunderland 6-1 Swansea Sunderland 2-2 Manchester City

"We played Liverpool in the semi-final, we lost 4-0 but we went for it late on and they caught us short at the back with three late goals," reports Stuart who adds, Sunderland's Under-12s on their trip to Belgium



"We then lost 3-1 to West Brom for 3rd/4th place play-off." Great credit then for doing so well and while disappointment was experienced in the latter stages the joy of the tournament was that now in 2014 people can play and work together. A far cry from the experience of Jack Huggins and millions like him whose lives were lost in the most appalling circumstances a century ago.

MEMORIAL UNVEILED TODAY

Opening today around the site of the Fans' statue outside the main West Stand of the Stadium of Light is a memorial to the players of Sunderland AFC who gave their lives in the World Wars.

The memorial sits within a specially created seated area, alongside the existing Fans' Statue - a stunning bronze installation dedicated to Sunderland fans past, present and future. As well as paying tribute to those players lost in the World Wars, the area will also be used by fans as a focal point to remember lost loved ones.

Situated outside the Stadium of Light's West Stand, the memorial honours the seven SAFC players killed in World War One: Alexander Barrie, James Chalmers, Jack Huggins, Sandy McAllister, Albert Milton, Leigh Richmond Roose and Thomas Rowlandson, along with Percy Saunders, who was killed in action during the Second World War. The memorial also pays tribute to all those killed in the line of duty.

The memorial was unveiled in a special dedication ceremony at the stadium, prior to today's game against West Ham United. Two former military chaplains joined the club chaplain, Father Marc Lynden-Smith, and members of the Armed Forces to formally dedicate the monument.

The wording at the memorial comes from the fourth stanza of Laurence Binyon's poem, 'For the Fallen' first published in The Times on 21st September 1914.

They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning

We will remember them.

Dedicated to the Sunderland players who died in the World Wars and to all those who selflessly gave their lives.

As we welcome our friends from West Ham this afternoon we also remember the West Ham players who died during World War One:

William Kennedy, Frank Cannon, Fred Griffiths, Arthur Stallard and William Jones. Many activities are taking place to bring home the world of football's honouring of those who served. Last Tuesday Dan Jarvis, the Labour MP for Barnsley and a former Major in the British Army, was the host at a reception in the House of Commons where there were a number of presentations by young people involved in 'Football Remembers' in order to raise the profile of 'Football Remembers' amongst Parliamentarians.

Yesterday HRH the Duke of Cambridge officially unveiled The Christmas Truce Memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum while yesterday, today and tomorrow the Christmas Truce International Tournament in Ypres, Belgium, sees two Under-12 teams from each of the Premier League, German Bundesliga, Belgian Pro League, French Ligue 1, and one each from Scotland and Austria, participating in an Under-12 tournament taking place on a 3G pitch that the Premier League has donated to the city of Ypres. Furthermore, to honour the sacrifices of Commonwealth soldiers there is also a community tournament made up of Under-16 male and Under-18 female players from Premier League Kicks projects at home and abroad, including four Indian players from a Premier League project in Kolkata. There is a full educational and cultural programme over the weekend; including visits to war graves and memorials, designed to highlight peace and reconciliation.

Meanwhile, this coming Monday sees the release of the charity single 'All Together Now'. The Farm's song about the Truce and the First World War, has been re-recorded and features a backing choir of 60 Under-12 footballers: 38 from Premier League clubs and 22 from German Bundesliga clubs. The boys sing in both English and German and appear in the video in club shirts. Notable musicians, singers and celebrities also appear on the single/video, which will be in aid of the Red Cross and the Shorncliffe Trust.

This Wednesday, 17th December, will see the staging of a match between the British Army FA and the German Army at Aldershot Town FC. Called 'The Game of Truce' the match will be attended by the chairman of The FA Greg Dyke and Nick Carter, Chief of the General Staff. All proceeds from the game will go to The Royal British Legion and the German Army's equivalent charity.

