Match background

Switzerland may still be digesting the bitter disappointment of their early elimination from UEFA EURO 2008™ but Köbi Kuhn's co-hosts still have one remaining commitment in the form of a final Group A fixture against a Portugal side already assured first place in the section.

- If Portugal's goal is to maintain their winning momentum after two previous victories, for Switzerland the incentive is to give their supporters at least something to sing about and a first Swiss victory in UEFA European Championship finals history would surely constitute that for a team now guaranteed the wooden spoon.
- Portugal earned their place in the quarter-finals after beating the Czech Republic 3-1 in Geneva on Wednesday. After Deco and Libor Sionko had traded first-half goals, Luiz Felipe Scolari's men took charge after the break when Cristiano Ronaldo (63) and Ricardo Quaresma (90+1) found the net.
- That made it six points out of six for the Portuguese, 2-0 winners against Turkey in their opening game.
- Switzerland's hopes of finding a positive response to their 1-0 opening loss to the Czechs evaporated in the face of Turkey's 2-1 comeback victory in Basel. Hakan Yakin gave the Swiss a 32nd-minute lead but they succumbed to second-half strikes from Semih Şentürk and Arda Turan, the latter two minutes into added time.
- This will be the countries' first encounter at a major tournament but Portugal have had the better of their recent meetings winning three and drawing three of the last six.
- The sides crossed swords most recently in qualifying for the 1994 FIFA World Cup. Although Switzerland eventually progressed to the finals in the United States, Portugal got the better of their contests by earning a 1-1 draw in Berne in March 1993 and then defeating them 1-0 in Porto seven months later through a ninth-minute goal from João Pinto.
- Switzerland's last victory against Portugal came in a friendly in Lugano in March 1982, when goals from Gianpietro Zappa (42 minutes) and André Egli (62) earned them a 2-1 win.
- The first ever meeting between the teams was a play-off in Milan for a place in the first round of the 1938 FIFA World Cup. Switzerland won 2-1, thereby forcing Portugal to wait another 28 years for their debut appearance on the world stage.
- Overall Switzerland have won six, drawn five and lost eight of their 19 matches against Portugal. However, their home record against the Portuguese provides more favourable reading, with five wins, three draws and only two losses.
- Switzerland goalkeeper Diego Benaglio spent two and a half seasons with Portuguese Liga team CD Nacional, before joining Germany's VfL Wolfsburg during the January winter break.

- · Switzerland midfielder Gelson Fernandes and Portugal pair Cristiano Ronaldo and Nani are on opposite sides of Manchester's blue-red divide with their respective clubs Manchester City FC and Manchester United FC.
- Portugal defender Fernando Meira is a team-mate of Switzerland's Ludovic Magnin at VfB Stuttgart and also played alongside forward Marco Streller at the Bundesliga club.
- As a player with FC Zürich. Kuhn was on the receiving end of a 3-0 defeat at Sporting Clube de Portugal in a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup guarter-final first-leg tie in 1973/74. Kuhn missed the return as Zürich went down 4-1 on aggregate.
- Switzerland's Johan Vonlanthen holds the record for being the tournament's youngest goalscorer. He was 18 years and 141 days old when he found the net in the 3-1 defeat by France on 21 June 2004.
- Switzerland were led at EURO '96™ by Portuguese coach Artur Jorge, who later had a spell in charge of the Portugal national team.
- This is Switzerland's third UEFA European Championship finals appearance, following two previous first-round exits in 1996 and 2004.
- Portugal's best performance in four previous appearances came at UEFA EURO 2004™, where they finished runners-up. They have never once failed to advance from the first round, present tournament included.
- Three teams have won the UEFA European Championship as hosts. Spain and Italy triumphed in 1964 and 1968 respectively, when staging the semi-finals and final. France in 1984 became the only winners since a proper final tournament was established in 1980.
- This is the 13th edition of the UEFA European Championship and the eighth edition that features a final tournament with a group phase.

• Switzerland 1-2 Turkey (Yakin 32; Semih 57, Arda 90)

Arda Turan's deflected goal ended Switzerland's UEFA EURO 2008™ hopes in cruel fashion. The co-hosts dealt better with a first-half downpour in Basel and Hakan Yakin put them ahead with a rain-assisted goal. Half-time substitute Semih Sentürk equalised, however, before Arda completed Turkey's comeback.