Next Friday, 19th December, The National Football Museum in Manchester opens a new exhibition, 'The Greater Game - Football and the First World War', while at Stratford the Royal Shakespeare Company are currently performing a play called 'The Christmas Truce.'





Club historian **Rob Mason** searches for players from the past...

Within the last decade Nyron Nosworthy achieved cult hero status at Sunderland. 'Nugsy' is still playing having recently signed for Blackpool and found himself back at the Academy of Light last month when his first appearance for the Tangerines came in a friendly with Sunderland's Under-21 side, as Blackpool boss Lee Clark ran the rule over his options as he looks to arrest the slide of his new club.

"It felt kind of strange but it was nice to be back," said Nosworthy of his first return to the club. "I heard the shout we were playing Sunderland and so straight away I was looking forward to it so I could come and see who I could see. It's nice to see things have changed and progressed for the better which is good."

In the three years since he moved on Nyron played over 50 games for Watford and finished last season on loan to Bristol City under Steve Cotterill. He's also played 13 times for his father's country, Jamaica, since making his debut five months after leaving Sunderland.

Without a club since the end of last season, Nyron has joined the ranks of players being tried out by the Tangerines and explains: "I've signed for Blackpool until January and

hopefully beyond. They've given me the chance to play football. Joining them all happened very quickly. I came back from Jamaica on the Thursday morning, travelled up to Blackpool that night, trained with them for the first time on the Friday and was on the bench on the Saturday. The match at Sunderland was my first game and I was playing right-back so I was rolling back the days."

Nosworthy made his debut four days after appearing at Sunderland, helping Blackpool to a point at Rotherham and last Saturday made his home debut, helping Clark's side to a 1-0 home win over Birmingham City, the club who had dismissed Clark earlier in the campaign.

'Nugsy' notes: "I'm playing for Lee Clark, so imagine that, another North East player. He's been great with me in helping me to get back and enjoy my football."

Times have been tough at Blackpool since their trip to the Barclays Premier League was brought to a halt in 2011. Nyron experienced some tough times himself during his spell in the North East, not least playing 30 games in his first season when The Lads broke their own unwanted record of fewest points in a campaign, just 15 - half as many as second bottom West Brom.

Nonetheless 'Nugsy' reflects: "I've only got good memories of Sunderland. Even in my first season when things didn't go well, for me I could sense the history of the club and I believed it was the start of something great. It was all enjoyable and everyone at Sunderland makes you feel so welcome. To be fair the facilities at Sunderland are there to bring the best out of you and Sunderland did that for me. Regardless of which managers came in I was just dedicated to the job and doing the best I could."

Nosworthy's debut provided a window into the future of a player capable of the sublime and the cor blimey. Newly-promoted Sunderland had added modestly to the squad returning to the top-flight just two years after going down with a record low 19 points. Nyron had arrived on a free from a Gillingham side just relegated from the league Sunderland had won.



Intended to be back up to former Liverpool right-back Stephen Wright, Nosworthy suddenly found himself called upon as a first day sub after Wright was injured. His first touch wasn't one as he let a simple cross-field ball go under his foot and out for a throw-in. It was an inauspicious start but moments later Nyron extricated himself from a tight situation with consummate coolness.

"I think it was more nerves," smiles Nyron when reminded of the first moment of his debut: "In terms of playing out of difficult situations I'm quite a relaxed individual so it's swings and roundabouts. Throughout my career I've always been told to concentrate because when I concentrate and keep things simple you get the best out of me. The fans at Sunderland are football people and they gave me a hard time to begin with but they wanted me to do well and wanted the club to do well. Once they saw my capabilities they were unbelievable."

Despite enduring the hardest of seasons with 29 defeats in 38 games the side refused to throw in the towel. Consistently losing can dishearten any team at any level but despite being punch drunk on defeat they were never beaten by more than three goals. Characters such as Steve Caldwell, Danny Collins, Gary Breen, Kelvin Davis and Dean Whitehead stood alongside Nosworthy in working their socks off. They were simply a team who lacked the requisite quality but were above criticism when it came to commitment.

"We would never give up and it comes down to pride. You don't want to be known or laughed at as a player or team who didn't give it your best," he adds. "It is self-preservation and pride in yourself and hope that everyone sees that. I think it carried on into the next season. Where I'm from if things aren't going well the least you can do is to work hard and if you do that things will work out for you."

That following season saw Nyron enjoy being part of a side who bounced straight back in an exciting era as Niall Quinn took over the club and soon appointed Roy Keane as manager. Nosworthy blossomed when Keane switched him from right-back to centreback and partnered him with the up and coming young Jonny Evans on loan from Manchester United. Nyron had previously been reluctant to switch from his right-back berth, but Keane simply pinned up a team sheet with Nyron at centre-back and left him to get on with it!

Nyron remembers: "When I first came Mick McCarthy played me at centre-half in a game at the Academy. I had an absolute nightmare and he was just shouting at me. I was pretty upset because I couldn't get into the swing of it and I thought that's not for me, I'll stay at full-back. Keano just put me there and I think it was just the right time and what can I say it just happened.

"I thought I'm in the team, I'm going to stick with it and that's what happened. I thrived on it and just pushed as hard as I could because I wanted to achieve something in my career." Nosworthy at the peak of his career

Sunderland won 13 and drew three of the first 16 games Nyron played in central defence, his performances as the Championship was won being so impressive that he was named jointly with Whitehead as North East Player of the Year (the same award Lee Cattermole has just won).

The fans had long since taken to a player who was big, strong, determined and played with his heart on his sleeve. No-one including Nyron - ever thought he was the most gifted player around but for getting stuck in and never giving up Nyron couldn't be faulted. Nyron Nosworthy isn't the easiest name to work into a chant but the Red and White Army rose to the challenge. The early rendition of 'Come On Nyron' to the tune of Gary Glitter's 'Do You Want to be in My Gang' took off, but it was when Amy Winehouse's 'Rehab' was reworked that 'Nugsy' had a chant befitting his cult hero status. The film of him singing in the dressing room after the title was won with a 5-0 win at Luton typified his spirit, as did the photo's of him. shirtless celebrating with the fans who had taken over three guarters of Kennilworth Road.

"I'm not going to sing any songs," says Nyron when asked for a message for supporters, quickly adding, "but there's that song everyone sang when we got promoted. I still hear and I thank them for that. Those memories are probably the best I have in my career. The fans were brilliant to me everywhere I went when I was here. I couldn't even go into Morrisons without people singing 'They tried to take the ball off Nyron but he said no, no, no!"

WHO GETS YOUR VOTE?

Christmas - that special time of the year, when the family sits down under the tree, surrounded by festive greetings as they settle beside a roaring log fire... to watch BBC Sports Personality of the Year.

In the Hickman household of years gone by it was the precursor to today's reality TV game shows. A sort of sporting version of 'I'm a Celebrity,' 'X Factor' and 'Pop Idol' all rolled into one.

Even now, years after it should have lost its sell by date, it is still an award of great significance. Several years ago the world heavyweight boxer Lennox Lewis was told he was in the running for the award, but showed little interest in it, having grown up in Canada, but was then advised that this was... the big one. Lewis duly collected the top prize, but was still confused as to how and why the BBC had cornered the market in sporting awards, on the basis the corporation actually televised so little sport.

Onto that subject later - a glance at previous winners would suggest we are an athletics-mad nation. Athletics easily outguns all other sports in the pantheon of victors as there have been 17, ever since Chris Chataway pipped the first sub-four minute miler Roger Bannister to the trophy in 1954. He has been followed by 16 other athletics heroes and heroines over the next 60 years, most recently Dame Kelly Holmes.