- Switzerland coach Köbi Kuhn said: "The disappointment is huge. But I can't really criticise anyone, neither the players nor anyone else. The team played as well as they could and lost two matches in a rather unfortunate way. But we prepared well, the team made every effort, kept on evolving and developing their physical strength and I have to congratulate them on what they have achieved."
- Kuhn made two changes to the side that lost to the Czech Republic on the opening day, with Yakin and Derdiyok forming a new strike partnership as Alexander Frei and Marco Streller were both ruled out through injury.
- The loss left Switzerland marooned at the foot of Group A following a 1-0 loss to the Czech Republic on 7 June. Václav Svěrkoš crashed the party for the co-hosts by scoring the only goal after 71 minutes in Basel, although Vonlanthen came close to rescuing a Group A point with a late shot off the underside of the crossbar.

Injury news

- Streller was ruled out of the Turkey match as his groin problem proved worse than originally thought, and on Friday it was confirmed that his tournament is over.
- Valon Behrami played all 90 minutes having been forced off towards the end of the Czech game with a tight thigh muscle.
- Derdiyok suffered a minor ankle sprain against Turkey.

- Frei limped off in tears just before half-time against the Czech Republic and further tests revealed a partial rupture to the collateral ligaments in his left knee. He will be sidelined for six weeks, ruling him out of the rest of the tournament, though the striker has opted to remain with the Swiss squad.
- When Patrick Müller played every minute against the Czech Republic it was his first competitive appearance since 5 August after being beset by cruciate ligament injuries.
- Steve von Bergen (broken hand), Fabio Coltorti (post-viral fatigue) and Blaise Nkufo (torn thigh muscle) were all ruled out before the finals.

Domestic information

- Benjamin Huggel, Derdiyok and Streller were all members of the FC Basel 1893 side that won the Swiss Super League.
- That meant BSC Young Boys had to settle for second yet Hakan Yakin earned some consolation as he finished as the Super League's top scorer with 24 goals in 32 league appearances.
- Müller played just one game the opening match of the season against AJ Auxerre as Olympique Lyonnais won the double in France. He played 90 minutes of the domestic Super Cup victory against FC Sochaux-Montbéliard.
- Frei spent much of BV Borussia Dortmund's 2007/08 campaign on the sidelines, but returned to score six goals in eight appearances to stave off the threat of relegation.
- Neuchâtel Xamax FC finished eighth in Switzerland with Pascal Zuberbühler set to leave as a free agent this summer.

- Ricardo played all 1,260 minutes in qualifying Group A, with Cristiano Ronaldo missing only one of the 14 games. The pair have played both games at these finals.
- Two of the final 23-man squad did not feature in qualifying: Nuno Espírito Santo and Rui Patrício.
- Portugal scored 24 goals in qualifying at an average of 1.71 per game. Germany led the way overall having found the net 35 times.
- Of the teams who qualified for UEFA EURO 2008™ only Poland (12 goals) and Turkey (eleven) conceded more than Portugal's total of ten.
- Ronaldo was Portugal's top scorer in qualifying with eight goals. Northern Ireland's David Healy finished as the highest scorer overall having struck 13 times.

Latest information

Czech Republic 1-3 Portugal (Sionko 17; Deco 8, Ronaldo 63, Quaresma 90)

Ronaldo scored one goal and set up two more as Portugal qualified for the quarter-finals as Group A winners with a game to spare. The Manchester United FC man teed up goals for Deco and substitute Ricardo Quaresma while scoring with a sublime finish himself. Libor Sionko had levelled with a thumping header.

- Portugal coach Luiz Felipe Scolari said: "I am very proud of the team because it means we have reached our objective and qualified for the last eight after only two games. In previous years we have made life difficult for ourselves. This time we have restructured the team and made life a little easier. It's a good sign. We certainly won't be holding back in our next game. We came to the tournament with the plan to win every match and we are now in a very solid position.
- Ronaldo was named Carlsberg Man of Match, with György Mezey, part of the UEFA Technical Team that selected him, explaining: "He scores goals and sets them up and did very well throughout. In one-v-one situations [the Czech Republic] were not able to mark Ronaldo, he was always dangerous." Pepe won the award in the Turkey game.
- Losers on the opening day in 2004, Portugal made a sure-footed start this time as Pepe (61) and substitute Raul Meireles (90) secured all three points in Geneva. Nuno Gomes also rattled the woodwork twice.
- Nuno Gomes was substituted midway through the second half of the opening two games, each time handing the captain's armband to Ronaldo.

Iniurv news

- Deco (fatigue) and Bosingwa (thigh injury) played against both Turkey and the Czech Republic after overcoming pre-tournament problems.
- Second-choice goalkeeper Quim was ruled out of the finals after fracturing his right wrist in training on Friday. The SL Benfica custodian was replaced by 34-year-old Espírito Santo of FC Porto.