Football and cricket, the nation's winter and summer games, fare pretty well as football has provided us with five winners over the years, starting off with Bobby Moore in 1966 (Geoff Hurst was third that year) and the World Cup winning skipper has been followed by Paul Gascoigne (1990), Michael Owen (1998), David Beckham (2001) and Ryan Giggs (2009).

Cricketing victors started with Jim Laker in 1956 after he took 19 wickets in an Ashes test, still a feat which has never been repeated. And yes, Ian Botham did win it in 1981, the year of 'Botham's Ashes.' All together though cricket has provided us with only four winners.

Joint second with football and their five winners are Formula One racing and boxing. Both sports can claim double winners as Damon Hill collected the gong twice, once for not even winning the drivers' title, and 'Our 'enry,' Henry Cooper was also a two-time successor, although he never held a world crown in his long and illustrious career.

Cycling and figure skating have enjoyed four and three successes respectively, while surprisingly,



rugby has only had one winner in all the 60 years, Jonny Wilkinson in 2003, the year England won the World Cup 'Down Under' with his dramatic drop kick.

Strange that royalty seems to have done better than rugby. Princess Anne in 1971 and Zara Phillips in 2006 both collected the prestigious award and yet I'm struggling to understand why. Both were adept at their sport, eventing, but to suggest they were worthy of the top prize is absurd. Maybe it was just a thin year, after all, another Canadian, Greg Rusedski won for coming runner-up at the US Open.

Back to the BBC. I watched a programme last week which celebrated BBC2's televising of some of the most iconic moments in sport. Sad to say, almost all are now gone from our terrestrial screens.

Isn't it faintly embarrassing now when the action is shown and 'Pictures kindly supplied by Sky Sports' appear on almost every slice of action. It is to the BBCs shame that sport is now hardly ever on their airwaves... apart from the BBC Sports Personality of the Year.

This year's trophy will go to either Rory McIlroy or Lewis Hamilton and regardless of whether the winner comes from the fairways or Formula One, I'll be voting for Carl Froch. I was lucky enough to be there with 80,000 others at Wembley stadium in May when he knocked out George Groves with the 'Punch of the Century,' so my X is going there. And yours?

BBC Sports Personality of the Year is on Sunday, 14th December.

Rob Mason remembers the men who managed Sunderland.



C Ken Knighton with record signing Stan Cummins Ken Knighton's best moment as Sunderland manager came against West Ham. His class of 1980 clinched promotion by beating the Hammers just two days after the London side had triumphed over Arsenal in the FA Cup Final at Wembley.

It was the climax of Knighton's first season in charge. He'd become Sunderland's youngest manager since Robert Campbell in the 19th century when he'd taken over at the age of 35, the same age as Wes Brown and Anthony Reveillere are now.

Following an unbeaten pre-season tour of Switzerland, Knighton's stint in charge of Sunderland commenced with a goalless draw at Chelsea followed by back-toback home wins that got the 1979-80 season off to a good start. Up and down form saw the side 12th in mid-November before thev dot into dear. the board backing Knighton as the cash was splashed, the club record being broken in November and then December as Stan Cummins and then Claudio Marangoni were brouaht in.

Diminutive winger Cummins delivered with 12 goals in 26 games, including scoring home and away to Newcastle, four in a match against Burnley and then in the all important promotion clincher against West Ham. These days there's a strong South American influence on Wearside but for Argentinian Marangoni, arriving a year after his country became World Champions for the first time, life in England proved difficult and barely a year after his debut he returned to Argentina as Sunderland cut their losses.

Nonetheless under Ken's guidance promotion seeking Sunderland timed their run as well as top scorer Pop Robson - a man with strong West Ham connections - would time his, Robson averaged exactly a goal for each two of his 40 games. Eighth at the beginning of March when held to a goalless home draw with Leicester, who would pip runners up Sunderland to the title by a point, The Lads briefly topped the table in April before going into the do or die decider with The Hammers in fourth place.