Miscellaneous

- Just a few hours after his Portugal team had defeated the Czech Republic, Scolari was named as the new manager of Chelsea FC a role that the Brazilian will take up on 1 July.
- As ambassador for the online Score for the Red Cross fundraising campaign, Ronaldo knows that when he finds the net at UEFA EURO 2008™, his goals are helping the tournament's key humanitarian cause. The campaign benefits landmine victims in Afghanistan and every goal scored (except in penalty shoot-outs) during the finals will be worth a donation of €4,000.
- When the squad landed at Geneva airport on 1 June they were given a memorable welcome by some of the 174,000 Portuguese citizens residing in Switzerland. A motorcade of 600 Portuguese followed the team bus by motorcycle to their training base, while others lined the streets waving red-and-green flags. An estimated 10,000 fans were waiting to greet the players in Neuchatel.

Domestic information

- Four members of the squad were in the Porto side that claimed the club's 23rd Liga title; Bosingwa, Bruno Alves, Quaresma and Raul Meireles. Porto were beaten in the Portuguese Cup final, however, slipping to a 2-0 extra-time defeat by a Sporting Clube de Portugal team that included Rui Patrício, João Moutinho and Miguel Veloso.
- Ronaldo and Nani helped Manchester United FC to a UEFA Champions League and Premier League double in 2007/08, the former scoring 42 goals for the club in all competitions. Ronaldo finished as both the top scorer in the UEFA Champions League, with eight goals, and the Premier League, where he struck 31 times.
- In Spain, Pepe claimed a Primera División winners medal in his first season with Real Madrid CF, even if an injury-blighted start to the campaign limited him to 19 league appearances.

Jakob "Köbi" Kuhn will be looking for a successful last hurrah with Switzerland after deciding to step down after the finals, saying: "I have promised my wife that I'll call it a day after UEFA EURO 2008™."

Switzerland had not had a homegrown coach since 1989 prior to Kuhn taking the job in summer 2001 following the resignation of Argentinian Enzo Trossero. Having previously turned down an offer to be Trossero's assistant, Kuhn showed he was right to go it alone, earning Switzerland their first place at a major finals tournament since EURO '96™ when he oversaw their qualification for UEFA EURO 2004™ and then repeating the trick by leading them to the 2006 FIFA World Cup finals.

After a succession of foreign coaches – Uli Stielike, Roy Hodgson, Gilbert Gress and Trossero – Kuhn was plucked from the relative obscurity of the Swiss Under-21 coaching post to lead the senior team. Kuhn duly took a scythe to the Swiss squad, removing some of the older players and bringing young talent in; indeed he is hoping elements of the side that won the 2002 UEFA European Under-17 Championship can help Switzerland shine as UEFA EURO 2008™ co-hosts. As a player, Kuhn was a skilful midfielder who won six league titles and five Swiss Cups over 16 years and 500 games with FC Zürich. Capped 63 times by Switzerland, he also played twice in the semi-finals of the European Champion Clubs' Cup, against Real Madrid CF in 1962/63 and Liverpool FC in 1976/77.

Credited by many as the man who rescued Brazilian football when the national team were at a low ebb, Luiz Felipe Scolari is hoping he can go one step better in his second UEFA European Championship campaign with Portugal.

The stage seemed set for the Brazilian to lead the Portuguese to glory on home soil when they breezed into the final of UEFA EURO 2004™ but, just as they had done in the opening game of the finals, Greece spoiled the party by winning 1-0. Four years on, Portugal will return to the continental finals having finished second behind Poland in Group A. The UEFA EURO 2004™ runners-up performed impressively at the 2006 FIFA World Cup, seeing off the Netherlands and England before losing 1-0 to France in the semi-finals. It was the country's best showing since 1966 and Scolari agreed a new two-year deal shortly after. It took a change to coaching in 1982 for Scolari to make an impact at the highest level. His reputation was established when he won the Copa Libertadores with Grêmio Foot-ball Porto Alegrense in 1995 and SE Palmeiras four years later.

His aggressive style was not such a big hit with the Brazilian public after he took charge of the national team. Indeed, after barely squeezing through qualifying for the 2002 FIFA World Cup, his promise that Brazil would reach the semi-finals was greeted with derision. However, he was to prove true to his word and more as, despite leaving out Romário, a side featuring Ronaldo, Ronaldinho and Rivaldo overcame Germany in the final in Japan.

Austrian referee Konrad Plautz, a regular on the UEFA Champions League scene and the man in charge of the 2007 UEFA Super Cup as AC Milan won 3-1 against Sevilla FC, is an enthusiastic director and actor with a local theatre group, the perfect antidote to his hectic schedule. A toolmaker from the Alpine town of Navis, Plautz began taking charge of matches as a teenager in 1984.