Born in Kexborough near Barnsley, Knighton had looked like going down the pit before joining Wolves for who he debuted at Anfield on 13th February 1964, seven days before he turned 20. As an old fashioned wing-half who occasionally turned out at right-back or on the wing, Knighton made 359 league appearances in a career that took him to Oldham, Preston, Blackburn, Hull and Sheffield Wednesday.

It was at Hillsborough that he hung up his boots when offered a position as youth coach by Owls manager Len Ashurst. He remained with Wednesday until coming to Roker Park initially as a coach in July 1978.

Following the departure of Jimmy Adamson and initial caretaker Dave Merrington, the popular Billy Elliott took charge as caretaker 36 years ago today until the end of the season. Taking Sunderland to within a whisker of promotion in a run that included the legendary Gary Rowell hat-trick in a 4-1 win at Newcastle, Elliott was surprisingly

It's always hard for a coach to step up and Knighton, who was known as something of a disciplinarian, failed to impress hard man full-back Joe Bolton upon his appointment. Talking to me for the book 'Sunderland Cult Heroes' Bolton remembered: "Ken Knighton walked in and I said something like, 'Aye okay Ken' and he said, 'It's boss now.' He was a right champagne Charlie."

The man who had just appointed Knighton was chairman Keith Collings. Now deceased, Mr. Collings gave his last interview to Legion of Light in 2007 during which he said of Knighton: "He was a bit of a sharp character. I got on alright with Ken and he got us promotion."

Following instant promotion Knighton's appointment was looking like a good one, especially when after beating Everton 3-1 at home (with new signing Sam Allardyce making his debut) and Manchester City 4-0 away Sunderland topped the embryonic top-flight.

It was to be a tough season though and by the end of it Knighton was gone. There were bright spots during the campaign but they were few and far between and gradually the side slid down the table. More pertinently Ken's supportive chairman Keith Collings had been replaced by Tom Cowie and the motor magnate eventually put the brakes on.

"I don't think there's any doubt that Tom Cowie and Ken Knighton didn't get on," remarked Keith Collings in that 2007 Legion interview. "We didn't have the experience to deal with someone like Tom Cowie," admitted Knighton's assistant manager Frank Clark when interviewed in Red & White earlier this year.

Like any successful businessman Cowie wanted value for money. The turn of the year saw investment in Ian Bowyer (father of the current Blackburn boss) and Tom Ritchie. Bowver failed to hit the heights he'd had under Brian Clough at Forest but it was Ritchie whose signing Knighton probably had most cause to regret. Signed from Bristol City, Ritchie had always been one of those opposing forwards who caused Sunderland problems but having moved north he couldn't hit the proverbial barn door! He failed to score in the 11 games he had under Knighton - then promptly scored a hat-trick in the first game after Knighton was sacked.

The death knell of Knighton's reign had come after a third successive defeat that left the team tottering sixth from bottom. Mick Docherty took over as caretaker and kept Sunderland up, helped by a final day victory at Liverpool.

Knighton meanwhile surfaced in a scouting role for Manchester United before becoming manager of Orient in October 1981. He was to remain at Brisbane Road until his dismissal in May 1983, later managing non-league Dagenham Town and Trowbridge Town.

By 1984 though the thrills of a lap of honour before a capacity crowd at Roker Park when promotion was won must have seemed a lifetime away as he accepted a job with Plessey Communications to create not a football team, but a sales team. Now retired Ken Knighton is 70 and living in the Bristol area.

Everyone remembers the famous games but here **Harry Barrett** recalls a 'forgotten fixture'...

Saturday 25th August 1923

Parishioners were planning the 1,250th anniversary of St Peter's foundation in Monkwearmouth. Meanwhile, West Ham celebrated their first ever top-flight fixture with a pilgrimage to Roker.

Billy Moore, former Sunderland player, and main man for the Hammers, was warmly welcomed. An ever-present in their promotion team, also beaten in Wembley's first FA Cup Final, Bill's promptings gave Sunderland debutant Reg Wilkinson a torrid afternoon.

A £1,000 summer signing from Norwich, Wilkinson was the only newcomer to a Sunderland XI, runners-up to league champions Liverpool the previous term.

> Consequently much was expected of Bob Kyle's team. But on a chilly afternoon it was the visitors who looked the more dangerous, showing, "greater dash and enthusiasm than the homesters," according to a local scribe.

Sunderland's best opportunity came in the first period. Attacking the Fulwell End, Poole and Marshall created a good opportunity for Buchan. But the skipper missed his kick, complaining Hammers defender Tresarden had held him back. The match report

prosaically suggested Charlie had been "interfered with."

That was that. The 35,000 crowd, entertained by the Tramways Band before kick-off, rejoiced the following Saturday with a 1-0 win at Upton Park.

By then Reg Wilkinson had been dropped and at the end of the season joined Brighton. Still playing for Norwich Electricity Board at the age of 47, he sadly died after collapsing in a local game in his native Norfolk.

Billy Moore blossomed, and on retirement became trainer serving the Hammers until 1960, by which time another Moore legend was an established first-teamer at Upton Park.

Referee Mike Jones was handing out the cards last weekend but unfortunately for Wolverhampton Wanderers, they were of the red variety rather than the Christmas variety.


After seeing two players sent-off during the second-half their 2-1 home defeat to Bournemouth, talk among the Wolves fans at Molineux is likely to be about how they are going to arrest a run of five straight defeats - yet for Sunderland fans Danny Graham's first goal of the season may be of more interest.

Graham had put his side ahead with a deft header in his third game on loan, having already gone close the week before when he hit the bar at Brentford with the game still 0-0. The match ended with a convincing 4-0 win for the Bees though, and Wolves will be hoping to get back on track today when they face Sheffield Wednesday, for whom Keiren Westwood has been a regular starter.

Another member of the goalkeepers union, Joel Dixon, has been in fine form of late and that has led to Boston United extending his loan until the 5th January. Dennis Greene's side are yet to lose since Dixon arrived, and have progressed to the First Round proper of the FA Trophy after a reunion with Workington where Joel had played last season.

Boston beat the Reds 2-1, and were then back in Conference North action last week when they drew at home to Brackley Town to stay on the coat tails of the play-off pack. Sunderland's other loaned out goalkeeper Jordan Pickford might also be thinking about breaking into the play-off places again now that his Bradford City side are turning their form back around following a sticky patch, their last league game ending in a 3-1 win against a Leyton Orient team that included recent signing Andrea Dossena playing at left-back.

The terms of Pickford's deal meant he sat out last Saturday's FA Cup win against Dartford, meaning Ben Williams came into the side - Williams having joined the Bantams this summer from Hibernian, where he was a team mate of Duncan Watmore during the winger's loan towards the end of the season.

El Hadji Ba's loan at Bastia remains on hold while he receives treatment for an injury back in England, meaning he missed out on the recent clash away at Valentin Roberge's Stade de Reims side. The home side won the game 2-1 and while Roberge was an unused substitute he was drafted back in for their following match against high-flying Lyon. Manager Jean-Luc Vasseur tested out a five-man defence, with Roberge utilised right in the centre, only for a late goal to scupper any hopes of a point against a home side that had Steed Malbranque on the bench.

While the tactic seemed to have worked to a degree however, Roberge was left out again when Reims reverted to their regular flat back-four last Sunday, although with Les Rouges et Blancs (Red and Whites, aptly) suffering an unexpected 3-2 defeat against current Coupe de France holders EA Guingamp, he will no doubt be hoping he is given more chances to impress in the coming weeks.