Starting with the youth sector, he began his rise through the ranks at regional level before heading into the Austrian national leagues, fulfilling an objective he had set himself at the outset of his career. Plautz reached Austrian Bundesliga standard after six years, getting his FIFA international badge in 1996. That same year he was chosen to referee the UEFA European Under-16 Championship final in Vienna in which Portugal beat France. In 2005/06, he took charge of Arsenal FC's 1-0 first-leg victory against Villarreal CF in the UEFA Champions League semi-finals.

A veteran of two FIFA World Cup qualifying campaigns, Plautz has experience of UEFA European Championship qualifiers back to March 1999. He is naturally established as one of his country's most respected officials, refereeing one of the top fixtures in the Austrian Bundesliga almost every weekend and was in the middle as Liverpool FC and Chelsea FC drew 1-1 in the UEFA Champions League semi-final first leg in 2007/08.

Competition facts

UEFA European Championship: Did you know?

- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has appeared in two victorious finals.
- Since 1980, when the tournament became an eight-team event, the hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals or better twice. Italy finished second in Group 2 in 1980, when only the top side in each section progressed to the final, and in 2000 Belgium co-hosts with the Netherlands, who did reach the semi-finals came third in their section.
- UEFA EURO 2008™ is Germany's tenth successive UEFA European Championship final tournament, more appearances than any other side they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands are taking part in the finals for the sixth successive edition.
- Italy are bidding to become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France claimed the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000™.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals; for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller and France's Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry.
- Having played in Manchester United FC's UEFA Champions League final victory in Moscow on 21 May, Edwin van der Sar, Patrice Evra, Nani and Cristiano Ronaldo can join the exclusive band of five players who have appeared in European Champion Clubs' Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year. Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breukelen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka won the European Cup with PSV and Real Madrid CF in 1988 and 2000 respectively yet remaining on the bench for the Netherlands' and France's European Championship triumphs in those years. Anelka's Madrid and France team-mate from 2000, Christian Karembeu, holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both final victories in the same year.
- A total of ten players have been UEFA European Championship final losers after appearing in a European Cup victory: Sepp Maier, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Franz Beckenbauer and Uli Hoeness (1976, FC Bayern München and West Germany) and Paulo Ferreira, Ricardo Carvalho, Nuno Valente, Costinha, Maniche and Deco (2004, FC Porto and Portugal).
- Conversely six Chelsea players Petr Čech, Claude Makelele, Carvalho, Michael Ballack, Florent Malouda and Anelka could join a list of four players who followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Hörst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).

In the stadiums, there have been no incidents to report; the crowds have been enthusiastic and excited by all the action on the field. We've heard all the different groups of supporters singing their national anthems, as well as respecting and even applauding the national anthem of the other team. Bravo! I must also mention the exemplary conduct of the coaches, who are setting a fine example to all their less experienced fellow coaches. On the field, we've seen some great football, with some exciting action and a quantity of goals which is well within the average for a 16-team European Championship final round. Everyone agrees that the quality of the television broadcasts is excellent, and the viewing figures are breaking records in many countries. I hope, therefore, that all these positive trends continue – and that the weather improves."

Zero tolerance for racism

The football family and anti-racism campaigners have joined forces at the start of UEFA EURO 2008™ to deliver a strong message: racist conduct, discrimination and intolerance will have no place at the tournament, or in the future. A key gathering in Basel brought together representatives of UEFA and the FARE (Football Against Racism in Europe) network for a reception featuring former players, administrators and non-government organisations to signal the beginning of a three-week anti-discrimination programme at UEFA EURO 2008™. The Unite Against Racism programme, run by the FARE network with UEFA's backing, as well as with the support of the professional players' union FIFPro, will include an advertising spot broadcast at every game – Different Languages, One Goal: No To Racism – pitch-side boards and activities with fans, culminating in high-profile activities on the field at the semi-finals in Basel and Vienna on 25 and 26 June.

Ronaldo scores for the Red Cross

Portugal star Cristiano Ronaldo was humbled after meeting landmine victim Mohammad Kabir at the national team's base in Neuchatel. The Afghan lost a leg while playing football in Kabul. "There are always lessons to learn in life," said the 23-year-old, who is the ambassador for the UEFA EURO 2008™ Score for the Red Cross campaign, which will benefit landmine victims in Afghanistan. "[Mohammad] was left without his dream of being able to be a player – and one who knew he was a good player." The Manchester United FC forward, whose first goal of UEFA EURO 2008™ against the Czech Republic on Wednesday earned a €4,000 UEFA donation for the campaign, added: "I liked him a lot. He seemed an amazing guy to me, but he was also full of energy and motivation to keep on with his life. He knows that life doesn't finish here, and that he has to go on. It's very sad, though, for a dream to end in this way."

Big screen in Berne

UEFA EURO 2008™ host city Berne has installed a third giant screen for public viewing in the city's Kornhausplatz for the Netherlands' final two Group C games against France and Romania. The move comes after 30,000 Dutch fans invaded Berne for their team's first match against Italy, and even more Dutch fans were expected for the French match in the city's Stade de Suisse. The city and UEFA agreed to the move to enable more fans to enjoy the EURO match experience, and to cope with the expected extra influx of Dutch supporters into the Swiss federal capital.

Fan Zone fun

Despite the cool weather at the start of UEFA EURO 2008[™], the official Fan Zones in the eight host cities had already attracted over one million visitors altogether after five match days. Martin Kallen, Chief Operating Officer of Euro 2008 SA, is delighted at the success of the Fan Zones: "The atmosphere in the Fan Zones is tremendous. Fans from the different nations are having a good time together and creating a friendly mood. The big winners are the fans. The excellent organisational arrangements made by the host cities, as well as the efficiency of the security forces and the police, have contributed to this success," said Martin Kallen, praising the efforts of the host cities. He is confident that UEFA EURO 2008[™] will continue to be a success, and that plenty more fans and local people will flock to the UEFA EURO 2008[™] Fan Zones to savour the tournament.

Competition information

- Format: The UEFA EURO 2008™ group stage draw in Lucerne on 2 December 2007 divided the 14 qualifiers and co-hosts Austria and Switzerland into four groups of four. Each country plays each other once. Three points are awarded for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat. If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings:
- a) number of points obtained in the matches among the teams in question;
- b) goal difference from the matches among the teams in question;
- c) number of goals scored in the matches among the teams in question (if more than two teams finish level on points);
- d) goal difference in all group matches;
- e) number of goals scored in all the group matches;
- f) coefficient from the qualifying competitions for the 2006 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2008™ (points obtained divided by number of matches played):
- g) Fair Play conduct of teams in the final tournament;
- h) drawing of lots

If two teams which have the same number of points, the same number of goals scored and conceded play their last group match against each other and are still equal at the end of that match, the ranking of the two teams in question will be determined by kicks from the penalty mark, provided no other teams within the group have the same number of points on completion of all group matches. Should more than two teams have the same number of points, the criteria (a) to (h) will apply.

• Key dates: The quarter-finals are played on 19, 20, 21 and 22 June in the following format:

Match 1 Winner Group A v Runner-up Group B

Match 2 Winner Group B v Runner-up Group A

Match 3 Winner Group C v Runner-up Group D

Match 4 Winner Group D v Runner-up Group C

The semi-finals are played on 25 and 26 June:

Winner Match 1 v Winner Match 2

Winner Match 3 v Winner Match 4

The final is played at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion in Vienna on Sunday 29 June, with the winners of Semi-final 1 being designated as the home team for administrative purposes.

- Disciplinary information: As a rule, a player who is sent off is suspended for the next match in the competition. The Control and Disciplinary Body is entitled to augment this punishment. In the case of repeated cautions, a player is suspended for one match after two cautions in two different matches. In May, UEFA's Executive Committee decided at its meeting in Moscow to cancel single yellow cards after the guarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2008™. Consequently, a situation will not arise whereby players receive a second yellow card of the tournament in the semi-finals and are suspended for the final as a result.
- Player eligibility: The 16 participants in the final tournament had to submit a final list of 23 players of which three had to be goalkeepers – at least ten days before the opening match of the tournament, on 7 June. In the event of a serious injury to a listed player before his team's first match in the final tournament, the player in question could be substituted only if a doctor from the UEFA Medical Committee and the team doctor both confirmed the injury was serious enough to prevent the player taking part.
- Financial information: UEFA has earmarked a total of €184m for the 16 teams competing in UEFA EURO 2008™ compared to €129m at UEFA EURO 2004[™]. The 16 teams in the final tournament will each receive a participating fee of €7.5m with a performance bonus of €1m for a win during the group stage and €500,000 for a draw. The eight teams who reach the guarter-finals will all receive an additional payment of €2m, with the four teams who progress to the semi-finals collecting an extra €3m. For the teams who take the field for the final at the Ernst-Happel-Stadion on 29 June, the runners-up will receive €4.5m with the winners collecting €7.5m. Therefore, if the victorious side at the final win all three of their group games, they would collect a maximum of €23m.