► City's third goal, scored by Pablo Zabaleta, was the 300th Sunderland have conceded at home in the Premier League. ► The defending champions became the first visiting team to score four at the Stadium of Light since West Brom in November 2012. City last scored four on Wearside in March 1989 in a game in what is now the Championship. Sunderland lost at home by a three-goal margin for the first time since April 2011 when Fulham won 3-0. Sebastian Coates made his Barclays Premier League debut for Sunderland.



When Connor Wickham put Sunderland ahead in the 19th minute there was a thought that maybe, just maybe, Sunderland could make it an incredible five successive 1-0 home wins over Manchester City. Those thoughts didn't last long however as within two minutes Sergio Aguero blasted the visitors level.

Eight minutes later the champions took the lead. Having held the ball for a sustained period of possession, a straight ball found Aguero who turned provider with a perfect instant touch to release Stevan Jovetic who finished clinically.

Sunderland had started brightly. On five minutes Seb Larsson found Will Buckley who pulled the ball back for Jack Rodwell but his effort was blocked by Pablo Zabaleta. It was Larsson again at the heart of the move that created Sunderland's goal. Eschewing an easy ball into space on the right, the Swede's astute reverse pass caught City flat-footed as Wickham opened the scoring.

However, having ran themselves into the ground to hold Chelsea the previous weekend The Lads couldn't restrain Manuel Pellegrini's side who extended their lead nine minutes after the break. Again the goal sprang from sustained ball retention, City eventually released full-back Zabaleta who skilfully dinked the ball home from six yards.

The scoring was completed with 19 minutes left as Aguero's near post run saw him clip the ball in off the post for another top class finish on a night when Sunderland were simply beaten by a better team.

Ricky Alvarez came off the bench for his first appearance since September. City's Dedryck Boyata made his first Barclays Premier League appearance since December 2013. ► 18-year-old Jose Pozo came on for his Barclays Premier League debut while still to debut, 17-year-old Angelino Tasende, was on the visitors' bench. City's Eliaquim Mangala missed the match through suspension. ► Former City man Adam Johnson missed the game through injury but there were starts for ex-City players Costel Pantilimon and Jack Rodwell.



Sunderland's well merited draw at Anfield last Saturday meant The Lads have finished all square in nine of their 15 games in the Barclays Premier League so far this season.

This equals the previous highest number of draws at this stage, set in 1994-95 in the Championshipequivalent and betters the highest opening sequence in Premier League seasons which was the eight drawn of the first 15 games of 2010-11.

Should the pattern continue Sunderland could challenge their record number of draws in a single season which could lead to a curious symmetry in that the previous highest totals were 20

the last occasion a higher number of draws was recorded in a similar spell, with The Lads finishing level in 10 of 15 mid-season games on their way to a fourth-place finish, just four points behind first-time champions Chelsea.

Five of Sunderland's draws this season have been goalless which has already equalled the previous highest tally in a Premier League season recorded in 2011-12. The home stalemate with then unbeaten Chelsea two weeks ago will no doubt remain in the memory longer than most 0-0s and showed that the absence of the fundamental ingredient of football does not always mean a lack of drama and significance.

45 of Sunderland's 509 Premier League games have finished goalless with the draw at Liverpool being the third 0-0 at Anfield, matching the three at Arsenal and one behind the four stalemates at Villa Park, which is the highest number at an away ground. Sunderland v Blackburn clashes have resulted in the highest number of 0-0s in total (five) while past encounters with Fulham, Aston Villa and Arsenal all include four occasions when the scorers were untroubled.

Three out of Sunderland's first five games in the Premier League finished goalless, including the very first one against Leicester City at Roker in August 1996 which saw Niall Quinn make his debut for The Lads.

The highest number of 0-0s in one season is eight, during 1995-96 when Peter Reid's team won the Championship with a solid defensive foundation that ensured a record 26 clean sheets and recorded the second fewest goals conceded per game in the club's history.
